2021 STATE OF THE PARISH REPORT



The State of the Parish Report was published and mailed earlier this month. All parishioners should have received a mailed copy and it is also available in the Narthex and on the parish website (scan the QR code below). This report includes the current pastoral and financial status of our parish. Together, united in prayer, abounding in service and generous in our financial support we have much to be grateful for in calling St. Thomas More Parish our spiritual home.

Last year we launched our multi-year parish mission of *Building Our Community of Faith and Service*. In spite of another challenging year, we have done more than persevere. We have thrived. It is evident in almost every aspect of parish life. From new family registrations, to pre-school enrollment, to sacraments received, to Mass attendance - we are setting records across the board. Just recently, the Women's Circle held our first parish social since the pandemic began, and the Wine Tasting event was completely sold out a week early! It is such a joy to be back together again and to be welcoming so many new parishioners as active participants in the life of our parish.

Our increasing numbers and all of our ever-expanding ministries means we make full use, day and night, of our campus facilities. The Annex, the building between the rectory and the Church, is booked 5 nights a week. Happiness Preschool occupies every available classroom in our school building during the day, and Religious Education and our Youth Ministry use all the same spaces 4 afternoons during the week and on Sundays. On many evenings, the lights are on in the Parish Office building hosting the various councils and ministry meetings. Even the Great Lawn has provided tented meeting space during the Covid pandemic.

All of our buildings are in need of some level of capital investment. We have begun a thorough needs assessment, and are formulating a strategic plan to ensure our facilities keep pace with demand. Some of these investments will be financed by the St. Thomas More Fund. This Fund,



or parish savings account, was launched in 2012, and through the generosity of our parishioners over the years has grown to \$550,000. I have two requests this year. Please consider giving to the St Thomas More Fund by making a one-time gift or regularly participating in the monthly collection. My second request is for the offertory. Last year at this time we were in the middle of an increased offertory program. Your response to that initiative was exceptional. Our offertory collection has rebounded and while we are not at our historical contribution levels, we are improving. Many of you made one-time gifts to the offertory at this time last year. I would greatly appreciate you considering doing the same again this year.

I am extraordinarily grateful for your sharing with me in the work Christ has given all of us to do, "Go out and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey all that I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, even to the end of time." (Mt 28:19-20)

LITURGICAL MINISTERS NEEDED


Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion

The EMHC is a lay member of the faithful who has been appointed to help distribute Holy Communion when a sufficient number of ordinary ministers (clergy) are not present, available or when the celebrant has determined that pastoral need requires their help based on the size of congregation celebrating Mass. Parishioners are commissioned to serve as Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion after completing the mandated diocesan training.

Liturgy of the Word: Readers

When the Sacred Scriptures are read in the Church, God himself speaks to his people, and Christ, present in His word, proclaims the Gospel. The one who serves as a reader in Liturgy of the Word during Mass is the person designated to proclaim Sacred Scripture (with the exception of the Gospel). This person would also proclaim the psalm response (in the absence of a cantor), and the Universal Prayer or, as it is commonly known, the Prayer of the Faithful (in the absence of a deacon). 

EXHIBIT ON EUCHARISTIC MIRACLES



When Fran Bifulco of St. Jude Church heard about Blessed Carlo Acustis, the I5-year-old who documented Eucharistic miracles around the world before dying of leukemia, something stirred in her heart. She began researching the Italian teenager, whose cause for sainthood is before the Vatican, and learned about the exhibit he created, which has been viewed in

dozens of countries across five continents and in thousands of parishes and university campuses.

Through her efforts, the Vatican International Exhibit of Eucharistic Miracles, designed and created by Acutis, will be on display at St. Jude Church, 707 Monroe Turnpike on Saturday, January 22 from 1:00PM - 6:00PM and on Sunday, January 23 from 8:00AM - 2:00PM.

Because of his intense love of the Blessed Sacrament, he used his computer skills to document Eucharistic miracles throughout the centuries. He spent four years on the project, which was made into an exhibit after his death and has been received praise throughout Europe and the United States.

Bifulco said that Acutis, who was born in England and raised in Italy, was an ordinary teenager with a special love for Jesus. He played soccer, enjoyed computer games and doing practical jokes. He was declared blessed on October 10, 2020 after a miracle in Brazil was attributed to his intercession, and in a short time, he has earned the nicknames of "God's influencer," "Cyber-apostle of the Eucharist" and the "First Millennial Saint."

As an amateur computer programmer, Acutis was able to catalog the miracles before he died, and they can be found on a website he designed: **miracolieucaristici.org**. The website has been translated into 17 languages, including Vietnamese and Swahili.

The exhibit consists of 159 panels with photographs and historical descriptions that provide a virtual visit to the places where the miracles occurred and prove that Jesus is really and truly present, Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity in the Blessed Sacrament.

She said that ever since Acutis made his first Holy Communion he was in love with the Eucharist and received it as often as possible, in addition to praying the rosary every day because of his devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary.

Acutis loved Assisi and would often go there. In the tradition of St. Francis of Assisi, he used his money to buy sleeping bags, which he distributed to the homeless living on the streets.

He died of leukemia in 2006 at 15, and his body was interred at Assisi. It was later exhumed and put in a tomb in the Church of Santa Maria Maggiore in Assisi. His heart, which is considered a relic after his beatification, is in a reliquary in the Basilica of St. Francis of Assisi.

"Carlo was well-aware that the whole apparatus of communications, advertising and social networking can be used to lull us, to make us addicted to consumerism and buying the latest thing on the market, obsessed with our free time, caught up in negativity," the pope wrote. "Yet he knew how to use the new communications technology to transmit the Gospel, to communicate values and beauty."
