

From Father Tom—Will the Church of the Future be Smaller?

This past weekend, the ice storm caused most parishioners to stay home on Sunday. Uncharacteristically, I was happy that only a few people showed up for the 11:15 AM Mass and no one showed up for the 8:15 Mass at all! (I usually hope and pray for a filled church every weekend, but I was happy that didn't occur last weekend!) I don't think Our Lord would want us to risk life and limb to get to church in such circumstances. Father Nathaniel, however, was able to celebrate a Mass for those few who did show up at 11:15 AM. And one intrepid family braved the ice storm to come for their baby's baptism which was scheduled for that day. God bless them for their courage and their faith!

The night before the storm, our 4:00 PM Vigil Mass was crowded, no doubt because of the weather reports informed us ahead-oftime that ice was coming on Sunday morning. It was so gratifying to see our church nearly filled that evening, mostly with older parishioners. That fact reminded me to be grateful to the priests and teachers of we older Catholics who taught us the importance – not just the obligation – of attending Mass every weekend. They taught us to seek out the many graces we need and would receive by worthy and weekly reception of the Holy Eucharist and listening to the proclamation of the Word of God.

There weren't many young people at the 4:00 PM Mass last weekend and that fact made me to ruminate about why that may be so and about the difference in the religious education we older Catholics received in the 1950's and 1960's and the religious formation of the current generation. Of course, we have scores of young Catholics and young Catholic families in our parish who are regular attendees at Mass each weekend and who love holy Mass. However, on a more global level, I couldn't help but think that the "tug" we older Catholics feel for Mass may not be as compelling in the lives of a great many of our younger generation.

Don't get me wrong. I am not indicting all younger people today, nor am I disparaging the wonderful faith formation programs and dedicated catechists who've worked so hard to stress the importance of Mass attendance, but statistics show that the population of our Church at-large is greying and that younger people today are just not connected to us, to the faith we share, and to participation in the Sacraments. Of course, there are many reasons for this and experts are always analyzing the causes behind this trend. Books, lectures and podcasts are rife with various opinions about this disconnect. It is important that we understand why this is happening. I find, however, many of these discussions taxing, ending up in "analysis-paralysis" with very few solutions.

The Catholic faith blossomed and ebbed over the centuries for varying reasons and in different cultures. Take, for example, the suppression in Communist Europe not so long ago. A priest I knew was sent as the first Bishop of Albania after the fall of Communism a few decades ago. He later told a group of us: "When I got there, I found no churches and many people who had never known a priest, a church, a prayer or a faith. Communism was very successful in spreading its ideology!"

Today, the suppression of our faith comes not only from our own human nature which has always wanted to live life on its own terms, but also from the dominant secular culture which we take in like mother's milk. We live in a seemingly benign conspiracy to keep religion out of the public sphere, out of site, and consequently, of no importance to "real people", the "hip", the "educated" and "the enlightened". What matters most in the secular mind is success in relational, physical and material things. What matters are "the things of the world". Unfortunately, and very sadly, our young people, and we ourselves, are very often suckers for this kind of evangelization.

Several decades ago, Pope Benedict, before he assumed the papacy, saw the same thing happening throughout the Western world. He predicted that the Church would become smaller but that it would result in a more intentional and faithful Church. Many people worried that he was becoming too gloomy when he wrote this prediction. However, courageous man that he is, he was facing reality, smack in the face.

When we believe in a cause or project, we like to point to big numbers of followers and supporters who share our cause. That validates us. In decades past, Catholics became used to a growing and expanding church and a general feeling of respect for the Church even from unbelievers and often cynics. This has all changed over these last several decades and many of us are stymied by this total cultural flip-flop. But we've got to keep in mind that such changes are not new in the life of the church and, in this kind of confusing landscape, the Church has always been rebooted with greater enthusiasm to foster growth and to flourish. It is in these times that the Church has experienced the arrival of new kinds of believers, especially among the young, willing to sacrifice and make accommodations to insure the Church's mission to spread the Good News to all is valiantly and effectively proclaimed.

Here are some ideas that I think will help us to continue our mission in spite of what appears to be the gathering of dark clouds in the sky:


- Our faith blossomed in the midst of a pagan world. We can blossom now if we have the courage, the zeal and deep commitment to our missionary mandate.
- We will be successful in evangelizing this generation if we accept the conditions of how and why they got to where they are and use these as a starting point for engagement.
- We need to abandon nostalgia for how the church used-to-be.
- We need to be pro-active in reaching out to them in creative ways and not "kick the can down the road" waiting for their "wake-up call".
- And of course, the entire enterprise must be built upon prayer for God to enlighten us and see our efforts to completion and success. (When was the last time your parish scheduled an evening of prayer for the success of the evangelization of young people of this generation?

So, let us proceed in prayer, hope, confidence and a pro-active plan and posture. Like missionaries of old, countless unbelievers are often desperately counting on us.

And we'll lament and mourn over the loss of so many innocent souls whose lives have been cut short by the evil of abortion.






