



April 3, 2022 Fifth Sunday of Lent



Dear Friends,

This Sunday is the Fifth Sunday in Lent. In the older calendar it is known as "Passion Sunday;" marking a change in the Lenten Season. The last two weeks of Lent were known as "Passiontide." It was and is



a dramatic change: symbolized by the veiling of sacred images in the church. I vividly remember entering the lobby of the high school I went to, Saint Pius X Preparatory Seminary, and seeing the large statue of Our Lady that stood there veiled in purple cloth. Everywhere one looked, purple cloth sheathed all the familiar images of Saints and Angels. Even the very Crucifix was hidden from view. I think it was and is a very visible way of reminding us of the Passion.

After a time of drastic pruning of the tree of the accumulated customs and practices of the Roman Rite; we see the Church asking us again to restore some of the "old family customs."

This weekend we follow one of those customs in the striking and dramatic covering of all the sacred images in the church. The Scriptures speak of Jesus "hiding Himself;" God "hiding His face," and the Lord "covered up" in the tomb for three days. The Crucifix will be unveiled on Good Friday in answer to that ancient cry of the Liturgy *Behold the wood of the Cross!* and will be the object of veneration on that day's Solemn Liturgy.

On Holy Saturday, the great Vigil of Easter, the risen and glorified Christ will be revealed to us, much like to the disciples on that early morn; as well as the statues of Our Lady and Saint Joseph. Historians tell us that earliest drama in Western civilization is not only the ancient Greek theatre but also the Liturgy of the Church. We are fed not only by words, but by "signs and wonders" through all our senses. Now the focus of Lent shifts from the theme of personal repentance to the Passion and Death of the Lord. Why this ancient, now restored, custom? The veiled images symbolize a world without God. Familiar faces and images, now hidden, remind us of what the world can be; and human lives can be, without God. Nowhere to look, nothing to look at: but emptiness. On Good Friday, the Liturgy finally returns the Crucifix to us, unveiled with the cry *Behold!...Look*!

Look at what it cost God to forgive our sins! Look at the price of sin! Look at the love He has for us! Centuries ago, the great and ardent light of medieval spirituality, Saint Bernard of Clairvaux, preaching on the Passion, pointed to the Crucifix, and asked, *"WHO did this???"* He gave the answer: *"LOVE did this!!! Heedless of His dignity!!!"*

These last two weeks of Lent are still different in our Liturgy. The theme of the Passion comes to the fore.

Dear friends, we still have two weeks to make a good Lent: still time to voluntarily offer to Jesus a little bit of the Cross. Even if we have failed in our Lenten resolutions; there is still time to make it up!

This and That

- **Holy Water:** there are TWO large vessels with Holy Water in the church. One in the vestibule, the other in front of the church to the left of the statue of Our Lady. Feel free to avail yourself of either when you want Holy Water.
- The Special needs/"handicapped" rows in the back of the church: these have been made available for those who use walkers, or who cannot easily walk, kneel, or might have to be a near a door.
- For those who do not use the special rows in the back but have difficulty walking up to the Communion Station: might I suggest you sit in a row closest to the Communion Station? That way you may receive Communion at the beginning of its distribution and the Communion line can flow more smoothly behind you.
- AGAIN: Communion "in the hand" means BOTH hands. As Catholics we "receive" Holy Communion, not "take" Holy Communion. Snatching, or grabbing the Host from the Communion minister with your fingers is completely irreverent; as is "palming" the Host with one hand to the mouth. If your hands will be impeded or blocked due to holding children, carrying clothing, holding objects (even religious ones) then one should receive on the tongue. The priests as responsible for the reverence and care of the Blessed Sacrament reserve the right to refuse Communion in the hand if done as poorly and improperly as just mentioned. After over 40 years of this practice of Communion in the hand, and repeated instruction, there simply is no excuse for the occurrence of seriously improper and irreverent treatment of the Sacred Host as just described.
- Also, please remember to remove your facial covering just before you receive Communion. You may replace it after your have received the Host.
- *"I'm not hungry, I'll just peck":* Some of you might remember that line from a movie, and the scene that follows. This may seem a bit flippant BUT: regardless of what some other priest or parish might have said or advised, in St. Matthew's Parish it simply makes no sense for an adult to present him or herself on the Communion line without intending to receive Communion. It confuses the priests and the Extraordinary Ministers to come all the way up the line then stand here with some gesture or other, "wanting a blessing" while dozens of people are waiting to receive. It is not our custom here in St. Matthew's parish and EVERYBODY at Mass receives a blessing at the end of every Mass at the end of the Liturgy.

