

From Rabbi Roni's Desk

It has been three weeks since we woke up to the devastating news of the attacks on Israel and Israeli civilians. Since then, it has been impossible to turn away from the news. We watch with hope that more hostages will continue to be set free. We watch with trepidation as each attack and military mobilization unfolds, praying that our soldiers will be safe, and that no more innocent lives will be lost. And we watch with sorrow, still in shock that all of this is even happening.

When an individual Jewish person has lost a loved one, we learn that they are in a state of anninut. This stage of mourning is the most challenging, as it comes with immense pain, and at the same time our loss can cause a numbing effect for some time. Many rabbis have noted that this recent massacre has plunged the entire Jewish people into a state of anninut. We are shocked. We are angry. We are frightened. We are anxious. And...we are numb.

While we know that there have sadly been many other moments of collective mourning for our people, this doesn't make it any easier to live through it now. When one is in anninut, we need others even more to be checking in on us and helping us to move through. While we may be grateful for every phone call, text, and email we have received from our friends and neighbors, the silence from others has also been deafening. Personally, I have been so grateful for the ways that I have seen our BTBJ community, and the larger Jewish community, come together during this time. We have mobilized to raise funds and gather goods to be sent to Israel. We have shown up to check in with each other about our loved ones in Israel, about trips to Israel being postponed, and the general state of our hearts and minds. And we continue to show up to simply be together to embrace one another, and to remind ourselves and each other that we are not alone.

As we continue our collective journey of grief, I encourage you to continue to show up. Our BTBJ calendar is packed with opportunities to come together with one another to laugh, to bake, to eat, to learn, to pray and to play. It is ok to experience joy in this moment and this is often a much-needed balm to help us carry on. May we continue to pray for an end to this violence and that our hostages be returned home. And may we find comfort in one another as pray for more peaceful days ahead.

Oseh shalom bimroav hu ya'aseh shalom aleinu v'al kol Yisrael.
Amen.

May the one who makes peace above, make peace for us, and for all Israel.

Religious School Update

The religious school at BTBJ continues to be a busy place. We began the month of October by celebrating Sukkot and Simchat Torah. On Sukkot, classes rotated through the Sukkah, learning about ushpizin (guests), the mitzvot of Sukkot, and how to wave the Lulav. The students received a special treat in order to fully enjoy the mitzvah of sitting in the BTBJ sukkah.

For Simchat Torah Evan Wolf taught each grade (7 grades) a different Hebrew song such as Am Yisrael Chai, and Torah, Torah. The classes did an amazing job learning the songs quickly and we concluded the day celebrating outside, dancing with the Torah as we sang our seven songs representing the seven hakafot.

Regular class is now in full swing. Our 103 students are busy learning Hebrew, prayers, life cycle, Tanakh and much more. In the middle of the month our moomchim rotations began. In moomchim students learn about Israel, life cycle, Jewish art/ history, and mitzvot rotating every four weeks to another subject. This is in addition to their homerooms.


We welcomed our families at our Fall Open House on October 22nd. The Open House allowed them to get together as a group and allowed them to experience the rich learning environment that BTBJ provides our students. Families learned about all the exciting new programming coming up and were able to sit in their students' classes for 20 minutes getting to know the faculty and the topics which their students are learning.

We are introducing a new program in place of the traditional Junior Congregation program. This program is called Kehillah Kids! Traditional services such as Friday night and Saturday morning are worth 1 point whereas special events, identified throughout the BTBJ calendar, students can earn more than 1 point. The points will be tallied at the end of the year and special awards will be given for the different levels of points received. We hope that

this inspires our families to be active in the larger BTBJ community while students also feel a sense of accomplishment for their attendance.

In addition, during this challenging time, students made cards and signs of support for Israel. Information about the war in Israel was given at an age appropriate level and the important emphasis was on how we can share our support and solidarity with Israel as Jews living in the diaspora.

The months ahead will be just as busy as we move towards Hanukkah and the second semester of school. If you know of students and families who are interested in religious school please send them my contact information and I'm happy to speak with how we can get them involved in our bustling school! It's been an absolute pleasure getting to know all the special students we have here at BTBJ, they truly bring light into a world that can feel very dark sometimes. Thank you for allowing us to care for and teach your children!

CHESTNUT HILL LOCAL Features BTBJ'S Own Mosaic Artist Jessica Liddell

Celebrated Mt. Airy Mosaic Artist Goes International



Jessica Liddell, who has owned Bella Mosaic Art at 6780 Germantown Ave. for 15 years, will be leaving soon for the much-coveted month-long "Nocefresca Artist Residency" in Sardinia.

It is no secret in the local arts community that Mt. Airy resident Jessica Gorlin Liddell is a spectacularly talented mosaic artist who has completed over 45 public art projects, commissions, collaborative installations and artist residencies over the last 20 years throughout Pennsylvania, New Jersey, New York and Florida.

But now the recognition is international.

