



Did you know....

February 2nd is significant in several ways.

- Among the many feasts in the Christian calendar, the **Feast of the Presentation** is one of the oldest. "...on the fortieth day, Joseph and Mary brought the Lord into the Temple..." **Jesus —"the Light of the World"**
- **Candlemas Day** became a day in Christianity when Christians would take their candles to the church to be blessed. By placing candles in their windows, they felt blessings would be brought to their household for the remaining winter.
- During a plague in the sixth century in Constantinople, the emperor ordered huge prayer processions with candles during the Feast of the Presentation to ask God for deliverance from the disease. After the plague passed, the celebration of Candlemas spread throughout Europe.
- As time passed, the day took on another interpretation. The following English folksong highlights the idea of weather prognostication.

*"If Candlemas be fair and bright,
Come, Winter, have another flight;
If Candlemas brings clouds and rain,
Go Winter, and come not again."*

In Germany, an animal was introduced, and according to German lore, if a hedgehog saw his shadow on Candlemas Day, there would be a "Second Winter" or 6 more weeks of bad weather. As Germans came to America, namely Pennsylvania, so to came their folklore. In Punxsutawney, PA, in 1886, a groundhog was chosen to help predict the weather and thus **Groundhog Day** came about.

Even though Groundhog Day is a day to take everything a little less seriously and break up the winter monotony, let us not forget the importance of The Feast of the Presentation in our lives.

FEAST OF ST. BLAISE

February 3 is the feast of St. Blaise, Bishop, Martyr and the patron saint of throat illnesses. Saint Blaise's protection of those with throat troubles apparently comes from a legend that a boy was brought to him who had a fishbone stuck in his throat. The boy was about to die when Saint Blaise healed him.

The traditional blessing of throats **will not** take place as in the past due to COVID-19 restrictions.

A general blessing will take place at all Masses instead.

COLLECTION FOR PRIESTS' RETIREMENT

This year on Ash Wednesday the parishes of our diocese will begin an annual collection to support the retirement needs of our diocesan priests. In 2019 a committee appointed by Bishop McManus examined the suitability and sustainability of retirement benefits for our retired diocesan priests. The annual health insurance and housing costs along with monthly stipends for our retired priests have recently been running from \$2.2 - \$2.6 million. Even with revenue from Celebrate Priesthood, Partners in Charity, the Legacy of Hope Capital Campaign, the endowments from the Forward in Faith Capital Campaign, parish assessments, and other restricted funds and donations, the costs of caring for our 50+ retired priests exceeds our revenue, in 2020 by \$266,810. After reviewing the committee's report and receiving input from the priests of our diocese, Bishop McManus is instituting an annual Ash Wednesday Collection for Priest Retirement as one part of the diocese's renewed efforts to care for our retired priests. Please consider a donation to the Ash Wednesday Collection to support those who have given their lives in service to the people of the Diocese of Worcester. Through the relationships and interactions of service activities in the community and class trips to other environs, students get to practice the values they learn in their Catholic education and experience what it feels like to be making the world a better place. Plus they get a chance to observe others in community service and come to appreciate how they can continue caring for others their entire lives. Today, be an example of service to others.

FEAST OF THE PRESENTATION OF THE LORD

Teach a faith that grows on you

Mary and Joseph bring their beloved firstborn to the temple at the appointed time, so Jesus can enter into the covenant with Yahweh that Jews have revered since Abraham. Not unlike infant Baptism today, it was—among other things—a powerful ritual of belonging that put the child on the right path to growing in faith. As we celebrate Catholic Schools Week—with the focus today being squarely on "the student"—may we never forget or neglect the promise of every young soul, so receptive to our efforts to plant the seeds of faith.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Malachi 3:1-4; Hebrews 2:14-18; Luke 2:22-40 (524).* "The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom."

One nation, under God

Catholic schools have made a unique contribution to the nation, and today we can recognize and celebrate that contribution. At their very best, Catholic schools train students to grow both as members of the Catholic church and as productive citizens of the nation. By "rendering to Caesar and to God," Catholic schools in the United States have managed to achieve that rare combination in world history, the development of a relatively harmonious church-state relationship that has endured for centuries. Line things up

Catholic schools prepare students to discover their vocation, so they can grow to use their gifts in service of church and world. Over the years, our notion of "vocation" has broadened significantly. A word that once designated those who take religious vows or are ordained into ministry is now used more broadly. No one defined vocation better than essayist and theologian Carl Frederick Buechner: "The place God calls you to is the place where your deep gladness and the world's deep hunger meet." Are the two aligned in your life? And if not, how can you bring them into alignment?

TODAY'S READINGS: *Hebrews 12:18-19, 21-24; Mark 6:7-13 (326).* "Jesus summoned the Twelve and began to send them out two by two."

Thank those who opened your mind

Where would any of us be without our teachers? They did everything from helping us with our "three R's" to opening our minds to new ways of seeing the world. The really great teachers taught us how to learn for ourselves and thus set us up for a lifetime of discovery and fulfillment. When was the last time you thanked a teacher? Today is the day Catholic Schools Week pays special attention to the faculty, staff, and volunteers that make it possible for these great schools to function. Make faith a family affair

The Second Vatican Council called the family "the domestic church" because it is in the home that faith is first formed and nurtured. Whether you live alone or with others, your home can be a sacred space of prayer and spirituality. Creating sacred space in your home includes prayer and scripture readings at meal times and before bed; praying the Rosary; placing a crucifix in a prominent place; and family traditions based on the liturgical seasons.
