


Did you Know?

EUCHAR Why does the Church teach that women cannot be ordained when Jesus said, "Truly, I say to you, whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven"?

The authority to bind and loose doesn't mean the pope and bishops can do whatever they want. The expression refers to forbidding or permitting certain things in relation to the commandments, but this does not apply to the actual commandments themselves. For example, the commandment is to keep holy the Sabbath. The particular things that are permitted or forbidden on the Sabbath are part of the authority to bind and loose, but the commandment itself cannot be done away. The binding and loosing are referring to church laws, not divine laws. The difference between the two is so great that canon law refers to church laws as "merely ecclesiastical law" (can. 11). The Church is clear that its teachings on ordination come from divine law and not "mere" Church law. There aren't many issues within apologetics that require as much sensitivity as this one. So, if a woman's abilities are not in question, what's keeping the Church from ordaining her? For one, it should be noted that Jesus did not ordain any women. He selected all of his apostles, and none were women.

Some say that he was bound by the cultural norms of his era to suppress the roles of women, but no one has been able to prove that this was his motive. Furthermore, this accuses Jesus of sexism and it paints an inaccurate portrait of Christ, who had no qualms about shattering the cultural norms regarding interaction with women (Matt. 9:20; Luke 7:37; John 4:27). The idea of priestesses was not unknown to him, since it was a common practice in religions of his time and culture, though not Judaism. (If Jesus had wanted women as priestesses, he would have had the ideal candidate in Mary. Here was a woman who could have spoken the words of consecration literally: "This is my body. This is my blood.")

There were other roles that Christ had in mind for women. For example, they played a key role in the spread of the Gospel, being the first to spread the news of the risen Christ. They were also allowed to pray and prophesy in church (1 Cor. 11:1-16), but they were not to assume the function of teaching in the Christian assembly (1Cor. 14:34–38; 1 Tim. 2:1–14), which was restricted to the clergy. Two thousand years later, no one-including the pope-has the authority to change the designs of the Church that Christ instituted. Specifically, the Church is unable to change the substance of a sacrament. For example, a person cannot be baptized in wine, nor may a substance other than bread be used for the consecration at Mass. If invalid matter is used, then the sacrament does not take place. Likewise, since the priest acts in the person of Christ, the Church has no authority to confer the sacrament on those who are unable to represent the male Jesus Christ.

Father, Son and Holy Spirit

This weekend we celebrate the Solemnity of the Holy Trinity- the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. The Holy Trinity can seem mysterious to us as our human minds try to comprehend how three persons can be God at the same time. Sometimes we pray to God the Father, sometimes to Jesus, his Son and other times to the Holy Spirit. Then at other times in our lives we need all three to help us along.

I was diagnosed with breast cancer in 2007. At the time I knew I was not going to die from it but I knew it would turn my life upside down as I had surgery, radiation therapy, and a bazillion medical appointments. In the beginning, just after diagnosis, there is a terrible waiting period while the doctors decide how severe the cancer is and what kind of treatments will work the best for survival. At the time I was very afraid of what was to come. I decided to call upon the Holy Trinity for help as I knew I could not go through this alone and would need all three of them to get me through it. I made up my own prayer that went like this... "Father, be my strength and rock; Jesus, be my healer and companion; Holy Spirit- you take charge of everything else since I do not know quite what you really do!" This little prayer got me through the worst of my diagnosis and treatment. It was the first time I had truly turned myself over into God's hands. I will say it made all the difference in the world in my treatment and recovery. The three person's of the Trinity each did their job to get me through it all and in the process I found God who put me on a new path of life and faith.

During those times of stress and despair, look to the Holy Trinity and give them the jobs you need help with. They will always be their for you. All you have to do is ask!

Advanced ticket registration is now closed, but you can still buy tickets at the door! Onsite ticket sales at Tsongas Center begin at 7:30am; cash or credit cards accepted.

A core tenet of the Catholic faith is that the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ is made truly present in the Eucharist. But belief in the True Presence has waned in recent years, even among Catholics. And that's a concern—because as Cardinal Seán teaches, "it is in the Eucharist where we find our true identity." **Jesus is Here** is an opportunity for us to deepen our understanding of the mystery of Jesus' presence with us—by listening to powerful talks on the Eucharist, by receiving Jesus in the Eucharist at Mass, and by adoring Him in a time of adoration and worship.

Sts. Martha and Mary Music News

Adult Choir: Choir binders should be returned to the music room by mid-June for summer cleaning and music filing. Binders may be left in the bookcase or on the desk.

Mass Settings: Pentecost Sunday, celebrated June 4/5, ended the Easter season. As we move into Ordinary Time, we have two special solemnities, The Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity and the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi). We will gradually change Mass settings as we move into the summer and return to Ordinary Time. Parishioners will notice a different Penitential Act and a different Gospel Acclamation this Sunday, both used here in the past.

The Sequence: We have seen two of the three Sequences that are used during the liturgical year, those on Easter Sunday and Pentecost Sunday. Sequences were much more frequent in use in the liturgy during the medieval period of church history, but the numbers were drastically cut back in 1570. Today they occur prior to the Gospel Acclamation, but originally followed the Gospel Acclamation. Our third and final Sequence will occur on June 19 during the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, and we will use a paraphrase of the Sequence as well as the shortened form.

Saint Germaine Cousin | June 15

Saint Germaine was born in Pibrac, France in 1579 to poor parents. Her story is a heart wrenching one. She was born with a deformed right arm and hand, and her mother died when she was an infant. Her father remarried, but her stepmother brutally abused and neglected her. As a



child Germaine suffered from scrofula, a disfiguring form of tuberculosis which causes swelling and lesions on the side of the neck. Already sick, abused, and starving, she was forced to sleep in barn with sheep she tended.

Despite everything, Germaine lived each day tending her flock with joy and in prayer.. She shared what little she had and taught the children of the village about God's love. A rosary made of string knots was her constant companion. She attended Mass every day, leaving her sheep in care of guardian angels. Her flock was never attacked by wolves and never wandered. Some claimed to see the waters of the flooded river part so she could get to Mass. Germaine died at 22, her poor body was found by her father, in the

barn where she slept. She was buried in the village church. More than forty years later, her body was accidentally exhumed and found to be incorrupt. She was canonized by Pope Pius IX in 1867 and inscribed into the canon of virgins.


