


## **BLESS YOUR DOOR ON EPIPHANY**

The gospel tells us that the magi found Christ "on entering the house." The door to your home is a holy threshold. You can bless those who come in and go out by inscribing above the door in chalk the first two numbers of the

year + C + M + B + the last two numbers of the year. Tradition tells us that the letters stand for the names of the magi: Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar. Adolph Adam points out that it may also mean "Christus mansionem benedicat" or "May Christ bless this dwelling." It's appropriate to bless your door in January—janua means "door" and the first month is the door to the new year. After inscribing the doorway, say this prayer:

God of Bethlehem and Cana, God of Jordan's leaping waters, in baptism you bring us into your family. You wed us and embrace us as vour beloved. May we fill this place with kindness to one another, with hospitality to guests, and with abundant care for every stranger. By the gentle light of a star, guide home all who seek you on paths of faith, hope and love. Then we will join the angels in proclaiming your praise: Glory in heaven and peace on earth, Now and forever. Amen



**REVELATION OF GLORY** 

Our Feast of the Epiphany came to us from the East, both in name and in spirit. The East celebrated Jesus' birth and his manifestation as God and King on January 6<sup>th</sup>. For us, it also celebrates Jesus' manifestation or revealing of himself as God in

the child in the manger and as king to the three kings or Magi who came seeking "the king of the Jews." Today, Jesus tells us that he is here among us as God and King.

What is central for us to remember when we celebrate the Feast of the Epiphany is that this feast commemorates the revelation of the glory of the Lord to all people. Yes, it was the kings who came seeking Jesus and who found him. But those kings were from far away and represent all the people of the world. Jesus revealed his glory not just to a few foreign tourists but to everyone.

When we look back to the First Reading, we hear Isaiah describing a vision of the last days of the world. "Rise up in splendor, Jerusalem! Your light has come and the glory of the Lord shines upon you...Nations shall walk by your light and kings by your shining radiance."

This brings us back to all of us here today. We don't know who will be around at the last days of the world, but that doesn't really matter because we are living right here and now, and our response right now is what is important.

When we come here for our Eucharistic celebration, we also come to honor God and to offer ourselves under the sign of the Eucharistic gifts. The gifts that we offer represent our recognition of the glory of the Lord and our surrender to that glory.

In every Eucharist we offer ourselves and honor God. This isn't unique to today's Feast of the Epiphany, but today's feast recalls this for us. It reminds us that we, too, offer the gold, frankincense and myrrh of our talents, our gifts and our lives to God. It reminds us to do it consciously and deliberately. It also reminds us that God's glory has been revealed to all of us through those kings so long ago, but God's glory can also be revealed to others through us.

#### **BE A PRAYER PARTNER WITH POPE FRANCIS**

## **NEW DIOCESAN COVID PROTOCOLS**

Having conferred with Fr. Flannery, we share the following: Our Bishop has issued a mandate requiring face masks be worn by everyone entering and attending mass at St. Mary's. The Bishop states "since a vaccine verification requirement would be difficult, if not impossible, for churches to implement, we believe the mask mandate is the most efficient option for parishes of the Diocese of Albany. While we realize that this may not be convenient or comfortable, we want to do all we can to ensure the safety of those who celebrate, assist at and attend Mass throughout the remainder of the Advent and Christmas season. This mandate is effective December 13, 2021 through January 15, 2022, at which time we will reassess its effectiveness based on public health conditions."

Respectfully, we ask that all (over 2yrs old), including those who have been fully vaccinated to properly wear a mask whenever we are inside church. In addition, we encourage the use of hand sanitizers and ask that all continue to follow the directions of the ushers. The church continues to be completely sanitized after each mass in order to provide a safe environment.

At this time, we will not be checking vaccination status, reintroducing 6 foot social distancing or gathering of information for contact tracing. Therefore, the wearing of masks is that much more important to maintaining a safe environment.

Unless you are arriving with a group or are part of a family we ask that you choose your seating in order to maintain a respectful distance from others and when receiving communion. Ushers will be glad to assist you in locating appropriate seating (this may include seats upstairs).
