

From The Pastor's Desk

- Marian Easter -

Easter is the season of seeing...when by way of faith...the eyes of our souls are opened really really wide and we are able to see and understand things more clearly and with more hope, peace, comfort and joy.

Easter reminds us of the primary reason for why we exist...to see God...and not just look at Him as one would a photo of someone who has passed away or moved away, but to see and be with Him and enjoy His presence forever as we would people we love at a family celebration gathering.

Can we even begin to imagine, for example, the first time Jesus' Apostles saw Him after He had risen from the dead, after the initial shock of thinking He was a ghost...they must have jumped Heaven high out of their sandals, so overjoyed were they to see their Messiah and BFF.

The seeing of God we refer to as the Beatific or Beautiful Vision. We all know the effect that beauty can have on us, an incredible beach sunrise or sun-set, walking through a museum, a garden, going to a prom, a wedding. Or ask any parent what the most beautiful moment in his or her life is...I would hope...that first time and every time thereafter they held in their arms their child or children.

Or prior to that even happening when coming down aisle, and that veil is lifted, any married man would and must say...his most beautiful moment...gazing upon the face of his blushing bride...who together would create the most beautiful moments of holding those children.

I love that the last book of scripture is referred to as the Apocalypse, not as in brain eating end of the world Zombies, but more significantly, it means "to lift the veil". In a Wedding Ceremony when the veil is lifted...the bridegroom beholds Heaven in Feminine Human form...it is his beatific vision moment.

Which is why so often at a Funeral, families choose this beautiful passage from that same last book of Scripture: Then I saw a new heaven and a new earth. The former heaven and the former earth had passed away. I also saw the holy city, a new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride adorned for her husband.

I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, "Behold, God's dwelling is with the human race...God himself will always be with them [as their God]. He will wipe every tear from their eyes, and there shall be no more death or mourning, wailing or pain, [for] the old order has passed away." The one who sat on the throne said, "Behold, I make all things new."

Behold I make all things NEW...it doesn't get any more new than Easter when we are all given a new lease on everlasting life. When we die, the veil that separates earth from Heaven is lifted and we behold the greatness of God. And this is the great lesson of the Woman who is the Masterpiece of God's Beauty...the fullness of God's grace... The Blessed Virgin Mary. And how does Mary celebrate this greatness of God's Godness? It's what so many people do when they are super happy, they don't just hum a tune, they sing! And that is precisely what Mary does to express her joy in God, she sings the beloved Hymn the *Magnificat,* which means "to magnify", after the first verse: "my soul magnifies the greatness of the Lord."

And how does a soul magnify the greatness of God and hence its own greatness? As knowledge enhances the quality of the mind...love enhances the quality of the heart...and nutrition the quality of the body...it is beauty that enhances the quality of the soul...again with eyes which are referred to as the windows of the soul; therefore, no one was able to see more beauty in this world than Mary whose eyes were constantly looking through a pure filter of beauty.

And this remains one of the great lessons of Easter, how is it that we see God, how is it that we see each other, the world, myself in the mirror...despite it being Easter, despite people passing away...is my life the same...will it remain the same?

Or will I now look upon the world through the eyes of the Risen Christ, who has empowered me to see differently and understand more clearly what is truly important, and not take for granted the beauty of this world, a beauty most evident in the faces of those I see each day or see in my mind by way of memories, prayers or longing to see again.

This past Monday our recent First Communion Children participated in the Mary May Crowning, evident by the very beautiful statue of Mary beside the Altar. If we are to enhance the experience of beauty in our lives and invite into our hearts its power to transform us into a beautiful beacon of living light in a world too quickly being plunged into a moral cesspool of terrible darkness, let us often look to images of Mary. Have them present and seen in our homes, where we work, in our cars...let our hearts be crowned with the love of Mary that we might then look her compassion upon the world, radiate it forth from those hearts. As this Beatitude reminds us: "Blessed are the pure of heart for they shall see God"

Devotion to Mary, looking often and praying before images of Mary, will soften our hearts making them more pure more chaste more noble so that we can look and live her compassion and beauty in this world...so desperate for authentic beauty.

Easter is the celebration when life is magnified by the greatness of God...in His glorified body, now all our senses are magnified and glorified...and because they are...how is it that we will look out upon the world...how is it we will now experience the world?

The Diaconate Formation Program supports the vocation and ministry of the deacon, beginning as an Inquirer through his journey to ordination and beyond. The Dioceses of Bridgeport provides an integrated four-and onehalf year program that is structured around the four pillars of human, spiritual, academic, and pastoral dimensions-all supported through gifts of the Bishop's Appeal.

Through prayer, study, and the grace of the Holy Spirit, the candidate undergoes a transformation of heart and mind as he prepares himself to be minster of the Word, Altar, and Charity. There are now 47 active deacons, 39 retired, most who continue to serve, and 8 men in formation. Our discussions with those interested in knowing more about our formation program is ongoing. 

You learn why we do everything in the Mass: Sure, swinging the censer (the smelly incense thing) is kind of fun but why is it that we do it? By becoming an altar server you begin to learn these things and it makes all the symbols of the Mass so much more understandable and interesting.

You get fully involved in the Mass and get more out of it: When you start to understand why we do something you get so much more from it. By focusing and understanding what's going on, the Mass can then lead you into a much deeper relationship with God and you feel the impact of Mass far greater!

You learn some fantastic life skills: Communication, teamwork, perceiving what needs to be done and doing it, punctuality, self-confidence, and the list goes on. Serving on the altar is a great place to start building these skills.

You become more involved in the community: By taking up a responsibility at Mass you start to recognize more and more people in the church in general. This slowly changes your experience of the church community, from a group of random people you stand next to at Mass, to a large and diverse family who you care for more deeply and will increase your love and concern for the global Church family as well.

It helps you discern your vocation (purpose in life) better: Every vocation (whether marriage, consecrated singlehood, religious life or priesthood) is awesome and leads us to a greater and deeper understanding and relationship with God and others. Altar Serving is a great way to begin to see that beauty more fully.
