From Rabbi Roni's Desk

Passover felt different this year. We ate the matzah, we told the story, and maybe we even sang the songs, but it was different. During the seder we always recite the words, "avadaim hayinu, atah b'nai chorin - once we were slaves, now we are free." We place ourselves into the shoes of the Israelites and as we say these words, we recall how the Israelites were redeemed from Egypt. We remember how we were saved, and because of this Jews all over the world celebrate this freedom each and every year. But this year, while we were able to celebrate the freedom of the ancient Israelites, and victories of generations of Jews that came before us, it might have felt a bit premature, disingenuous, or downright hypocritical to celebrate freedom during our seders. This year has been different.

The Hebrew word for Egypt, the place where the Israelites were enslaved, is *Mitzrayim*. This word literally translates to "narrow spaces." The word *Mitzrayim* not only reminds us of the limited role Israelites held in society, but we can also feel within this word the constriction and powerlessness that pervaded the lives, the bodies, and the psyche of the ancient Israelites.

As we told our story this year, and celebrated the victory of our Passover story, this joy was dampened by not only the ten plagues, but by the reality of the Israel/Hamas war. Our joy was tempered knowing that over a hundred hostages are still being held in Gaza and that they have been there for over two hundred days. While we retell the miracle of the parting of the Sea of Reeds, this year our miracle was seeing the video of Hirsh Goldberg Polin. Learning that he survived his October 7th injury, feels like the miracle can give us the strength we need to persevere and to hold onto hope that these hostages might return home.

Counting each day as we have been doing since October 7th can leave us feeling deflated and defeated. But as we have now entered the period of Counting the Omer, I pray that the traditional counting of the days from Passover to Shavuot, might provide us with some grounding and intention as we continue to navigate the realities of this war. Perhaps this year you might allow yourself to notice and appreciate the blessings in your life, even as you track the number of days of captivity for the hostages. With each day, consider the power and agency that you have to bring about more freedom for you, your family, the Jewish community, and other marginalized groups.

This year may be different, but may we continue to both discover and appreciate the joy and blessing that surround us. And may we merit the ability to bring more joy, more peace, and more freedom to our world.

College campuses are overwhelmed with anti-Israel protests, anti-semitism continues to rise in our own community, some feel the need to limit their display of their Judaism, and the world feels on fire. It is hard to celebrate freedom when so much chaos surrounds us. I am grateful for all I have and at the same time I worry about what lies ahead and pray for immediate peaceful resolutions.

As the leader of our Kehillah Kedosha, I have had a few questions rolling around in my mind regarding what is our responsibility as a community at this time of unrest?

So, with the inspiration of Passover on my mind, I ask you these 4 questions.

1. What should we be doing as **individuals** to support Israel and our community at large?

2. What should we be doing as a **community** to support Israel and our community at large?

3. What should we be doing to ensure our voices are heard by those who have the power to help make change?

4. What do we need to learn, teach, share, say, and do to make our world, our community, our schools, our BTBJ, our homes all places of peace and acceptance?

Bronia Brandman was born into a family of six children in Jaworzno, Poland. She was eight years old when World War II broke out. In March 1942, her oldest brother was taken to Blechhammer labor camp. The following August, her parents and another brother were deported to Auschwitz, never to be heard from again. She and her three sisters fled to the nearby town of Sosnowiec, where they stayed for a few months before the Nazis relocated them to a ghetto. In August 1943, the four sisters were deported to Auschwitz. Ms. Brandman narrowly escaped the gas chambers by running away from her assigned line upon arrival and joining one of her sisters in another line.

Ms. Brandman remained at Auschwitz until January 1945, when she began a forced death march to Germany. Though sick and delirious with fever, Ms. Brandman survived the trip and was liberated from the Neustadt-Gleve camp by the American and Russian armies in May 1945. Today, she is a retired public school teacher, volunteering her time as a member of the Speakers Bureau of the Museum of Jewish Heritage—A Living Memorial to the Holocaust.
