The following are brief histories of each of the Churches that comprise the Parish of Saints Peter and Paul.

Saints Peter and Paul Church

Original Church:

215 Goldsborough Street

Easton, MD

Present Church:

1210 S. Washington Street

No regular Catholic services were held in Easton until after the Civil War. With the end of slavery, it became urgent that the land-owners and farmers make an effort to induce Irish and German immigrants to come to this area. Since many were of the Catholic faith, even the Protestants backed this movement and contributed financially towards getting a Parish set up and a church built. Among interested people were Mr. and Mrs. Howes Goldsborough, whose letters concerning the construction of this building, are extant. In 1866, a lot was purchased on Goldsborough Street at Aurora and construction was started, until the building was completed, services were held in the Odd Fellows Hall. The rectory, adjoining, wasn't completed until 1870.

The significance of this congregation has gone far beyond their regular church services.

The Jesuit fathers started a grade school in Easton, which has expanded to include a full High School term as well.

1764 - Fr. Joseph Mosley, S.J. was assigned to start a new mission; and on March 18, 1765, Fr. Mosley bought the plot of land from Parson Miller and his wife, and Sara Millington, which became Saint Joseph's in Cordova. For the next twenty-two years Fr. Mosley served Talbot, Queen Anne, Kent, Caroline, and Dorchester counties in Maryland, and Kent and Sussex counties in Delaware from St. Joseph.

1830 - Fr. Richard D. Hardey, S.J. wrote of the possibility of starting a church in Easton.

1840 - Fr. James F.M. Lucas, S.J. rented a hall in Easton and furnished it for Mass, and in 1842 he started a Catholic Total Temperance Society.

1840s - 1850's Fr. George King, S.J. served the area. Born in Laurel, Delaware, Fr. King was a widower whose son entered the Jesuits. Many other Jesuits served the area from St. Joseph's. Mention must be made of Fr. Edward Henchy who served from 1867 -1870 as a Jesuit and from 1874 -1878 as a diocesan Priest. (Fr. Henchy is buried at St. Peter's in Queenstown.) August 26, 1868 Fr. Henchy started the St. Joseph's Jousting Tournament. The first winner was S. W. Hopkins of Wye Mills.

Early 1860's Baltimore Archbishop John Martin Spalding sent the Redemptorists from Annapolis to Easton. Fr. William Gross, C.S.S.R. was designated as first "Pastor." In December 1866 under Redemptorist direction a church was started in Easton with the help of Howes Goldsborough (whose name appears on the border of our present altar) and Col. Henry May - the church was completed in 1868.

1874 - When the Jesuits left St. Joseph, it became a mission of St. Peter's in Queenstown until placed under the direction of Saints Peter and Paul in Easton, under Fr. William Temple in 1898. St. Joseph's in Cordova is the second oldest Catholic Church on the Eastern Shore (St. Francis Xavier, Old Bohemia, Warwick was started in 1704) and is the oldest Catholic Church in continuous use.

Bishop Thomas A. Becker, first bishop of Wilmington, set up a committee of Easton residents; Howes Goldsborough, Michael Nichols and Dr. Pierre O. Charbonnier - to make arrangements for a resident priest

at Easton and in September of 1878 newly ordained Fr. Edward L. Brady was appointed as a Pastor. Fr. Brady was the second Pastor (Redemptorist Fr. Gross later became Bishop of Savannah, Georgia).

1884 - Fr. John D. Carey, Pastor of Easton, started the first regular church services at Secretary, Maryland at Sherman's Institute. (St. Elizabeth's at Denton was started in 1831 by priests from St. Joseph's.)

1888 - 1889 Fr. Francis J. Connelly was Easton Pastor.

1889 - Fr. Edward G. Mickle rebuilt the church in Easton.

1889 - 1893 Fr. George L. Ott served Easton.

1893 - 1897 Fr. Thomas Francis Waldron was Pastor of Easton; he built the Church of Our Lady of Good Counsel, Secretary, and the Church of St. Mary, Refuge of Sinners at Cambridge while in Easton.

1898 - 1904 Fr. William G. Temple a great preacher was the Easton Pastor and enlarged St. Joseph's in 1903. Fr. Eugene Richard Murphy, 1909-1925, who served Oxford and St. Michaels from Easton, 1905-1909 - succeeded Fr. Charles P. McGoldrick, 1904-1905, and Fr. James C. Comiskey. Fr. Murphy died at Emergency Hospital, Easton, at the age of 45 on March 8, 1925.