Liddell, who has owned Bella Mosaic Art on Germantown Ave. for 15 years, was recently one of just a few artists selected out of countless applicants for the prestigious month long "Nocefresca Artist Residency" in Sardinia, the second largest island in the Mediterranean known for its ancient and mysterious Bronze Age stone ruins shaped like beehives. She departed for Europe on Sept. 18, with her art residency scheduled to begin in October.

Originally from California, where she trained at the prestigious California College of Art & Design, Liddell moved to the Philadelphia area 23 years ago when her husband, Andy Liddell, relocated back to the Mt. Airy neighborhood where he grew up. Andy, a house painter by trade, has done extensive interior and exterior painting work on homes throughout Chestnut Hill and Mt. Airy over the years.

In addition to her large-scale mosaic installations in schools, houses of worship and public and private buildings, Liddell and her team at Bella Mosaic Art have also created hundreds of mosaic and fused glass pieces of all sizes for parks, hospitals, restaurants, shops, office buildings, community gardens and more throughout the Greater Philadelphia region.

Some of her most recent mosaic creations include stunning glass walls at the Peter Camiel and Valley Forge rest stops along the Pennsylvania Turnpike, as well as an expansive work unveiled this year at Beth Tikvah B'nai Jeshurun synagogue in Erdenheim.

"We were so fortunate to find Jessica to guide us through this process," said BTBJ President Alana Dunoff. "She helped us craft the vision for the project, including encouraging our religious school children to create drawings capturing what 'community' means to them, and our entire community participated in hands-on tile-making and glazing workshops."



Ultimately, they used more than 70 of the children's drawings to produce the mosaic's final design.


A Solidarity in Song Vigil for Israel in Buxmont

Halle Schwartzman, Daughter of Beth and David Schwartzman, Sophomore at James Madison University, Speaks To Honor The Lives Lost in Israel.



Halle Schwartzman is the President of the newly formed (revived) Hillel at JMU. This week, she and the Jewish students in Hillel, Chabad and AEPi came together to honor the lives lost in Israel. Halle spoke in front of the more than 200 people who gathered. Halle is a member of BTBJ and a graduate of our Religious School. She is the daughter of David and Beth Schwartzman.

"Hi Everyone.

For those of you who I haven't met, I'm Halle Schwartzman, the President of JMU Hillel - the student-led Jewish organization on campus.

My whole life I have worn my star of David, my hamsa and my curly hair proudly. It defines who I am, a very proud Jewish woman. But over the last few days, I have become terrified of how the world feels like it's crumbling at my feet. I, like many others, have been watching my people drop by hundreds: rates that we haven't seen since the Holocaust. Yes, the Holocaust. The genocide where Hitler and the Nazis killed off 11 million people - 6 million of them Jews - as Europe and most of the world stood by, watching and powerless. We go to Yad Vashem and the Holocaust Museums around the world and learn about how our ancestors were tortured, starved, beaten, raped, gassed and more, and wonder how everybody seemingly stood by and did nothing. Well, I think we can all say that we understand now.

I had been in Tel Aviv eating the best hamburger of my life just over a year ago when there was a terrorist attack 3 blocks away in a busy bar. My Israeli friend, Ofek, whom I was catching up with from the summer prior, grabbed me by the hand and rushed us out of the restaurant. This terrorist killed 3 innocent people. Innocent people just having a drink on a Thursday night on Dizengoff Street. I live in America and experience the horrors of mass shootings and the hate for all frequently. But this week, I have been more uneasy than I ever have been before. I am scared to leave my home. I am scared to go to class. I'm scared to go on Instagram. I'm scared to show my Jewish pride or my love for Israel while not hidden behind a screen. Nevertheless, I will never be ashamed to be Jewish.

This week, I caught myself hiding my star of David necklace in my shirt for the first time ever. I was walking from the SSC down to Chesapeake parking deck at the end of the day on Tuesday and I saw this man approaching me with what looked like a knife. I quickly grabbed my necklace, and tucked it right into my sweatshirt. He was gripping it tightly, with the wooden part sticking up and he made direct eye contact with me as he passed me on the sidewalk in front of the bus stop. He continued to walk by and I looked back to see that he was holding one of those things that mashes potatoes. I laughed. I laughed because how could I think something so ridiculous. But then I realized, it makes sense. I am horrified to be Jewish in this world right now. I am horrified to the point that I believe that someone is going to walk by me, see my tiny Jewish star on my chest and kill me.

This war is not a political issue. It's not an issue of Israel vs. Palestine or Israelis vs. Palestinians. It's an issue of heinous attacks on innocent civilians, completely unprovoked by a terrorist group that is known to behave like this. We must stand by what we believe in. We must stand proud, with our heads held high until this passes. Because this too, shall pass.

To quote an instagram post I saw recently (out of the literal thousands) "You don't have to be Jewish. You don't have to be Israeli, You just have to be human to care, to love and to take a stance." Thank you all so much for coming, and being with us here today. It means the absolute world to everyone here, and we appreciate and love you all.

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
