*Come after me,
I will make you fishers of men*

“They abandoned their nets and followed Him”

When Jesus calls, we answer— or at least we are supposed to. The response of the apostles was immediate; they dropped what they were doing, left their nets and fishing gear, and even their family and coworkers behind to follow Jesus. In this week’s Gospel we hear of the call of the first Apostles. They were busy men doing busy things. In the moments before Jesus called them, they were most likely scanning the waters looking for any signs of a school of fish or any hazards that might snag their nets. These were working men, focused squarely on the tasks at hand, thinking about the hot sun beating down on them, and probably not enjoying the smell of a boat full of fish in that aforementioned hot sun. Suffice it to say, these men were not fishing while waiting for Jesus to arrive on the shore and call them. They had not left home that morning in the hopes that they would make a career change from fisherman to Apostle. Yes, as faithful Jewish men there was hope for the coming of the Messiah, but there would have been scant biblical indications that the Messiah would approach them as an ordinary looking man on an ordinary looking seashore.

If we shift slightly into our modern context, there are many other things that we would need to abandon when we hear the call of Jesus. Just think of your average day at home or your average day at work. Most of us would probably greet Jesus’ call with a momentary, “Wait, Jesus, just a second, I need to (insert reason here).” Think about it— maybe that reason is that we need to silence our cellphone, or maybe just put it into airplane mode, maybe we first need to go and let our boss know, or let the neighbors know so they will not worry (certainly someone would need to stop by the house and water the plants or feed the pets!). The list can go on and on, but the point here is that when Jesus called, the Apostles answered and not only put what they were doing on pause, but abandoned it completely to follow Jesus. During this season of Ordinary Time, it may be worth asking what are some things in our lives that need to be abandoned and left on the seashore?

When preparing to write this column, I reflected upon what it would look like if this happened in the modern world today and I laughed at myself a little when the first parallel that came to mind was from a popular TV show, *The Office*. In one episode, the receptionist Pam has toiled away at installing a new printer only to achieve her goal, yet all the while longing for a more meaningful way to spend her days. She is presented with an opportunity to change careers from a receptionist to a salesperson and without hesitation, she jumps from her desk and runs out of the office to pursue a once in a lifetime opportunity. While the setting and purpose of the sudden call are markedly different from the one faced by the Apostles at the Sea of Galilee, Pam’s suddenness, and decisiveness to abandon her daily tasks bears a striking resemblance to the response of the Apostles in the Gospel. Pam’s decision in *The Office* was not one which followed the proper channels of giving a two weeks notice, training her replacement, or even logging off from her computer. It was a sudden decision in which she abandoned one way of life in favor of the next.

My main point is not that I want you to jump up from your office desk on Monday morning and bolt out of the office to start a new career, rather I would encourage you to reflect upon your readiness to follow Christ in your daily life. Each of us has attachments that sometimes delay our “yes” to God. Some of these attachments, like our families, are important to consider in our discernment process, however, there are other unhealthy attachments that are either complacent or sinful habits that we are called to abandon at the seashore of our lives. This week take some time to prepare yourself to say yes to God and be faithful to the Gospel.

Reflection

In today's second reading, Saint Paul writes to the Corinthians with some urgency (as he often does in his letters!) that "...the world in its present form is passing away." He, of course, was referring to the expectation of Christ's imminent return in glory, signaling the end of the time itself.

After two thousand years, we might not always be as worried that Christ's return will be within our own lifetime, although of course we can't know for sure and so we should always be prepared.


But we are still concerned, in a way, that the "the world in its present form is passing away," or at least dramatically changing from the way things used to be— the world of gathering together in large crowds, the world of interacting with friends and family, the world of celebrations, travel, and close human contact!

Have things changed for good? Will our familiar world ever return? The answer is that, like all things about the future, we won't know until it happens. We are not given the gift of foresight.

Instead we must apply the same suggestions that Saint Paul gives us: live as if we are not afraid, move ahead with our lives with the same command to love others as we have always known, follow Christ with the same determination as we have always had, even when things seemed more "normal."