1925-1936 & 1938-1969 - Easton was served by Rev. Msgr. Joseph H. Irwin, Pastor for 42 years. During Msgr. Irwin's term Saints Peter and Paul Elementary and High Schools were started in 1955 and 1958, and the Chapel of St. Michaels in St. Michaels was completed in 1969 (from 1964 until 1967, Mass was held at St. Michaels Firehouse; 1967-1969, at Christ Episcopal Church in St. Michaels).

During the two-year break in Msgr. Irwin's pastorate, 1936-1938, Fr. Leonard A. Regan was Pastor.

Fr. John J. Farrington succeeded Msgr. Irwin from 1969-1972. From 1972-1985, Fr. Howard T. Clark, former diocesan superintendent of schools, was Pastor followed by Fr. John J. Kavanaugh, Pastor from 1985-1987. From October of 1987 to June 1988, Fr. Paul F. Jennings, Jr. served as administrator of Saints Peter and Paul and was appointed Pastor in June 1988.

Fr. Farrington and Fr. Jennings were both Maryland State Police Chaplains.

In the early 1990s, the elementary school was doubled in size and a new high school building was erected.

In 1998, property was secured for a new church in Easton.

Father Robert E. Coine was pastor from 1999 to 2014. During his pastorate, many renovations and construction of a new church took place. This included complete renovation of the mission churches of St. Joseph's and St. Michael's, many upgrades and additions to both schools, the sale of SS. Peter and Paul Church on Goldsborough Street, ground-breaking for the new SS. Peter and Paul church in June 2003 with dedication on November 20, 2005, and construction of a new rectory. Father Coine retired in 2014.

St. Michael Mission Church

109 Lincoln Avenue
St. Michaels, MD

In 1964 the Catholics of St. Michaels and the adjacent areas held their first Mass in the loft of the St. Michaels Firehouse. Three ladies initiated this change: Julie Van Bibber originated the idea; Margaret Keyes discussed it

with the Bishop, stressing the distance from Tilghman Island to Easton; and Kathleen Turner arranged for use of the Firehouse through Ray Turner, the Fire Chief. This Mass was attended by thirteen Catholics - the nucleus around which grew the ambition to build the chapel.

For four years, Mass, celebrated by Monsignor Joseph Irwin and his assistants, was held weekly in the upstairs room of the old Firehouse. Without a doubt, this 5:30 p.m. Mass under a tin roof on a humid summer day was true penance - for priest and parishioners alike. One parishioner remarked, "It was hotter than the hubs of Hades."

The membership grew. By early 1965 attendance in the winter months averaged 70 people and virtually doubled during the summertime. Finally, a small group of dedicated people decided a chapel in St. Michaels was necessary - an enormous ambition for so small a congregation.

However, interest increased, enthusiasm spread and an ecumenical spirit developed, from which a beautiful project materialized and flourished. While thoughts of a Chapel were still in the talking stage, donations started to arrive. Among the earliest - perhaps the first - was a gift of \$5,000.00 from a non-Catholic friend in memory of his wife. Mr. Romaine Button recalled that the Maryland-Virginia Realty Company, developers of Rio Vista community, had offered three acres on Lincoln Avenue to any denomination willing to build a church. Mr. Button checked on the availability of the offer. The option was tenable. Five thousand dollars and three acres! Incredible!

In March of 1965 committees were formed and fundraising plans were drawn up; a bazaar to be held on the Christ Episcopal Church grounds and a bake sale were planned for July. Announcements in the Star Democrat publicized the activities, merchants gave their support, and local people and visitors responded enthusiastically. By August 1965 the total collected exceeded \$12,000. While this sum was far from the total needed, it was enough for Monsignor Irwin to give his approval to obtain building estimates.

The land, the money, the architect, essential components for the chapel were now available. To allow for possible future expansion Msgr. Irwin purchased three additional adjoining acres on Lincoln Avenue. The Building Committee comprised of Mrs. Gretchen Van Bourgondien, chairman; Mrs. Dorothy Button, secretary-treasurer; Mr. and Mrs. Gerard Lane and Mrs. Harold Heck. Four contractors submitted bids on the plans for the chapel.

On December 13, 1966, the John J. Raskob Foundation for Catholic Charities granted \$50,000 to the building project. This generous donation prompted Msgr. Irwin to write on December 30, 1966 to the Building Committee of the Wilmington Diocese. Following are excerpts:

".... We are now, I believe, in a financial position to go ahead with the project as soon as the necessary approval from the Diocesan authority is forthcoming. Since the estimated cost of \$103,000 was secured over a year ago, and since there seems to be no end to the increasing costs of construction, we fear that any further delay will add to our costs and thus our financial problems.

I am sure you can understand that our people now feel that their prayers have been answered; that their once remote dream is now on the verge of reality..."

