God first loved us

hope this last edition of *The Indand See* for 2021 finds you and your loved ones healthy and growing in faith in our Lord lesus Christ.

This edition leads us through the celebration of Christmas and into the new year, a year that I have designated as a year of "Communion: Creed, worship and life." As we celebrate Christmas, I see an opportunity for us to reflect upon the Incarnation as the greatest moment of communion between God and humanity. Consider if you will that God did not have to choose to be born through the power of the Holy Spirit in the womb of the Virgin Mary, but He did in the person of Jesus who later revealed why: "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in Him might not perish but might have eternal life" (Jn 3:16).

Think about that for a moment, "for God so loved the world." As such, this primary love for us, as revealed to us, calls forth a response from us to either love or not love Him in return. When we do choose to love God, we are called do so as the great commandment says, "with all our heart, with all our mind and with all our soul." Sr. Augustine of Hippo offered great encouragement for us when he wrote, "To fall in love with God is the greatest romance; to seek Him the greatest adventure; to find Him, the greatest human achievement."

Now out of God's love, comes the crux of what we celebrate at Christmas, that God "gave his only Son ... so that we might have eternal life." God did so by incarnating Himself as "true God and true man" in Jesus Christ: The Incarnation was the grearest communion because it was the primal communion, it is what began the whole great plan of salvation in and through Jesus Christ. All other communion flows from that moment. Notice as well that this moment is Trinitarian: God, through the power of the Holy Spirit, became man in the person of Jesus. Subsequently, that communion becomes manifested in each of us at the moment of baptism, when we are born again and take on the new person of Christ.

During this time of Christmas and the beginning of the Year of Communion, my encouragement is for all of us to begin by praying and meditating on the fact that God first loved us and how we love Him in return. As baptized members of the Church, we share in its communion as community and as ones in communion through the sacraments. Loffer the words of Pope Leo the Great (c.400-461) from one of his Christmas homilies for your prayerful reflection:

"Our Savinur, deathy-beloved, was born inday: let us be glad. For there is no proper place for sadness, when we keep the birthday of the Life, which destroys the fear of mortality and



brings to us the joy of promised eternity. No one is kept from ibaring in this happiness. There is for all one common measure of joy, because as our Lord the destroyer of sin and deash finds none free from charge, so is He come to free us all. Let the sains exult in that he draws near to victory. Let the sinner be glad in that he is invited to pardon. Let the gentile take courage in that he is called to life. ..."

Joseph, The Man With Many Worries By Mary J. Joachim

There was a man and his name was Joseph, and he was hurrying toward the bus stop. He wasn't feeling too well and the temperature was below zero. The biting wind felt like knives piercing against his exposed skin. He had spent the whole night, before, worrying about the bills that he just knew were going to be piling up. His place of work was closing down in two weeks. Just before Christmas. Joseph worries that it may be necessary to pick up roots in order to find a new job, maybe even move to another state. Worst of all, how was he going to break this news to his wife and children? He felt infuriated and scared every time he thought about the prospect of losing his job. However, Joseph kept pushing himself to keep walking in spite of the cold, though he'd rather turn around, go home, and climb back into bed.

As Joseph returns home from work, he is worrying about uprooting his family. They love their little town so much. As he walks through the door his wife notices that her husband is hunched over a little. Though she isn't expecting what his news is going to be, Joseph sits her down and explains that his place of work is closing. He is stunned. She isn't upset, she looks peaceful. She says, "Joseph we must place all of our trust in God. He will help us in our time of need. We can't lose hope now." On the other hand, Joseph isn't so sure. He isn't sure of anything anymore. He needs to consider all of his options. After all, this Joseph is a man with many worries.

That night, as usual, he can't sleep. He sits in his recliner and turns on the television. He can't find a descent movie to watch so he switches to the news. News! It's always the same, very negative. Where's the hope in watching the news? There is always too much arguing and too much anger. No one can agree on anything. Joseph doesn't need that. He already feels anger deep in his soul. There's no sense in feeding it more junk. He switches off the television.

Next he reaches over and picks up the bible his wife was reading before she went to bed. He opens it and the mark she placed was at the narrative of the birth of Jesus. He touches the page and the name Joseph jumps out at him. St. Joseph, he thought, never had that many problems that God didn't solve for him. Didn't God always make the paths easy for St. Joseph? However, as he sits there it feels as if someone has rubbed glue all over his hand and pressed it to this page.

What he reads next will change his life forever. Yes, he has never stopped to think that St. Joseph, also, was a man with many worries. This is a new way for him to observe St. Joseph. As he continues reading, St. Joseph's faith jumps out at him. St. Joseph was a man with strong character and great trust in God.

He reads from the book of Matthew 1: 18-20,21, When his (Jesus) mother was betrothed to Joseph, but before they lived together, she was found with child through the holy Spirit. Joseph her husband, since he was a righteous man, yet unwilling to expose her to shame, decided to divorce her quietly. Such was his intention when, behold, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary your wife into your home.

For it is through the holy Spirit that this child has been conceived in her. She will bear a son and you are to name him Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins.

Next he reads from Matthew 2: 13,19, When they (Magi) had departed, behold, the angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream and said, "Rise, take the child and his mother, flee to Egypt....Herod is going to search for the child to destroy him....When Herod had died, behold, the angel of the Lord appeared in a dream to Joseph in Egypt and said, "Rise, take the child and his mother and go to the land of Israel for those who sought the child's life are dead."

His wife had placed, for a bookmark, a prayer card to St. Joseph from Saint Lawrence Seminary that would eventually become a part of his daily prayer: *Blessed Joseph, husband of Mary, be with us this day. You protected and cherished the Virgin; loving the Child Jesus as your son, you rescued him from danger and death. Defend the Church, the household of God, purchased by the blood of Christ. Guardian of the holy family, be with us in our trials. May your prayers obtain for us, the strength to flee from error and wrestle with the powers of evil, so that in this life we may grow in holiness and in death rejoice in the crown of victory. Amen.*

As he finishes the prayer his eyes are welling up with tears. He realizes that St. Joseph had to give up his carpentry shop as well as keep Mary and her unborn child safe, while traveling rough terrain to Bethlehem. He had to witness Jesus' birth in a stable, and he had to travel with his wife and newborn child to a country where he didn't even know the language. He did all this to accomplish the will of God. Yes, St. Joseph was a man with many worries and his worries came from being a husband, a father and his family's protector. Nevertheless, he was a man filled with great joy and trust. In resembling his wife Mary, he didn't question the will of God.
