



A LETTER FROM BISHOP McMANUS

My dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

In recent months we have witnessed millions of people across our country and our world receive one of the COVID-19 vaccines. I join with our Holy Father in rejoicing that amidst “the darkness and uncertainty of the pandemic” this light of hope has appeared.¹

I also join with my brother Bishops in encouraging everyone to get the vaccine whenever it becomes available to you. As both the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith and the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops have made clear, the reception of the presently available vaccines is morally justifiable and ought to be seen as “an act of charity toward the other members of our community.”²

Despite these clear signs of hope, however, the best scientific projections suggest that it will probably be many months before the impact of these vaccinations has a significant effect in abating the spread of COVID-19.

With a deep sense of longing for that day when we can worship freed of the present restrictions, most notably regarding the limitations on the size of our liturgical assemblies, I ask you to join me in praying for those researchers and health care workers who will make that blessed day come to be.

Conscious, however, that it is not possible under the present circumstances for us to accommodate the full number of Pope Francis, Urbi et Orbi, December 25, 2020.

For nearly a year we have prayed daily for “the faith to endure this hour.” As we enter the penitential season of Lent, may our Blessed Lord, who wept tears of blood in the Garden of Gethsemane and offered himself on the altar of the Cross for our salvation, give us the faith that he is not far from us on this way of sorrows. May he give us the graces we need to follow him, ever trusting in “the Son of Righteousness, who rises with healing in his wings.”³

A LETTER FROM BISHOP McMANUS

February 4, 2021

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

One of my great joys as your Bishop is to work with so many dedicated priests who have served you and our diocese faithfully throughout their lives. One of my weighty responsibilities is to care for them in their old age.

I write to ask your support for the new Ash Wednesday Collection that will assist the retired priests of the Diocese of Worcester. Unlike the December collection for Retired Religious which supports sisters, brothers and priests of religious orders throughout the country, the Ash Wednesday collection will be dedicated to those priests ordained for the Diocese of Worcester who do not benefit from the December collection.

We currently have 50 retired priests. In the next nine years an additional 42 priests will reach the retirement age of 75. Our annual costs for health insurance, housing and monthly stipends for retired priests have recently run between \$2.2 million - \$2.6 million. While Partners in Charity, Celebrate Priesthood and the endowments from Forward in Faith and Legacy of Hope have and will continue to support priest retirement, we have had annual shortfalls in funding to meet those obligations.

We recently made changes to retirement benefits for priests who have not yet retired. Those measures are expected to save up to \$12 million through 2050. However, in the short run, deficits up to \$374,000 per year are projected through 2031. The purpose of the Ash Wednesday collection is to help eliminate those deficits and strengthen the sustainability of decent care for our retired priests.

Our retired priests have cared for us and our families throughout the decades. Please consider beginning this Lent with a sacrificial gift to the Ash Wednesday Collection on February 17 to support our retired priests.

I am very grateful for your support of all of our Diocesan efforts and for your consideration of this request. Thank you and God bless you.

PREPARE FOR LENT

What does it mean to Fast?

To fast is to do without food. Its purpose is to experience the effects of not eating. It also serves to be a penance or a sacrifice.—for the purpose of strengthening us. When we don't eat, we get hungry. When we get hungry, we have a heightened sense of awareness. In this state, we are more apt to ask God to purify us and prepare us to pray more deeply.

What does it mean to Abstain?

To abstain is to not eat meat on Ash Wednesday and all the Fridays of Lent. Its purpose is to be an act of penance—an act of sacrifice. Of course not eating meat and then having a more enjoyable meal instead would defeat the purpose. Some people do not eat meat so it is not an issue for them. Maybe abstaining from a meal you really want would be a sacrifice. Many people in the world cannot afford or do not have access to meat. Abstaining from meat can put us in solidarity with them.