The year of 1967 saw two important events. When offered the facilities of Christ Church, the St. Michaels congregation thankfully moved its celebration of the Mass from the Firehouse. On December 17, 1967, Alvin Walbridge was awarded the building contract.

Mrs. Van Bourgondien and Mrs. Button, with Msgr. Irwin's approval, made multiple decisions, established and maintained schedules, received money, sought donation, and wrote letters of recognition and appreciation. Their ambition was expressed in their motto: "When we open, we'll be debt-free!"

Through teamwork and astute business management they met this challenge. The Chapel, at a final cost of \$186,000 was debt-free when dedicated. The Wilmington Diocese made no monetary contribution.

On April 24, 1968 Monsignor Irwin and Father John Hynes broke ground for St. Michael's Chapel and comple-

tion was planned for January 1969.

On April 20, 1969 Thomas Mardaga, Bishop of Wilmington, dedicated the chapel. Year round the beautiful colonial building provides a place of worship for several hundred families and hundreds of summer visitors. It stands as a monument to the vision and enduring determination of a small group of people who made their dream a reality.

St. Joseph Mission Church

Old St. Joseph's Church was established in 1765 by Father Joseph Mosley as St. Joseph's Mission. Father Albert Peters was the last resident Jesuit pastor when, in 1864, the Mission was transferred to the Diocese of Wilmington.

Tuckahoe, after the Indian tribe inhabiting this area, was the original name of the district in which Father Mosley established his residence and built the church. His correspondence is inscribed, "Tuckahoe, on Wye River, and St. Joseph's Talbot County Head of Wye."

Vessels from London used to anchor in the Wye, three miles from his house, and the Captains executed commissions for him and took care of letters to and from England. But this means of communication was only occasional and uncertain, so Father Mosley directed that letters to him should be addressed in care of Father Harding, at Philadelphia, 110 miles away. When postal facilities were increased, many years later, the catalogue of the Province gave the address: "Wye Mills P.O. and Cordova P.O."

The Priest's residence was in a lonely rural spot and there was not a Catholic living within six miles of it. The Mission, in the days of Father Mosley, and for years afterwards was very extensive, embracing ten counties. In later years, it was restricted to the charge of Talbot, Caroline, and Queen Anne's Counties.

At the time of the surrender of the Mission to the Wilmington Diocese, the stations depending upon St. Joseph's were Denton and Easton. Denton, where there was a wooden church, was ten miles away, and Easton, the county town of Talbot, was a greater distance. The parish priest now resides at the latter place, from which St. Joseph's is attended as a station.

Father Joseph Moseley was a native of Lincolnshire, England, born November 16, 1731. He studied at St. Omers, and entered the Jesuit Society in 1748. Coming to Maryland in 1758, he labored for some time in Charles and St. Mary's counties and, in 1765, he founded the Mission of St. Joseph's and remained in sole charge of that "arduous station" until his death on June 3, 1787.

The 350-acre farm surrounding St. Joseph's was held until 1882, when it was sold to John P. Steele. The Church and a few acres surrounding it, were retained.

In 1848 some alterations and changes were made to the Church but to what extent is not definitely known. While searching through the records of St. Joseph's Church, papers were found asking parishioners to subscribe to the fund. The paper was hung at the rear of the church and read as follows:

"The church was built in the year 1782, by Father Joseph Mosley, of the Society of Jesus. It is now not only too small for the congregation, but also needs repairs. A record will be kept at the church in which will be inscribed names of those who contributed and the sums which they subscribed."

The cemetery adjoining the church is almost as old as the church itself. Records of Father Mosley's record that Mr. Charles Seth was the first person to be buried on these grounds on January 3, 1767.

St. Joseph's remodeled in its present design in 1900, is the oldest Catholic Church in existence on the Eastern Shore of Maryland.

Eucharistic Revival

Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist

From the very beginning, the Church has believed and celebrated according to the teaching of Jesus himself: Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life and I will raise him on the last day. For my flesh is true food, and my blood is true drink. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him (Jn 6:54-56), It is not "ordinary bread and ordinary drink" that we receive in the Eucharist, but the flesh and blood of Christ, who came to nourish and transform us, to restore our relationship to God and to one another.

In the Eucharist, with the eyes of faith we see before us Jesus Christ, who, in the Incarnation became flesh (Jn 1:14) and who in the Paschal Mystery gave himself for us (Ti 2:14), accepting even death on a cross (Phil 2:8), St John Chrysostom preached that when you see the Body of Christ "set before you [on the altar], say to yourself: Because of this Body I am no longer earth and ashes, no longer a prisoner, but free: because of this I hope for heaven, and to receive the good things therein, immortal life, the portion of angels, [and closeness] with Christ."

