<u> St. Norbert | June 6</u>

Born to nobility, St. Norbert of Xanten, was ordained as a subdeacon and served in the court of Henry V, Emperor of Germany, however, at court it was easy to be distracted by wealth, power and luxury and he lived a worldly and corrupt life there. By the grace of God while traveling in a storm he was nearly struck by lightning and almost killed. This experience changed St. Norbert and he became penitent, left his court post, and after a period of discernment in a monastery, felt called to be a priest.

Norbert became an itinerant preacher, preaching against worldly attitudes but at the Pope's request finally settled in northern France and founded the <u>Norbertine order</u> established according to the rule of St. Augustine. The order grew rapidly and soon founded a women's branch. Norbert traveled and preached across Germany where he also founded a lay branch of the Norbertines. In Belgium he preached against heresies which denied the Blessed Sacrament.

Eventually he was made Archbishop of Magdeburg, Germany, and later he traveled to Rome in support of Pope Innocent II, against the antipope. Afterward he returned to Germany to court of Emperor Lothar as advisor, at end of life, in failing health, St. Norbert was carried back to Magdeburg where he died.

Did you Know?

Who can take Holy Communion to the sick and homebound?

The Church entrusts bishops, priests, and deacons with the ministry of taking Holy Communion to the sick. The clergy are ordinary ministers of Holy Communion. When a layperson takes the Eucharist to the sick, they act as an extraordinary minister of Holy Communion. In other words, he or she acts in an extraordinary capacity because the priests and deacons are unable to meet the needs of all the Catholics in a specific area.

Canon Law 910 explains, a layperson may become an extraordinary minister of Holy Communion in two ways. First, if any layman receives the ministry of acolyte. An acolyte automatically becomes an extraordinary minister of Holy Communion, in the same way that a deacon becomes by law, an ordinary minister of Holy Communion upon his ordination. Canon 230 provides for the possibility of other lay people to become extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion. They may perform these duties at Mass, or, if trained, outside of Mass. Yet they may only do so when the number of clergy and acolytes are insufficient to carry out this duty. Lay ministers of Holy Communion should always maintain open communication with the pastor, as well as any other priest or deacon or pastoral associates who oversees the layperson's ministry to the sick.

All must show proper reverence toward the Eucharist at all times. This includes the time spent transporting and handling the Holy Eucharist. Lay ministers should observe the proper liturgical rite when taking Holy Communion to the sick. There are several different rites that can be used outside of the Mass. A lay minister should consult with the pastor when he or she is uncertain which rite to use. A lay minister should also prepare carefully, making sure that he or she is familiar with the rite and completely understands it. A lay minister that has not been trained by whoever oversees this ministry CANNOT take the Eucharist out of the Church. Furthermore, no one should ever take the Eucharist from the tabernacle themselves or ask another lay person to do this for them. Only the Priest, Deacon or acolyte can give Holy Communion out to those administering the rite of communion outside of Mass.

It is time to "set the church on fire" with the Holy Spirit and become a truly great Church and may God bless our parish of St. Isidore (the Farmer) and those who live in our communities who yearn to hear our stories, our faith, and the love Jesus has for all of us. 
Vocations Prayer Group

men and women, priests, deacons and marriage.


