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

WHY CATHOLIC?

I have met countless people over the years that have identified as having been raised as Catholic but who no longer subscribe to any religion. Some former Catholics decided that they would prefer other religious groups for various reasons. Others believe that we cannot prove God's existence; therefore, why participate in something that holds no meaning for personal growth. I suppose there are many reasons for some people to abandon the Catholic faith.



Undoubtedly, there is evidence in the long history of the Church of immoral and

criminal activity on the part of some popes, bishops, priests, and other religious figures. So, why do we stay? Why do we continue as Catholics and submit our will to the authority of the Catholic Church? In fact, I would like to take this one step further and explain why I love being a Catholic.

For me, it all goes back to the relationship between Jesus and Peter. As we all know, the name Peter means "rock." We know that Jesus changed Peter's name to Peter from Simon. Now, let's consider just what might be the significance of such a name change for Peter, our very first Pope? In the Old Testament, God was referred to as a "Rock." *Psalm 18:2 says, "The Lord is my rock, my fortress, my deliverer..." Deuteronomy 32:4 says, "He is the Rock, his works are perfect, and all his ways are just."* In the New Testament, we see that Jesus is referred to as "Rock." *1 Corinthians 10:4, "...and all drank the same spiritual drink. For they drank from the spiritual Rock that followed them, and the Rock was Christ."* In Matthew 21:42, we see that Jesus said to them, "Have you never read in the Scriptures: The stone the builders rejected has become the cornerstone; the Lord has done this, and it is marvelous in our eyes?" What is profoundly awe-inspiring is what Jesus now does with this idea of "rock." *In Matthew 16:18, Jesus says to Simon, "...Now I say to you that you are Peter (which means 'rock'), and upon this Rock, I will build my Church, and all the powers of hell will not conquer it."*

What is essential for us to understand here is not so much the idea of Rock as found in the scriptures, but the progression of those entities identified and named as "rock" in the sacred writings. In the Old Testament, it was God and only God that the people relied upon for salvation. God was their Rock. Along comes Jesus, our Savior, and Redeemer. He is fully God and fully human, and He is identified as our Rock, the Cornerstone. What happens next is profoundly moving, in that Jesus turns the whole shebang over to none other than Peter. Yep, the same guy who denied him three times with all of his human fears and human weakness and He then commissions Peter as the Rock, the foundation of his Church.

In this simple example, we can see how the entire history of salvation progressed in the Scriptures from God our Father who is fully God, to Jesus, our savior who is fully God and fully human, and now to Peter, who was fully human and who became our first pope and Christ's vicar on earth. For me, it is precisely this obvious progression in our salvation history that enables me to love being Catholic! We have an unbroken chain of succession from God, our Father, to Christ, fully God and fully human, to Peter, fully human, and from Peter to the one who sits on the Chair of Peter in Rome today, Pope Francis. Pope Francis is our spiritual Father and our Rock. He holds the keys, and he is our shepherd (*By the way, this same meaningful progression in scripture is also true for the themes of holding the keys of salvation and being the shepherd of God's people*). ~ Chris Leary

Theology 101: Early Church History- Part 21

When we think of people who greatly influenced Roman Catholic Christianity, Saint Paul, Saint Augustine, and Saint Thomas Aquinas come to mind. But one person who probably had as much influence as these is Saint Jerome. Jerome was born around 350 A.D. to Christian parents. As was the custom, he did not receive Baptism until he was a young adult; however, by that time he had proven himself an apt student in philosophy and literature. After baptism, he traveled widely and became interested in monasticism. He associated with a group of monks where he became involved in local theological debates. He then went on a pilgrimage to the Holy Land. There he had a dream in which he stood before a court and was sentenced to a beating because he was a "Ciceronian" not a Christian. After this he resolved never again to read pagan literature. He tried being a hermit, but that didn't work out and he then went to Antioch, where he was ordained a priest. He had learned Hebrew from a Jewish convert and became fluent in Greek as well. He had gained fame for translating the works of Origen (a third century theologian) and Eusebius (an historian of early Christianity). In his mid-30's he became secretary to Pope Damasius and began to translate the Greek scriptures into Latin. The Latin scriptures in use at that time were full of errors, but his efforts were met with hostility by the Roman clergy. When Pope Damasius died, he and several associates, including women who had formed a sort of monastic order, went to the Holy Land where they established a monastery and cloisters for the women. There Jerome continued the work of translating the scriptures into then - modern Latin. He also began the process of translating Hebrew scriptures, usually from the Greek translation then in use, but when available from the original Hebrew. Jerome never completed this massive project, but successors did, and ultimately the product became what is still known as the "Vulgate" bible.

The Vulgate became the official bible of the Catholic Church shortly afterward. This meant that there was no more controversy about what was in the Bible (many candidate writings were rejected) and more importantly, what the Bible actually said. The Vulgate became the bedrock of Christian theology. The Council of Trent recognized it as "authentic" compared to other bibles available then. Pope John Paul II recognized a modified re-translation as normative for the Western church (other rites have their own translations). (The Catholic Church always held that the original documents when available were even more important, but the Latin Vulgate remained authoritative.) The Western Church eventually set about translating the Vulgate into modern languages. Before Vatican II, the Douay-Rheims bible was the official English translation. Martin Luther translated the Vulgate into German, and other Protestant reformers continued this practice.

In recent years there's been a movement to go back to the original documents when available and new translations have been put forth. But the Latin translation initiated by Jerome remains the "official" bible of the Catholic Church.

Western Mass Charity Dance-a-Thon canceled

Due to the sharp rise in COVID, the Western Mass Charity Dance-a-Thon is canceled for February 11-12,2022 and rescheduled for next February. In spite of the cancellation, two grants will be