Because Christ is the same yesterday, today, and always.



Parish Life



Conversion of Heart

January 25th is the Feast Day of the Conversion of St. Paul the Apostle. St. Paul the Apostle was the greatest of the early Christian missionaries. He first appears in the Acts of the Apostles under the name of Saul. Saul was raised in the Jewish faith as a Pharisee trained in the strict observance of God's Law. He believed the Law should be obeyed by himself and all Jews. Saul was upset by the early Christian Church, believing that the early Christians had broken away from their Jewish traditions. He actively persecuted the Church in Jerusalem. As the first Christian martyr Stephen was being stoned to death, Saul watched the cloaks of the persecutors (Acts 7:58).

Paul then traveled to Damascus to further persecute early Christians. On the road to Damascus Saul had an encounter with the Risen Jesus Christ (Acts of the Apostles 9:1–19, Galatians 1: 13–14). Jesus asked, "Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting me?" Paul replied, "Who are you, sir?" Jesus responded, "I am Jesus whom you are persecuting" (Acts 9: 4 – 5). Jesus then sent Saul into Damascus to wait for further instructions. Saul was shaken and blinded by the experience. When a Christian named Ananias came and baptized Saul, his blindness went away. As a result of this encounter Saul became a follower of Christ. He was now convinced that fellowship with the risen Jesus Christ, not the observance of the Law, was all that was needed to receive God's promise of salvation. (Galatians 1:11–12; 3:1–5)

Saul, whose name now became Paul, went to Jerusalem to consult with Peter (Galatians 1: 18). After his first missionary journeys, Paul was called by Jesus to proclaim the Gospel to the Gentiles. He spent the rest of his life journeying on his missions, establishing local churches, and writing to them when he heard of their accomplishments and failures. Paul's letters are the earliest records of the life and history of the early Church. As inspired by the Holy Spirit Paul's letters are part of the Canon of the New Testament. As a record of the happenings in the early Church they are an invaluable record of the expansion of the Christianity.

St. Paul had a major conversion and was instrumental in the spread of Christianity and the early Church. But how does St. Paul's conversion apply to us in our lives? As you will read from the story below, each day we can have a mini "conversion" of heart by choosing to follow God.

It was a normal day by all accounts, but John just wasn't feeling himself. He was a little lightheaded and out of sorts. Later in the afternoon, he experienced a sharp pain in his chest and arm. Quick thinking and action brought John to the emergency department with a diagnosis of a significant heart attack. Surviving this ordeal, he found himself face to face with his cardiologist, having an honest conversation about things that needed to change. "I came close to death," John found himself thinking. Then came the remorse. He was a young man with a loving wife and children who were very close to facing life without him. John found himself with intense sorrow for living an unchecked and self-indulgent life that almost brought him to his demise. He wanted to change.

Like St. Paul, we all have our wake-up calls. We have experiences and encounters that force us to really think twice about choices we have made and directions we have taken. Often, we find ourselves looking at those we have hurt square in the eye and wallowing in our foolishness. We regrettably realize that we have allowed our needs to lure us into making some cruel mistakes. We impulsively say things and flippantly do things that reveal our unredeemed and unhealed self. It is a self we stumble over and try to tame but can't quite seem to master and control. Help!

We spin our wheels, naively thinking that we will somehow, perhaps through persistence, get ourselves unstuck. But, we don't. We just get out of the car, feeling very helpless, and ignorantly look at the mess we got ourselves into. Did we ever think to ask someone for help? Or, taken the advice of One who is wiser and avoid this route altogether? "Come after me," are words that Jesus says to all of us. In order to heed his invitation, we must leave our ego-self behind and follow.

When we really see and understand the freedom, peace, justice, and love he offers, we find ourselves with such sorrow in our hearts for how foolish and silly we have been. All the misguided choices and sinful actions come full view and we see how risky our random impassioned behaviors really have been. Repentance is beautiful. When done with a sincere and contrite heart, it directs us to the glory that can be ours, ignites us with the challenge of living a life in service of others and reminds us that all is well.
