

From The Pastor's Desk

- Dependence Day -

When Founding Father John Adams wrote a letter to his wife on July 3, 1776, he described how future generations of Americans ought to celebrate our nation's Independence Day.

He called for "Pomp and Parade, with Shews, Games, Sports, Guns, Bells, Bonfires and Illuminations from one End of this Continent to the other from this Time forward forever more."

But first and foremost, he who would become the second president of the United States, wrote, "It ought to be commemorated as the Day of Deliverance by solemn Acts of Devotion to God Almighty." In other words: parades, fireworks — and the First Commandment!

At a time when factions of Americans find themselves ensnared in partisan and poisonous passions, and at a time when we struggle to govern according to our nation's founding principles, it's hard to go wrong if our to-do list as a nation begins with the First Commandment. I am the Lord your God; you shall not have other gods before Me.

By solemn acts of devotion to God Almighty, we orient ourselves to our Creator who, through love, holds us in existence and calls us to communion with Himself.

On this Fourth of July, Adams' words remind us that our primary covenant is with God, not with any given political party, nor with the false gods of power, money, and fleeting pleasures.

When we love with all our heart the God who created us in love, we bring order to our lives and thereby claim the freedom He intends for us — freedom definitively bound to the ultimate good, which is God who seeks to dwell in our hearts and sanctify our words and actions.

A nation that adheres to the First Commandment embraces humility, self-sacrifice, and forbearance. It doesn't seek to wound another, to gossip, to boast, and to lie. Its best interests aren't pursued to the detriment of others.

Sadly and recently the country commemorated Juneteenth which marks the day when federal troops arrived in Galveston, Texas in 1865 to take control of the state and ensure that all enslaved people be freed.

The troops' arrival came a full two and a half years after the signing of the Emancipation Proclamation issued by President Abraham Lincoln on January 1, 1863, which established that all enslaved people in Confederate states in rebellion against the Union "shall be then, thenceforward, and forever free."

I cannot imagine anything that disrespects one's human dignity more than to be reduced to an object that is forced to gratify the greed and distorted desires of another person.

After all, is not our Nation founded on this primary principal highlighted in our Declaration of Independence: "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness."

Sin is slavery...who of us do not struggle with some kind of sinful condition that seems to reduce our level of goodness and impede our progress in holiness...who of us do not struggle with some form of addiction that has all but bound up our will power reducing it to will weakness and will paralysis.

And where does Christ stand amidst these pains, torments and struggles in our lives, perhaps after the title of Savior the one title that Saint Paul seems most to identify Jesus Christ with is slave...explaining:

He emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, coming in human likeness; and found human in appearance, he humbled himself, becoming obedient to death, even death on a cross.

Bound to that Cross by nails as so many men from Israel during the times of Moses to African Americans in the 19th century here in this country were bound by chains, so many whipped for trying to escape their slavery...Christ would be scourged across His entire body...in each strike the scourge of sin embedding itself into His torn flesh and breaking heart. In seeing Christ on the Cross we see that freedom is in fact not free it was purchased for us at the greatest of all prices.

Christ endured this not simply as a show of solidarity but as the means to emancipate us, and what might our Emancipation and Independence Day be? Find out the day of your baptism...and like Juneteenth...Christmas...Easter... Independence Day...celebrate it...for at that moment when those sacred waters were poured upon your head and soaked into your soul. You were freed from the scourge and slavery of the original sin, wrested free from the power of the devil the ultimate slave master. So that these words from Saint Paul might echo loudly in our ears:

For you did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you received a spirit of adoption, through which we cry, "Abba, Father!"

Knowing the price of your freedom especially at the cost of another's life, God's life, must we not demonstrate a greater and more solemn respect for freedom and refuse to deprive others of freedom as once we did with the men and women from Africa in this country and the world over, so many try to do to the unborn...trying to deprive them of their right of life liberty and the pursuit of happiness.

Nothing enslaves a person more and violates their divinely charged dignity more than sin, but no one liberates us more fully and more joyfully from these chains of misery than establishing that primary First Commandment relationship with God, who Jesus teaches we must love with all our heart, mind, soul and strength and our neighbor as well. So that arriving at our moment to leave this earth, we too can exclaim with great confidence and joy: "free at last free at last...thank God Almighty I am free at last."

Other Reasons for becoming an Altar Server.

You learn why we do everything in the Mass: Sure, swinging the censer (the smelly incense thing) is kind of fun but why is it that we do it? By becoming an altar server you begin to learn these things and it makes all the symbols of the Mass so much more understandable and interesting.

You get fully involved in the Mass and get more out of it: When you start to understand why we do something you get so much more from it. By focusing and understanding what's going on, the Mass can then lead you into a much deeper relationship with God and you feel the impact of Mass far greater!

You learn some fantastic life skills: Communication, teamwork, perceiving what needs to be done and doing it, punctuality, self-confidence, and the list goes on. Serving on the altar is a great place to start building these skills.

You become more involved in the community: By taking up a responsibility at Mass you start to recognize more and more people in the church in general. This slowly changes your experience of the church community, from a group of random people you stand next to at Mass, to a large and diverse family who you care for more deeply and will increase your love and concern for the global Church family as well.

It helps you discern your vocation (purpose in life) better: Every vocation (whether marriage, consecrated singlehood, religious life or priesthood) is awesome and leads us to a greater and deeper understanding and relationship with God and others. Convalidation of Marriage

Like other couples in your parish or family, you may be wondering if your marriage is fully recognized by the Catholic Church. Catholic Church law ordinarily requires baptized Roman Catholics to marry before a priest or deacon.

Catholics who exchange marriage vows in the presence of only ministers from other religious traditions or authorized civic officials (i.e.. Justice of the Peace) are not considered validly married in the eyes of the Catholic Church, which offers Marriage in the unique form of a Sacrament called Holy Matrimony: a sacrament similar in scope and power to that of Holy Communion/Eucharist. In fact, Holy Matrimony is meant to signify (a sacrament is a visible sign indicating a greater invisible and/or supernatural reality) the enduring and unbreakable love for Jesus Christ the Bridegroom for His Bride the Church.

If you feel as though you are in a position where Convalidation is possible, please call the Rectory to discuss the process involved. Couples who are not in a recognized Catholic Marriage should not receive Holy Communion and are not qualified to be Catholic godparent until the Convalidation process is complete.

Regardless of what happened in the past, the Catholic Church invites you to bring new meaning to your lives by embracing the vocation of marriage and dedicating your family's mission to sharing God's love.
