Dear Believers in the Christ,

In Luke 2: 22-40, we hear with our own ears the beautiful words of Simeon who spotted the child Jesus. He had waited in the Temple for many years for that moment. I imagine him with a grey beard and old dark clothing in the dark, dusty temple. Most people would have passed him up as another old, crazy man without a place to go. People must have known who he was and why he persistently waited in prayer. Then it happened, his eyes fell upon the small child with Mary and Joseph. His words were prophetic and wise.

Simeon becomes a prophet. His presence and his words ushered in a new reality. The child was destined to change the world. The gospel writer, Luke, puts these words into the old man's mouth: "Now, Master, you may let your servant go in peace, according to your word, for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you prepared in sight of all the peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and glory for your people Israel." These words are still prayed during Night Prayer in the Church. Imagine, for centuries, we have proclaimed just before bed, the beauty of Simeon's testimony, that he lived long enough to see the child, who was destined to redeem the world.

Simeon also has words for Mary that would change her life. I am sure she would never have expected such an encounter bearing the small child in the temple. Simeon says these words, "Behold, this child is destined for the fall and rise of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be contradicted—and you yourself a sword will pierce—so that the thoughts of many hearts may be revealed." These words spoken to Mary become Mary's first of the Seven Sorrows. She will treasure the meaning of those words throughout her life and will live out such a prediction as she will learn to stand with Jesus during all the moments of his suffering.

As we continue to celebrate Christmas, we too, are part of the Holy Family. Through the gift of our baptism, we stand with those who waited to see the Christ Child and those who would witness his ministry, and his passion, death, and resurrection. We are part of God's plan as well.

Now that the initial celebration of Christmas is past, at least the wrappings are off the gifts and the leftovers are in the refrigerator, we turn to this feast that celebrates our connection to something more than our earthly families. I am sure this Christmas has initiated new plans and various kinds of celebrations than in the past, due to the pandemic. The one thing the pandemic does not do is to rip apart our understanding that we still belong in God. We are still part of the family in which we celebrate today. The Holy Family is not just about Jesus and his parents, but about the connection that Christ has with his people. Here, the water of baptism is thicker than the blood of family. I rely on that to be true.

The Holy Family becomes another link as to why we serve people who most need us. We honor all of life, including the unborn, and those who need to be raised, educated and clothed. We honor our adults in nursing homes, and those in long-term facilities suffering from horrific disabilities and disease. There are no distinctions as to who is in the Family of God and who is not. Even our enemies must be cared for by the Christian. The Holy Family is an extended celebration of the Incarnation, Christmas, that is, God-with-us.

I hope that Zoom and FaceTime can carry the faces into your lives of those you love across the globe during these Christmas days. We ache to see the faces of those we love, just as Simeon finally laid his eyes on Jesus's tiny eyes and grin. I want desperately for people to realize they belong in God. There is nothing that keeps any of us apart. Belonging is a fundamental notion of being human. And so many people feel at one point or another in life, that they do not belong, either in their families or in the Church.

Let's make sure as the calendar turns the page to another year, that we take seriously Simeon and Anna in the gospel of Luke, that they waited to see Jesus even in their old age. They knew they belonged in God's plan. Anna waited in the temple for years. She too, becomes a messenger of the reality of Jesus in the world. Perhaps we can work on making sure all people are supported, fed, educated, housed and listened to. Perhaps, our faith this year will challenge us to gaze upon the stranger and see the face of Jesus. I am counting on it.

You know how the Catholic Church works. We have appointed readings for each day of the year. Very few Masses have multiple options for readings (although if we decide to commemorate a particular saint we might have special readings). Christmas, of course, has a number of options in the lectionary, depending on the time of day the Mass is celebrated. But surprisingly, although the Vigil Mass has several choices to make, Easter Day itself has no options.

So I'm not sure why, but there are multiple options for the readings and psalms for the Feast of the Holy Family each year. But whatever the reason, it seems appropriate to me that there might be multiple ways to celebrate family.

Have you seen those memes or messages on social media that go something like this: "Family is where you'll always be accepted." Or "A sister is always your best friend for life." These saccharine *bon mots* are sincerely meant, obviously by those who enjoy good relationships with their all of their closest kin.

But that closeness is not always the case with everyone. Many families I know, including mine on both sides, have so-called black sheep in them, or estranged siblings or cousins, who don't even talk to each other. And for some people, regrettably, friends are much closer to them than anyone in their family. So I think it is symbolically fitting that we have different options for our readings on the Feast of the Holy Family – because there are so many different ways to experience family!

The Holy Family, of course, remains for us a model of love and commitment to one another, and it's always ideal when our own natural family remains close to us for our whole lives. But whether it is with our natural or adoptive families, or with our dearest friends in life, we are all called to imitate the selfless love that bound Mary, Joseph, and Jesus together: a commitment to each other based on compassion, self-sacrifice, and a burning love for God.

On this Feast of the Holy Family, let us pray for reconciliation among all family members. And may God bless each of our families, however we define them, with the same love that enveloped the Holiest of families.

