FROM THE DESK OF FATHER DERIVAN

How very often—probably several times every day—we recite the Lord’s Prayer, the Our Father. And how often we say those final words. “Deliver us from evil.” And that evil of which the Lord speaks is the evil one, the devil. Our gospel speaks about the Lord Jesus delivering a man from an unclean spirit. The Lord, the gospel says, rebukes the spirit and that, of course, is the devil. The Lord Jesus casts out the devil. Evil has met its match. The Lord Jesus is stronger than the devil, stronger than all evil. And He promises to deliver us from evil and give us peace.

For many people, this gospel story is a fantasy. Our world does not like to talk about evil and it certainly does not like to talk about the devil. We like to think that we are in absolute control of our lives. How foolish that is! The devil is around us, tempting, tricking, disguising himself in so many ways. The great Christian writer C.S. Lewis wrote a book called *“The Screwtape Letters.”* It is a make believe story of a senior devil, Screwtape giving instructions to younger devils as they begin their work of tempting. And the senior devil remarks that the greatest sign of the devil’s success is that people today do not even think he exists. Then the devil has a great opportunity. Even good people can get off their guard, thinking that the devil is not around, and then how quickly he can tempt us. The Bible calls the devil “the father of lies.” And he is good at lying. He can twist our thoughts. He is good at his business and the gospel calls the devil’s business “uncleanliness.” As our gospel says today, he is the unclean spirit. The devil’s business is to create uncleanliness, to mess up the clean, beautiful image of God within us. Uncleanliness means polluting the soul and tempting us to fall into the devil’s lies, making us forget about God. Does the devil exist? Does he continue to try to tempt us, to create uncleanliness with his lies? How else can we explain how a young person from a good family gets involved in drugs of which we are seeing an upsurge once again? How else can a person convince himself or herself that abortion is alright, that taking the precious life of a child is a matter of choice? Is that not the devil twisting our thoughts. Make no mistake—the devil is not what we see in horror movies. The devil does not want to scare us, quite the opposite. He wants to attract people with his deceiving lies. He wants to create uncleanliness in our minds. Make no mistake—the devil is alive and well.

But then our gospel emphasizes the second point. Jesus is more powerful than the devil. He expels the unclean spirit. He delivers us from evil. If some people fall into the trap of thinking the devil does not exist, other people fall into the trap of thinking that the devil is almost equal to God. The devil, after all, is a creature, a fallen angel. He is not as strong as we think. He has no power over people, only the power that people let him have. He can trick us into thinking that drugs or abortion or child abuse or prejudice are alright, but it is we who accept this tricking. The devil creates uncleanliness in people’s lives but only if people let him.

Dear friends, remember that the Lord Jesus is the enemy of the devil and, in a sense, so too must we be. We must resist evil and we must conquer evil with good. We must battle with evil just as Jesus did. Remember, the devil is in a losing fight. It may seem that he is winning at times, but Jesus has conquered all evil by dying for us on the Cross. Every time we see the Cross, remember the devil’s days are numbered. Jesus delivers us from all evil.

The unclean spirit in the gospel obeys the power of Jesus. He says, “I know who you are, the Holy One of God,” We too know who Jesus is, God’s Son who loves us at every moment. He is always saying to us, “Do not be afraid. I will deliver you from every evil.” Please God we have enough trust to say, “Jesus, I know who you are, my Lord and my God.”

**FEBRUARY 3  
ST. BLAISE**

St. Blaise was born in Sebastia, Asia Minor now Sivas, Turkey and died there around the year 316. He was an early Christian bishop and martyr, one of the most popular medieval saints. He is venerated as the patron saint of sufferers from throat diseases.

According to tradition, Blaise was of noble birth and, after being educated in the Christian faith, was made bishop of Sebastia. Although Christianity had been adopted about 300 AD as the state religion in Armenia, the Roman emperor Licinius began a persecution of the Christians, and Blaise was discovered and apprehended. While imprisoned, he miraculously cured a boy from fatally choking. After tortured, Blaise was beheaded.

Numerous miracles were attributed to him, including the cure of diseased beasts during his refuge, thus accounting for his also being the patron saint of wild animals. He was venerated as the patron of sufferers from throat diseases in the East by the 6th century and in the West by the 9th century.

