



There exists in each one of us a person who hails our King with hosannas and a person who is all too willing to choose Jesus over Barabbas for the cross. 


#### Dear St. Mary Parishioners,

# From Deacon Higby's Desk

#### Theology 101: The First Testament - Part 56

After Haman returns to his home in shame, his wife and friends point out that if Mordecai is a Jew, Haman will not prevail against him.

Esther has prepared a second banquet and invited the king and Haman to it. As the people sit around drinking wine, the king tells Esther that whatever request she makes of him, even if it's half his kingdom, he will honor it. Esther begs that the king spare her life and that of her people, saying that if he had commanded them to go into slavery, she would remain silent, but if someone were to make her people extinct, the king would lose loyal subjects and that could never be replaced. The king asks who is planning to do this, and she indicates that it is Haman. The king became very angry and went out into the garden. Haman, realizing what was likely to happen next, throws himself onto the queen's couch (she is reclining) and begs for his life. The king returns to the banquet hall and sees Haman in this compromised position. He cries out "Will he also violate the queen while she is with me in my own house?"

Harbona, one of the eunuchs of the palace, helpfully tells the king that Haman has built a gibbet fifty cubits high to hang Mordecai, who had given the report that had benefited the king. The king orders that Haman be hanged from it.

The king gave Haman's house to Queen Esther and admitted Mordecai to his inner circle now that Esther had revealed their relationship. Esther again approached the king and begged him to issue a decree revoking that of Haman, which had given leave to the people of the kingdom to kill all the Jews and take their property. The king ordered Mordecai to write the new document, which is recorded in the Book of Esther. In it the king recognizes that Mordecai has prevented the kingdom from falling into the hands of the Macedonians, and that the Jews are not evildoers, but have a wonderful legal system of their own, which they are free to use to govern themselves. Furthermore, the Jews were allowed to band together and destroy anyone who sought their harm. This the Jews did, killing five hundred men in the town of Susa, including the sons of Haman. They killed three hundred the next day. In the entire kingdom the Jews killed 75,000 of their enemies. Esther asked the king to hang the bodies of the ten sons of Haman on gibbets, which was done.

Mordecai then ordered the Jews in the kingdom to "henceforth" celebrate the two days when they turned the tables on their enemies. It was called "Purim" because Haman had cast lots to determine when the Jews would be exterminated ("pur" means "lots"). Queen Esther confirmed this feast with her royal authority.

At the end of the book, Mordecai recognizes that his dream has been fulfilled and God has responded to the prayers of God's people.

The story of Esther was written about 400 years before Christ and is meant to console the Jewish people in exile. That God answers the prayers of his people by raising up blameless individuals is quite clearly the theme here. The story itself shows remarkable literary skill. The book we have today was originally written in Hebrew, and when translated into Greek several verses were added. The original Hebrew text has no mention of God, interestingly. ~Donald Higby
