MESSAGE FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Parishioners and Extended Family Members,

Praised be Jesus Christ!

I hope you have had the chance to enjoy your summer. Pope Francis, during one of his Sunday Reflections, known as the Angelus, mentioned how Summer is the perfect time to grow closer in relationship to Jesus Christ since our more practical concerns are naturally lessened during this time.

Within a parish's church, the sacraments of Holy Communion, Confession, Baptism, and Matrimony are traditionally celebrated. When we think of planning for the sacraments, weddings come immediately to mind. Planning is also involved for baptisms. Minimal planning goes into preparing for Confession and Communion since no appointments are required. But what about the Anointing of the Sick?

For many centuries, Catholics have associated this sacrament with the dying. Why? Because the forgiveness of sins takes place when the sacrament is received. Therefore, it is assumed that the person about to die will, therefore, have a better "outcome" on Judgement Day. It is as if the sacrament is an insurance policy rather than being what all sacraments are supposed to be, an affective encounter with our loving, merciful, and compassionate God aided by our senses since earthly means are used to convey them.

Because the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick does convey God's love, mercy and compassion through the olive oil administered by the priest, it is intended that its benefits are to be enjoyed by the person who receives it IN THIS LIFE. The Sacrament of Anointing, like all sacraments, is meant for the living. Of course, I will do my best to offer the sacrament in an emergency, but I write this to discourage that waiting be done purposely.

Therefore, the message that I wish to pass on to you is that I, along with Holy Mother Church, respectfully ask that you do not treat this sacrament like an insurance policy with benefits to be saved for the Day of Final Judgement. Please use occasions that naturally occur for the sacrament to be given when it is not an emergency. Times that are good for this sacrament are after a daily Mass, making an appointment with a priest, or attendance at a Mass that offers the Anointing of the Sick after its conclusion, or attendance at a Mass that you have told the priest you will be attending so he may offer the sacrament to you after that Mass.

If this sounds like an opportunity that will benefit you, please make plans accordingly now, so you will not have to worry if a priest is available later.

Collaborative Covid 19 Protocol Update

- We no longer require parishioners to sign up for Mass.
- As of May 29, masks are no longer required for vaccinated people in the State of Massachusetts. The State does advise that non-vaccinated people continue to wear masks. People are free to continue to wear a mask as long as they like and will be respected if they choose to do so. Every parishioner and family is expected to make a sound, reasonable decision about mask-wearing and social distancing.

- The same pattern for the reception of Communion will be used.
- Eucharistic Ministers will be wearing masks during Communion.

we might establish peace and equality for all in our + communities.