Parish Policies

Funerals:

As before, families who have to plan a Catholic Funeral Mass are advised to bear in mind that the Funeral Mass is both a celebration of the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass and a Liturgy that has its own rules and customs. The best place for naturally warm, wide-ranging, and emotional family remembrances or eulogies is at the Wake, NOT at the Funeral Mass. It is the long standing policy of this Parish that NO such remembrances will be done at the Funeral Mass. If there is no Wake, the family may deliver the eulogy at the cemetery or at a subsequent family meal or gathering.

Weddings: There are two forms of the Catholic wedding Liturgy:

The Wedding Ceremony:

This has all the festive elements of a full wedding: music, readings, the vows, the Nuptial Blessing, etc. This is the most common form of the Catholic wedding and is often the most practical and manageable for most families. It is by no means a lesser or "second class" ceremony than the following.

The Nuptial Mass:

This is a celebration of the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass with reception of Holy Communion with the wedding ceremony in the middle of the Liturgy. The meaning and inner truth of the Nuptial Mass leads to the following Parish policy: a Nuptial Mass will only be celebrated if both Bride and Groom are practicing Catholics, or intend to become observably practicing Catholics PRIOR to the wedding; and who are NOT already cohabiting as if they were already husband and wife. If they are, they must separate their living arrangements PRIOR to the wedding.

Nuptial Masses are not celebrated on Sundays unless offered by a visiting priest upon the permission of the Parish Pastor.

No one should feel obliged to request a Nuptial Mass who are not able to observe the above requirements. As they say: "no hard feelings." A Wedding Ceremony is recommended in those circumstances with proper Pre-Cana preparation and guidance.

Eucharistic Piety:

This Parish has long offered opportunities for special Eucharistic Adoration in the form of "Solemn Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament;" i.e., the Host is exposed to view in the monstrance for prayer. Currently we have one such Holy Hour, Tuesday mornings from 9:30 to 10:30 AM in the church.

Traditionally, the Church has always encouraged the less formal and more flexible form of Eucharistic Adoration known as "a visit to the Blessed Sacrament" as the primary way to adore Our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament. In this parish the main church is open for basically 12 hours every day. I notice with pleasure many people "dropping by" to be with Our Lord in the Tabernacle for some time, or only even for a few moments.

Adoration of the Lord in His Eucharistic Presence reserved in the Tabernacle is always beneficial for those who avail themselves of it, no matter even of short duration.

LENTEN DISCIPLINES OF FASTING & ABSTINENCE

Catholics in good health ages 18 to 59 are required to fast and to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

Fasting consists of eating only one meal, with the possibility of two smaller snacks that do not add up to a single full meal.

Catholics age 14 and older are to abstain from meat on all Fridays in Lent.

Mass Cards at St. Matthew's

St. Matthew's Parish offers two types of Mass Cards:

- Announced Masses: As the name implies this is a Mass set for a specific date and time and the name of the person(s) for whom the Mass is offered is published in the bulletin and announced at the Mass. These are particularly suitable for those families or individuals who will attend the actual Mass on the day appointed. While anyone can arrange for an Announced Mass, their number is necessarily limited by the number of public Masses offered in a year.
- Unannounced Masses: These are Masses that will be offered in the coming year but at an unspecified date, time and place. The priests of the Parish offer these Masses during retreat, vacation, and other days in which they do not have a public Mass. Mass Cards are issued for these Masses with the name of the person(s) written in the card but without any specific promised date or time. This category might be suitable for cases where the family of the named person(s) are not parishioners, live some distance away, or would not otherwise be able to attend a Mass here on a set day or time.

The receptionist will help you in arranging either or both of these Masses and the different offerings for each category.

Parish Office Hours:

The receptionist desk will be "womanned" Monday through Thursday from 9 AM to 1 PM for routine parish business and Mass Cards. On Friday there will be more limited service. Please call ahead when in doubt - 631-499-8520. The Parish Center is not open on a general basis, at this time due to the current public health crisis.




EASTER EGG HUNT

FOR CLIENTS RECEIVING SNAP OR TEMPORARY ASSISTANCE

In February, OTDA distributed a portion of PEAF (Pandemic Emergency Assistance Fund) funds to provide to one-time cash payments to families that have a child under the age of three and are enrolled in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) or Temporary Assistance (TA). Families received \$140 per eligible child to help cover the cost of diapers.

In April, OTDA will issue one-time cash payments for food assistance to SNAP and TA households that include both an adult who is 55 or older and a child who is 17 or younger. These households will receive \$730 per eligible older adult.

Additional Emergency Allotments (EA) will be issued to all SNAP households in New York State in March. Distribution began on March 7 and will continue throughout the month. SNAP Emergency Allotments are approved by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) on a month-by-month basis and will continue until the public health emergency is lifted in our nation.

The diaper supplement and food assistance payments will be issued to households' EBT cash account. Families must access their EBT cash account within 90 days of receiving the payment or the cash will be removed from the account.

Catholic Charities was kind enough to send us this information.