The blessing of throats through the intercession of St. Blaise is a ceremony practiced and celebrated on his feast day, February 3. Two candles are blessed and touched to the throats of the faithful. This blessing may be administered by a priest, a deacon, or a lay minister. In art Blaise’s symbols are wax, taper, iron combs (the supposed instruments of his passion), or two crossed candles. Often also he is sometimes represented in a cave with animals recalling the time during his persecution when he lived in a cave which was a shelter for wild animals.



## FOURTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

---

### MESSAGE OF OUR HOLY FATHER POPE FRANCIS FOR THIS SUNDAY

This Sunday's Gospel reading (cf. Mk 1:21-28) is part of a wider narrative called the "day in Capernaum". At the heart of today's reading is the event of the exorcism through which Jesus is presented as a powerful prophet in word and deed.

He enters the Synagogue of Capernaum on a Saturday and he begins teaching. The people are astonished by his words because they are not ordinary words. They do not sound like the ones they are accustomed to hearing. The Scribes in fact teach but without any authority. And Jesus teaches with authority. Jesus instead teaches like one who has authority, thus revealing himself as God's Emissary, and not a simple man who has to base his teaching solely on earlier traditions. Jesus has full authority. His doctrine is new and the Gospel says that the people commented: "A new teaching! With authority."

At the same time, Jesus reveals himself to be powerful also in deeds. In the Synagogue of Capernaum, there is a man who is possessed by an unclean spirit which manifests itself by shouting these words: "What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are, the Holy One of God." The devil tells the truth: Jesus came to destroy the devil, to ruin the demon, to defeat him. This unclean spirit knows the power of God and he also proclaims his holiness. Jesus rebukes him saying: "Be silent, and come out of him!" These few words from Jesus are enough to obtain victory over Satan, who comes out of that man "convulsing him and crying out in a loud voice", the Gospel says.

This makes a strong impression on those present. Everyone is overcome by fear and asks themselves: "What is this? He commands even the unclean spirits and they obey him." The power of Jesus confirms the authority of his teaching. He does not just speak with words, but he takes action. In this way, he manifests God's plan with words and with the power of his deeds. In the Gospel in fact, we see that in his earthly mission, Jesus reveals the love of God both through preaching and through countless gestures of attention and aid to the sick, the needy, children and sinners.

Jesus is our Teacher, powerful in word and deed. Jesus imparts to us all the light that illuminates the sometimes dark paths of our lives. He also transmits to us the necessary strength to overcome difficulties, trials and temptations. Let us consider what a great grace it is for us to have known this God who is so powerful and so good! A teacher and a friend who shows us the path and takes care of us especially when we are in need.

May the Virgin Mary, the woman of listening, help us to create silence around us and within us, in order to hear, through the din of the messages of the world, the most authoritative word that there is: that of her Son Jesus who proclaims the meaning of our existence and delivers us from all slavery, even that of the Evil one.

Your offering in the Appeal will help the Church to continue services like these. In making your Appeal offering, you are helping the Church to continue these programs which actively promote our conviction, as the Cardinal says, "that all life matters, as we are all made in God's image and likeness."

Parishioners on our mailing list will be receiving a mailing from the Cardinal about the Appeal. We ask you prayerfully to consider it. If you do not receive your Appeal envelope in the mail, there are envelopes available in the vestibule of the church. We are asking each parishioner to make a special effort in supporting the Appeal this year. Last year, because of the outbreak of the pandemic, we were able to reach about 50% of our goal. Hopefully things will be better this year. With your help, they will be.

## **SPIRITUAL COMMUNION—GOD’S GIFT IN TIME OF CRISIS**

Each day we are called to strengthen our faith, to work with our fellow Christians to become closer to Our Lord and truly live his Word. This task became so much more difficult as churches were closed and we were no longer allowed to worship with a community and even worse, receive the Eucharist on a daily or weekly basis. It was during this dark time many people became familiar with Spiritual Communion. For some it was the first hearing of this practice which is designed to make the faithful feel united to Christ when sacramental Communion is not an option. When churches were not open and we were homebound, the faithful had television Mass, which is a blessing. Unified as a family on the couch, we can praise God and show our gratitude for all he has given us, even in a time of deep sorrow.

But one thing we can’t do is receive Holy Communion. The act of receiving the sacrament is one that embodies the hope we have as Catholics and without it often our hope is dimmed. But becoming familiar with the Spiritual Communion is our way of inviting Our Lord into our hearts when we are not able to physically get to a church.

There are four steps to be taken for a Spiritual Communion.

