

J.E.D.I. (Justice, Equity, and Inclusion Tidbit)—

St. Benedict the Moor Catholic Church in New York City, the first Black parish north of the Mason-Dixon line, has been sold to a developer in a \$16M deal. The historic property in Hell's Kitchen, which over its 154-year existence has hosted prominent Black Catholics from around the country, had been deconsecrated since 2017. The buyer is the JMM Charitable Foundation. It was the first Catholic church in New York City to welcome Blacks and was always used to call attention to racial prejudice in America. The church had moved from its original location in Greenwich Village, where the congregation was founded in 1883. In the late 1890s, the current property was acquired. The golden years of St. Benedict the Moor soon followed, with thousands of registered members and a congregation made up of roughly 50% converts; the church served as a national parish for all the African Americans of the city. Black Catholics and others also chose the venue for significant events, including the first stateside mass of Venerable Augustus Tolton, following his 1886 ordination in Rome as the first openly African-American Catholic priest.