Unique Lenten Program to do at home

Watch with Me is an online Lenten experience for adults - a brief time each week to stop, rest, reflect, listen, and pray a little. **Each Sunday evening during Lent** you will receive a link to participate *at your convenience* during the week - no meetings, no schedule. Each activity will include a little music and one or two short reflective prayers requiring 15-20 minutes of your time on your mobile phone, tablet, or computer. MEMORIAL OF JEROME EMILIANI, PRIEST-Share the love to feel the love

Who hasn't felt all alone before? Perhaps let down or left by a loved one. Perhaps in such dire straits that you thought even God abandoned you. Jerome Emiliani is the saint for those low points. He found God in ultimate isolation—prison. Once free, he became a priest and devoted himself to the abandoned of 16th-century Venice—especially orphans and prostitutes. When you feel stricken with an orphan spirit, remember that you are a beloved child of a loving Creator who will never let you go. Show that same love to those who need you most.

Gregory XV became pope by "popular acclaim" on this day in 1621—interesting, because he changed the tradition soon after. Instead, Gregory made the case for the first secret ballot when electing a pope. He also did other remarkable things, considering his papacy lasted barely two years. He established the first missionary organization of the Vatican, the Congregation for the Propagation of the Faith. And he canonized these beloved saints: Ignatius of Loyola, Teresa of Avila, Francis Xavier, and Philip Neri. Is there a change you've been meaning to make in your own practice of the faith? MEMORIAL OF SCHOLASTICA, VIRGIN-God's assistance rains down

There are few details of Saint Scholastica's early life, but we do know that this sister of Benedict of Nursia entered religious life and lived in a women's monastery a few miles from her brother's in Monte Cassino. Perhaps the most enduring story about Scholastica is one that pits her will against her brother's when she begs him to extend their yearly visit and spend the night in prayer and conversation. Benedict resists, not wishing to break his own rule with a night away from home. Determined, Scholastica asks God for assistance, and a torrential rainstorm ensues that settles the matter in her favor—Benedict will spend the night. Never doubt that you are worthy to ask for God's help. Trust your heart to know what will draw you closer to God.

MEMORIAL OF OUR LADY OF LOURDES-Turn to Mary

Much of Jesus' ministry had to do with some form of healing, and today's memorial, Our Lady of Lourdes, recognizes Mary's 18 reported appearances in Lourdes, France, a place of pilgrimage known for healing powers. Millions of people a year travel to Lourdes in search of healing; many report spiritual peace and transformation, and a handful even report experiencing cures without medical explanation. Today is also World Day of the Sick. It's an ideal day to ask Mary to intercede on behalf of healing that we need—or that our friends and loved ones desire.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Genesis 2:18-25; Mark 7:24-30 (332). "Soon a woman whose daughter had an unclean spirit heard about him. She came and fell at his feet."*

Friday, Feb 12, 2021

Say their name

This day, falling between World Day of the Sick and Valentine's Day, brings thoughts of how many are left alone after COVID deaths. Advertisers are pushing candy, cards, and flowery bouquets, but the countercultural church also counsels that we pay kind attention to those who are grieving. Practical actions are often most helpful: not only shoveling a driveway or baking some bread, but also reaching out and just listening to whatever is on the grieving person's heart. Sometimes all a grieving person wants is to name the beloved and talk about them again. Being a good listener is a welcome gift.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Genesis 3:1-8; Mark 7:31-37 (333). "They were exceedingly astonished and they said, 'He has done all things well.'"*

OPTIONAL MEMORIAL OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY-Saturdays belong to Mary

For more than a thousand years, the Catholic Church has dedicated most Saturdays to the Blessed Virgin Mary. The reason for choosing Saturday above all other days has been lost to antiquity. But according to tradition, Saturday has been set aside to celebrate the maternal example of Mary and witness to her dedicated discipleship as a woman of God and a follower of Jesus. The weekly memorial serves as a reminder that she is continuously present and operative in the life of the church. Reflect on how the Blessed Virgin Mary has been present and active in your life.