- First, make an act of faith, use a traditional prayer or develop your own to define for Our Lord your belief that He is present in the Eucharist.
- Second, offer an act of love. Thank the Lord in prayer for his love and express your love for Him.
- Third, express your desire to receive Him by voicing your wish to receive Him in your heart.
- And lastly, with a humble and contrite mind and soul invite Christ into your heart. This prayer is a common one used for a Spiritual Communion.

“My Jesus, I believe that you are present in the Most Holy Sacrament. I love you above all things, and I desire to receive You in my soul. Since I cannot at this moment receive You sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace you as if you were already there and unite myself wholly to You. Never permit me to be separated from you. Amen.”

## **FEAST OF ST. BLAISE**

This Wednesday, February 3rd, is the Feast of St. Blaise, bishop and martyr of the early church. Throats will be blessed through the intercession of St. Blaise on Wednesday after our Masses at 8:00AM and 9:00AM and at Prayer Services at 3:00PM and 7:15PM.

The prayer that is used for the blessing of throats is this: “Through the intercession of St. Blaise, bishop and martyr, may God deliver you from disease of the throat and every other evil, in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.”



**JANUARY 31  
ST. JOHN BOSCO**

Saint John Bosco (known in his lifetime and ever since as Don Bosco) was born in Turin, Italy in 1815 of a poor family. He heard the Lord's call to the priesthood and, after his ordination in 1841, spent much of his 73 year life in that city as a parish priest.

Don Bosco's principal apostolate was among poor working boys to unite them with the spiritual life. His insistence that boys in his care learn a trade made him a pioneer in modern vocational training. In this, he was helped by his own mother Margarita (called by everyone as Mama Margarita) who herself is being considered for canonization as a saint.

In later years, Don Bosco founded two religious orders, the Salesians (who established and staff Salesian High School in New Rochelle where many of our young men attend ) and the Daughters of Mary Auxiliatrix, to carry on the work of his life among young people.

He put all of his efforts under the care of Our Blessed Mother Mary, Help of Christians. With great humility he said, "I have been an instrument in the hands of Mary. She has done everything. Had I been a worthier instrument, I would have accomplished a great deal more."

He was particularly devoted to the Blessed Sacrament. Once he had a dream of a ship being tossed about in a storm. The ship represented the Church. It seemed as if the ship would sink, but then two pillars appeared, with ropes attached to the ship to steady it. One of the pillars represented Our Blessed Mother Mary and the other, the Blessed Sacrament. With these two pillars, the ship weathered the storm. Don Bosco encouraged devotion to Mary and the Eucharist as the mainstays of every Catholics life.

Don Bosco printed a number of catechetical and pious books that had a large circulation at the time. As a result, St. John Bosco is the patron saint of Catholic publishers and youth.

Don Bosco died on January 31, 1888. Pope Pius XI, who knew him as a young priest, canonized him in 1934, calling him "a giant of sanctity." His feast day is January 31.



**FEBRUARY 2  
SAINT CATHERINE de RICCI  
Virgin († 1590)**

The daughter of a respected Florentine family, Catherine entered the Dominican convent at Prato at thirteen. For the first two years she had an illness that challenged the doctors. She learned to unite her sufferings to those of Christ.

When she was twenty, extraordinary graces were showered upon Catherine. For the next twelve years, she mystically participated in Christ's Passion every Friday. She received the stigmata, the wounds of Christ manifested in her own body. Christ united himself to her in a mystical marriage, complete with a wedding ring. Saint Philip Neri reported that she appeared to him while being at the same time in her convent, a phenomenon known as bilocation.

Catherine's mystical experiences in no way prevented her from leading the other nuns as prioress. She wrote at least a thousand letters of advice to persons of low estate as well as bishops and popes. She showered attention on the poor, and even brought daily snacks to the girls in the convent school.

Catherine died in 1590 at the age of sixty-eight. Her counsel: "Gather up all your worries and make a bundle of them and throw them all into those most holy wounds of Jesus Christ. You could not put them anywhere better than in Jesus and his most holy Mother. They are the ones who are perfectly capable of consoling and calming the human heart."



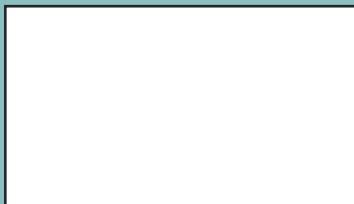