The Octave of Christmas

As a reminder, Christmas is celebrated as an octave in the Catholic Church, meaning Christmas is one liturgy celebrated for eight days from Dec. 25–Jan. 1. We encourage you to consider attending Mass on one of those days if you were not able to sign up for Christmas Eve or Day Mass. You don't need reservations for the 8 am Daily Mass at Sacred Heart, however seating is limited to the first 50 people. The Christmas Season continues until the Baptism of the Lord on Jan. 10. Please remember that during this time, ***all the faithful are dispensed from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass and Holy Days, including Christmas.***

Also, please note that if El Paso County moves to "level purple" on the COVID-19 dial, all Masses will be canceled at Sacred Heart Parish. We will continue to offer the live-stream of the 5:30 pm Saturday Vigil Mass at Sacred Heart Church. Check the bulletin or our website for updates.

Food as Ministry

Hungry? Probably not, except for pandemic “munchy cravings.” Most of us in this parish are probably not suffering from food hunger. Although, there are some in our greater community that are acutely suffering from food insecurity with *not quite enough to satisfy daily nutritional needs*. However, some of us have been suffering from a different type of hunger. A hunger for ministering in a meaningful way. I recall a quote by Fr. Herb Yost, CSC in a Holy Cross Magazine: “*God will get you where you’re needed!*” Sure, right!

Well, out of the blue, I got a call from Grace Donnelly, our parish *Communications, Volunteer & Safe Environment Coordinator*. The parish wanted to start up the parish Food Pantry following the shut down in March due to the pandemic— would I be interested? And would I be interested in being the Coordinator? Is this the “*God will get you...*” moment? I think I said YES. At least Grace said I said yes.

After the “YES,” Grace and I sat down and discussed the history, some parish expectations, resources, and support. I laid out a few “must haves,” such as having a Co-Coordinator willing to commit to the project. We then discussed things like accountability, budget, a potential open date, a parish call for volunteers, volunteer eligibility, volunteer scheduling, development of parish Food Pantry policies (procedures, health, and safety) and an open parish meeting of interested folks to present the pastor’s vision, an implementation plan and to gain personal commitments. A November 19th meeting was scheduled and attended by 18 folks. After hearing Fr. Ron’s vision, Grace’s parish Health and Safety policies and my operations plan, all of the attendees made the commitment to serve. A further blessing came when, Kate Gioglio, who had previous experience operating a food pantry in New Jersey after Hurricane Sandy, agreed to be the Co-Coordinator. So, the initial team was set with: Peggy A., Liz A., Randy C., Katherine C., Maryann D., Rita D., Kate G., Bill and Shawne G., Patty K., David M., Michael P., Mike P., Barry S., Debbie S., Eileen S., Jim V., and Larry W. During all the preplanning, three volunteers, Peggy A., Debbie S., and Patty K. graciously went through the Food Pantry and performed a much-needed sorting and disposing of expired food products. Jimmy, our Maintenance Technician, did a deep clean, painted the floors and reconstructed the front operations table. Both Kate and I completed the required Food Safety Course and were certified to reestablish access to the Care and Share Food Bank. And Grace sent out the word that we would be open on Thursdays, 10-12 noon, beginning December 3rd.

The Food Pantry mission is to serve our Westside neighbors with supplemental non-perishable food items. We opened on December 3rd with Fr. Ron blessing the team and the Food Pantry operations. On day one, we served nine neighbors representing 25 people total, including two unsheltered and six whose food need was related to COVID. As initially expected, we have not seen as great a need-response to date. Our Food Pantry has been closed for nine months. It will take time to get the word out that we have reopened. However, once the word spreads, we anticipate seeing greater numbers. We are one of just a few food pantries operating on the Westside. There are no more requirements liking needing a voucher from Westside CARES or limitations as to how many times someone can utilize our Food Pantry services. If you or anyone you know is in need of food assistance, please visit our Sacred Heart Food Pantry. As the Sacred Heart Food Pantry Team, we are honored and committed to serving members of parish who might need a bit of food assistance, as well as our Westside neighbors. Please spread the word.

Since scheduling the initial Volunteer Interest Meeting in November, we have been blessed with additional volunteers who have expressed their interest in serving in this ministry. Food Pantry volunteers must be at least 18 years old and a registered parishioner. If you are interested in serving, contact Bill at 719-213-6375.

We are most appreciative of our parishioners who have made food donations to our Food Pantry. You are a continuous source of support in this important ministry. The Food Pantry is always in need of the following food items: dry milk, canned soup, canned protein (tuna, chicken, ham), Mac-n-cheese, canned veggies, peanut butter, jelly/jam, dry cereal, dried beans, instant rice, raisins, bottled water, granola/protein bars, Ramen Noodles. If you would like to make a food donation, please bring items to Mass or call the Parish Office at 633-8711 to arrange a drop off Monday-Thursday, from 9 am- 3:30 pm. Also, special thanks to our parishioners who continuously donate plastic and paper grocery bags to save us the added expense of having to purchase bags. We are currently still collecting paper grocery bags. And lastly, thank you to our parishioners who have made monetary donations to the Food Pantry. We appreciate your willingness to give your financial support to fund our ministry to provide food to those in need.
