

The over 60 million abortions since the 1973 decisions of Roe v. Wade and Doe v. Bolton reflect with heartbreaking magnitude what Pope Francis means by a "throwaway culture." However, we have great trust in God's providence. We are reminded time and again in Scripture to seek the Lord's help, and as people of faith, we believe that our pravers are heard. The General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM), no. 373, designates January 22 as a particular day of prayer and penance, called the "Day of Prayer for the Legal Protection of Unborn Children": "In all the Dioceses of the United States of America, January 22 (or Jan. 23, when Jan. 22 falls on a Sunday) shall be observed as a particular day of prayer for the full restoration of the legal guarantee of the right to life and of penance for violations to the dignity of the human person committed through acts of abortion." As individuals, we are called to observe this day through the penitential practices of prayer, fasting and/or giving alms.

SAINT OF THE WEEK

According to his legend, Sebastian was born at Narbonne, Gaul. He became a soldier in the Roman army at Rome in about 283, and encouraged Marcellian and Marcus, under sentence of death, to remain firm in their faith. Sebastian made numerous converts: among them were the master of the rolls, Nicostratus, who was in charge of prisoners and his wife, Zoe, a deaf mute whom he cured; the jailer Claudius; Chromatius, Prefect of Rome, whom he cured of gout; and Chromatius' son, Tiburtius. Chromatius set the prisoners free, freed his slaves, and resigned as prefect.

Sebastian was named captain in the praetorian guards by Emperor Diocletian, as did Emperor Maximian when Diocletian went to the East. Neither knew that Sebastian was a Christian. When it was discovered during Maximian's persecution of the Christians that Sebastian was indeed a Christian, he was ordered executed. He was shot with arrows and left for dead, but when the widow of St. Castulus went to recover his body, she found he was still alive and nursed him back to health. Soon after, Sebastian intercepted the Emperor, denounced him for his cruelty to Christians, and was beaten to death on the Emperor's orders.

Saint Sebastian was venerated at Milan as early as the time of St. Ambrose and was buried on the Appian Way. He is patron of archers, athletes, and soldiers, and is appealed to for protection against plagues.

He is patron saint of athletes because of his physical endurance and his energetic way of spreading and defending the Faith. Sebastian is also patron to all soldiers. He entered the Roman army under Emperor Carinus in 283 in order to defend the confessors and martyrs of his day without drawing attention to himself. His efforts kept the Faith of Marcus and Marcellian firm during their persecutions, right up to the time of their martyrdom. He was declared patron of plague sufferers of his reported cures of those afflicted with many diseases.

Regarding the Faithful Departed

Question:

How can we pray for the dead throughout the year?

Answer:

We commemorate the faithful departed on November 2nd each year. However, we can and should continue to pray for the dead. Our growth in Christian perfection takes a long time. At the time of our death, many of us might not be saints yet. But God, in His mercy, allows for those who love Him to experience purification after death. Our word for that state is Purgatory. It's the antechamber of heaven, so to speak. We know we're getting in the house, but we're not quite ready to go all the way in. There's rain to shake off our coats and dirt that's clogging our shoes.

Here on earth, we can pray for the souls in Purgatory. One way is to request that the parish offer a Mass for the intention of a specific loved one. We can also remember the departed in our daily prayers. Just as we have special intentions for family and friends here on earth, we can pray for those who have died. It's also a good act of Christian charity to pray for the forgotten, those who have no one else to pray for them. God knows who they are! "We must learn to live together as brothers or we will perish together as fools."

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IN THE WEDDING Dr. Scott Hahn Reflects on the Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

Think of these first weeks after Christmas as a season of "epiphanies." The liturgy is showing us who Jesus is and what He has revealed about our relationship with God.

Last week and the week before, the imagery was royal and filial—Jesus is the newborn king of the Jews who makes us coheirs of Israel's promise, beloved children of God. Last week in the liturgy we went to a baptism.

This week we're at a wedding.

We're being shown another dimension of our relationship with God. If we're sons and daughters of God, it's because we've married into the family.

Have you ever wondered why the Bible begins and ends with a wedding—Adam and Eve's in the garden and the marriage supper of the Lamb (compare Genesis 2:23–24 and Revelation 19:9; 21:9; 22:17)?

Throughout the Bible, marriage is the symbol of the covenant relationship God desires with His chosen people. He is the groom, humanity His beloved and sought after bride. We see this reflected beautifully in today's First Reading.

When Israel breaks the covenant, she is compared to an unfaithful spouse (see Jeremiah 2:20–36; 3:1–13). But God promises to take her back, to "espouse" her to Him forever in an everlasting covenant (see Hosea 2:18–22).

That's why in today's Gospel Jesus performs His first public "sign" at a wedding feast.

Jesus is the divine bridegroom (see John 3:29), calling us to His royal wedding feast (see Matthew 22:1–14). By His New Covenant, He will become "one flesh" with all humanity in the Church (see Ephesians 5:21–33). By our baptism, each of us has been betrothed to Christ as a bride to a husband (see 2 Corinthians 11:2).

The new wine that Jesus pours out at today's feast is the gift of the Holy Spirit given to His bride and body, as today's Epistle says. This is the "salvation" announced to the "families of nations" in today's Psalm.

EN LAS BODAS

Dr. Scott Hahn reflexiona sobre el 2º domingo de Tiempo Ordinario

Consideremos estas semanas posteriores a la Navidad, como una época de "epifanías". Durante este tiempo, la Liturgia de la Palabra nos muestra quién es Jesús y qué nos ha revelado sobre nuestra relación con Dios.

El domingo pasado las imágenes fueron reales y filiales. Jesús fue mostrado como el recién nacido rey de los judíos que nos hace coherederos de la promesa de Dios a Israel. Como Israel, nosotros seremos hijos amados de Dios. Ahora, nos encontramos en una boda. Se nos muestra otra dimensión de nuestra relación con Dios. Si somos hijos suyos, es porque hemos sido incorporados a la familia divina por medio de una boda.

¿Alguna vez se han preguntado por qué la Biblia comienza y termina con la narración de una boda, la de Adán y Eva en el Paraíso, y el banquete matrimonial del Cordero (comparen Gn 2,23-24 con Ap 19,9; 21,9; 22,17)? A lo largo de la Escritura, el matrimonio es el símbolo de la relación-alianza que Dios quiere tener con su pueblo escogido. Él es el Esposo y la humanidad es su amada y muy buscada novia. En la primera lectura de hoy vemos reflejada la belleza de esta imagen.

Cuando Israel rompe esta alianza, se le compara con una cónyuge infiel (cfr. Jr 2,20-36; 3,1-13). Sin embargo, Dios le promete tomarla de nuevo y desposarse con ella para siempre, en una alianza perpetua (cfr. Os 2,18-22).

Esa es la razón por la cual Cristo realiza su primera "señal" en una fiesta nupcial. Él es el Novio divino (cfr. Jn 3,29) que nos llama a su real banquete de bodas (cfr. Mt 22,1-14). Por esta Nueva Alianza, Él se hará "una sola carne" con toda la humanidad en la Iglesia (cfr. Ef 5, 21-33). Por medio de nuestro bautismo, cada uno de nosotros ha sido prometido a Cristo, como una novia a su Esposo (cfr. 2 Co 11,2).

El vino nuevo que Jesús nos da en el banquete de hoy, es el don del Espíritu Santo dado a su novia y cuerpo, como dice la epístola de este día. Esa es la salvación anunciada a las "familias de los pueblos", que cantamos en el salmo.



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
