For justice to make its home in us all.



For healing to flood my soul.

Reflection

Many of you may have noticed that I often explore the meaning of words in my homilies. In today's gospel, John uses three words that he finds necessary to translate for his readers: *Rabbi* (Hebrew for *Teacher*), *Messiah* (Hebrew for *Christ*), and *Cephas* (Aramaic for *Peter*).

You can see how these three words are important. Jesus is our Teacher, and He is the Christ (which means the "Anointed One"). Jesus gives his disciple Simon a nickname, *Cephas*, which means "Rock". And we've turned the Greek word for rock (*petros*) into Peter.

Defining the meaning of words, as John did, is always important when you want to understand things.

We Americans are currently struggling to understand such important words as patriotism, democracy, loyalty, and leadership. What do they mean? Who gets to define them? How do we live them out?

We as Christians ask similar questions of our faith: What does love and justice and mercy mean? Who has the authority to teach us about them? How do we live out love and justice and mercy in our daily lives?

For all of these words today, as a nation and as a Church, we could benefit from some serious reflection and solemn prayer to understand what their meanings truly are.

Rocky Mountain Mass and Adoration for Life, Jan 18 - 22

Because of Covid-19 restrictions, we are **NOT** able to march from Planned Parenthood nor gather for lunch this year, but the Mass will be celebrated per usual! **Eucharistic Adoration and a Divine Mercy chaplet will be at 11 am, followed by noon Mass** with Bishop Sheridan. We have added a five-day **Adoration for Life Event**, which will commence at various churches in the diocese immediately following the Monday Mass and will conclude at **12:10 pm on Friday, Jan. 22**, with the **Mass for the Legal Protection of Unborn Children** with Bishop Sheridan at St. Mary's Cathedral. Update on the St. André Meeting House

We continue to work on the pre-construction steps for the renovation of the old rectory into the St. André Meeting House. We completed design development drawings and submitted those to the Diocese for approval in November 2020. Preliminary project costs are \$1.25 million for ADA bathrooms and new meeting space upstairs and downstairs. With "next-step" Diocesan approvals in hand, bidding for construction will occur this spring. We will request parish approval, and final Diocesan approvals to proceed in May of 2021. If we stay on-track and complete a successful Capital Campaign, the parish will celebrate the St. André Meeting House throughout the 2021 Christmas season.

We are so grateful for the ways you continue to offer financial support to our three churches, Sacred Heart, Our Lady of Perpetual Help, and Holy Rosary. Thank you all for continuing your pledges to pay off our church restoration at Sacred Heart. Please pray for the success of this upcoming Meeting House project. Thank you for your continued support of our parish.

End Racism in Our Community

Monday, Jan. 18th is Martin Luther King, Jr. Day. We can honor Dr. King by continuing his work to end racism in our country. When it comes to defeating racism and prejudice, there isn't just one right way to make a difference, there are many. The most important thing you can do is to find some way to act, right now, right where you are. Here are several ideas to get you started.

Be Aware of Our Own Prejudices

We all have biases and prejudices because we have all been exposed to racist images, ideas, etc. It is important to be aware of our own prejudices so we can choose new thought patterns and actions.

Educate Ourselves

We all need to expand our world view to better understand this difficult and persistent problem. Research places to start or to continue learning.

Talk with Children and Youth about Racism

Children are getting prejudiced messages from all around them. We need to openly talk about racism with the children in our lives so they learn the values of fairness and equality.

Speak Up When We Hear Something Hurtful

It's always hard to know the right thing to say in the moment, but all we need is the courage to say "That doesn't seem right" and start the conversation.

Show Up in Person

Be physically present at a rally, march, or other event challenging racism.

Be a Healing Presence

If someone you know has experienced racism, try not to explain away their experience. Instead listen with an open heart. Healing begins when others care enough to hear somebody else's pain.

Be a Witness

If you ever see a person in a position of power mistreating someone, stay and be a witness. You have a right to film law enforcement or other officials if necessary. The ACLU and other organizations have apps to help you do so.

Tutor an English Learner

Helping someone learn English communicates the powerful message that you value and care about the other person. This is also a great way of expanding your own perspective and understanding the ethnic prejudices immigrants face. Learn more by contacting Catholic Charities or your local school district.

Tell Elected Officials We Care

Email or pick up the phone to let those who make decisions for our community and nation know that we care about racial justice and are paying attention to their action or inaction.

Find Your Own Ways to Speak Up and Act Against Racism

Look for opportunities to speak out against racism in everything you do. It is going to take all of us working together to ensure our community is a place where everyone is truly welcomed and affirmed.

Use the Arts to Explore Anti-Racism

Write, paint, or dance about the human experience of racial justice. Join or start a peace and justice choir or theater group.

Be a Good Neighbor to People of All Backgrounds

Everyday acts that are kind and respectful help to build good will across all kinds of differences.

Make Everyday Connections with People of Other Ethnic Backgrounds

Shyness around people with different backgrounds can come across as indifference or worse. A warm smile and greeting communicates respect and genuine welcome.

Invite and Hear Other Voices and Perspectives

Look for underrepresented voices in your work and community life. Ask who isn't at the table and figure out how to get them there.

Expose Children (& Adults) to other Cultures

Attend festivals, art events, or watch films about people from other cultures or ethnic backgrounds.

Don't Be Afraid to Make Mistakes

We will all stumble in this work. It is far more important to speak up and act imperfectly, than to do nothing and reinforce a hurtful and deadly system of hate.

Become Active in an Anti-Racist Organization

Join a local chapter of the NAACP, SURJ (Showing up for Racial Justice), Black Lives Matter, or other anti-racist organizations. Or, start a chapter!