How can Jesus Christ be truly present in what still appears to be bread and wine? In the liturgical act known as the epiclesis, the bishop or priest, speaking in the person of Jesus Christ, calls upon the Father to send down his Holy Spirit to change the bread and wine into the Body and Blood of Christ, and this change occurs through the institution narrative, by the power of the words of Christ pronounced by the celebrant.

The reality that, in the Eucharist, bread and wine become the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Christ without ceasing to appear as bread and wine to our five senses is one of the central mysteries of the Catholic faith. This faith is a doorway through which we, like the saints and mystics before us, may enter into a deeper perception of the mercy and love manifested in and through Christ's sacramental presence in our midst. While one thing is seen with our bodily eyes, another reality is perceived through the eyes of faith. The real, true, and substantial presence of Christ in the Eucharist is the most profound reality of the sacrament. "This mysterious change is very appropriately called by the Church transubstantiation." Though Christ is present to us in many ways in the liturgy, including in the assembly gathered, the presiding minister, and the word proclaimed, the Church also clearly affirms that "the mode of Christ's presence under the Eucharistic species is unique." As St. Paul VI wrote, "This presence is called 'real' not to exclude the idea that the others are 'real' too, but rather to indicate presence par excellence, because it is substantial and through it Christ becomes present whole and entire, God and man." In the sacramental re-presentation of his sacrifice, Christ holds back nothing, offering himself, whole and entire. The use of the word "substantial" to mark the unique presence of Christ in the Eucharist is intended to convey the totality of the gift he offers to us.

When the Eucharist is distributed and the minister says, "the Body of Christ," we are to look not simply at what is visible before our eyes, but at what it has become by the words of Christ and the gift of the Holy Spirit-the Body of Christ. The communicant's response of "Amen" is a profession of faith in the Real Presence of Christ and reflects the intimate personal encounter with him, with his gift of self, that comes through reception of Holy Communion.

Our ROOTS**

**Our “Founding Mother”
St. Elizabeth Ann Seton**

Elizabeth Ann Bayley was born in 1774 to a prominent Episcopalian family and discovered Catholicism while in Italy. Elizabeth entered the Catholic Church in 1805.



St. Elizabeth Ann Seton

In 1809, after a number of difficult years as a young widow with five children, Elizabeth founded the first community for religious women established in the United States: the Sisters of Charity of St. Joseph’s. In 1811 the community adopted the rules and constitution of St. Vincent de Paul.

At her death in 1821 there were more than twenty communities of Sisters of Charity conducting free schools, orphanages, boarding-schools, and hospitals. Her legacy includes religious congregations whose members continue to serve the needs of people living in poverty to this day.

“Mother” Seton was Canonized in 1975, and is the first citizen born in the United States to be given the title of Saint. Her remains are entombed in Emmitsburg, Md.

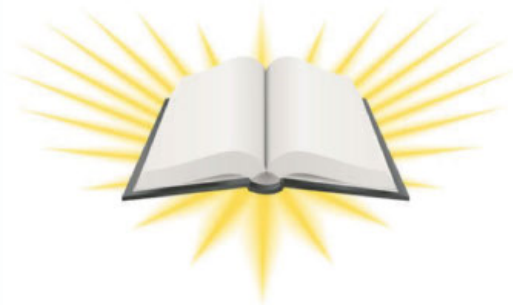

RCIA

What is it?

The RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults), also called the Catechumenate, is a process of initiation into the Catholic Community of Faith for persons who are experiencing a conversion in their lives and seeking either Christian baptism in the Catholic Church or full Communion with the Catholic tradition of Eucharist and Confirmation.

It is a process which enables the study of the Gospels, Catholic Christian teaching, the acceptance of Christian values and morality, the development and deepening of a life of prayer and action with the support and involvement of the local Catholic community. The RCIA is more than a course of instruction. It is a process of conversion, designed to meet the unique and individual needs of the participants.

Who is RCIA for?

- **Non-Catholics who want to find out more about the Catholic faith.**
 - **Those who seek baptism through the Catholic faith.**
 - **Those who were baptized in the Catholic Church, did not complete the sacraments, and were uncatechized.**

What is RCIA like?

RCIA candidates and the team meet weekly throughout the school year ~ September through May. The Thursday evening meetings are relaxed, include a study pertaining to Catholic teaching or topics of faith, followed by or beginning with a social time. The Deacons and Clergy often join us.

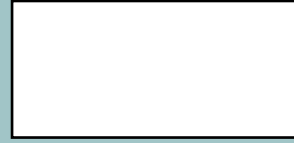

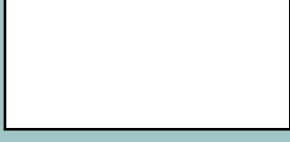


