



1 Cor 7

“Prophecy and Scripture-Skirting”

A “Scripture-skirter” is someone who avoids Scripture or skirts around the edges of a lesson to avoid discomfort or challenge. On the other hand, a prophet tends to stir things up, step on some toes, and overall make people uncomfortable, all of which are good things. A prophet in the time of the Old Testament was someone who, guided by God, spoke truth to power and advocated on behalf of God to the people who professed faith in Him. This was not a pleasant life; the prophets were not people

that possessed great political power or had a safety net of great wealth. They simply had faith and courageously spoke on behalf of God to those who had grown comfortable skirting the challenging messages of Scripture. In the first reading, we hear about Moses foretelling the succession of prophets that culminate in the coming of Christ. The line of prophets that he speaks of are the courageous people of faith throughout the centuries that challenge the power of kings, advocate for the widows and orphans, and stand in opposition to powerful armies. The office of the prophet in the Old Testament was a sign of God’s presence in the governance of Israel.

Even though there is not a formal office of the prophet today, the prophetic activity of the Holy Spirit continues to offer the same challenge and encouragement to each of us. Today we are encouraged by many men and women who offer prophetic witness on behalf of the Gospel, whether through their advocacy for the powerless and oppressed or through their actions to bring the Gospel into contact with the lived experiences of individuals. Yet, if we each examine our own lives, we will find instances in which we have sought to silence those around us who speak out on behalf of God and advocate for lives lived in accordance with the Gospel.

Each one of us has the capacity to be either prophetic or find ways to be a “Scripture-skirter.” For some of us, it may depend on the day or the people we are around, for others it may simply be based on our understanding of what Scripture really means. The power of the Gospel is in the timelessness and eternal power of the Word of God, that in every era the message and power of Scripture is not diminished. The power of the Word of God is made clear in the readings with the encounter between Jesus and the unclean spirit in today’s Gospel. Jesus does what prophecy tends to do, roots out that which is unclean by bringing the lie of sin into contact with the light of the truth of the Gospel. When sin and injustice is brought into contact with prophetic witness, the weight of the truth causes discomfort that either leads one to justify their sin by skirting the truth of Scripture or call that person into a life of conversion. The role of casting out that which is unclean is not a task that falls only to the prophets of the Old Testament or Jesus and the Apostles in the New Testament. We too are called to confront sin and injustice at every turn. Scripture is meant to make us uncomfortable; we are meant to be challenged every day by the movement of the Holy Spirit. If we have found ourselves in a comfortable life and unbothered by the challenges of Scripture, it may be time to spend some more time in prayer and reflection upon the Sacred Word of God so that we may be ready to speak truth to power, advocate on behalf of the widow, orphan, and immigrant, and bear prophetic witness to the Gospel. After all, how else are we to follow in the footsteps of Christ?

Reflection

I should like you to be free of anxieties. (1 Cor 7:32)

St. Paul's suggestion to the Christians in Corinth was to dedicate their lives completely to God and not to involve themselves in marriage and family, which would increase their anxiety in life. He admits, however, that it's just a suggestion. Thankfully not everyone listened to his suggestion or else we'd have no Christians alive today!

In the older English translation of the Mass that many of us still remember, the prayer after the *Our Father* included the line "protect us from all anxiety." The newer translation uses the word "distress" instead. (The Latin was *perturbatione*, which gives us the modern word, perturb.)

We all want to be free of anxieties, especially the newer anxieties we've been facing in health, the economy, and politics this past year. But anxieties are a part of life. Perhaps this is why the translation was changed to "distress." We are not asking that God take away our cares and anxieties. We need to face them and deal with the challenges of our lives.

However, these challenges should not distress us. We must have the confidence that God is at our side, that we have God's strength and grace to handle the concerns which we face in our daily lives. We do not need to stress out over life, but we can face our troubles and anxiety with a calm confidence that reflects our faith in a loving God.

Marriage and family are actually a good way for many people to deal calmly with the anxieties of life. We can share our burdens with the people closest to us, and we can comfort each other as together we face the many anxieties that are always a part of our lives.

The project will cost around \$190,000. OLPH met and exceeded their goal to collect \$60,000 by Jan. 2021!

We too can be modern-day prophets!

Most of us are quiet people who desire to live a good and holy life, promote the values and mission of the Gospel as best we can and desire to one day inherit the surprise of life eternal God promises to us. We are not trail blazers. We are simple people who want to do the simple things of life well. But there are others who left a more profound impact along the way of the paths they walked. Folks like Dorothy Day, Martin Luther King, Thomas Merton, Gandhi, St. Teresa of Calcutta, and many others left lasting impacts and legacies. Like Moses, they show us by word and deed who God is and what integrity and a purpose driven life look like. They show us how to be holy. We need Moses people like these to give us inspiration, hope and an example of holy living.

We do not need to do what they did or even mirror their relationship with God. Each one of us is God's special creation, with a purpose and soul known only to us. We need to learn how to open up and bring, without compromise, our soul-ness to life. We know when someone is authentic and centered because they always point to truth, even though they struggle and sin themselves, and they embody an unspoken timeless wisdom that just sounds and feels right. Jesus taught with this same type of authority and it astonished many who listened. We do not need to move mountains, advance a cause, write books or become notable. All we have to do is become credible witnesses of the faith we profess. Moses people can teach us how to do this.

St. Oscar Romero was an amazing man and a Moses figure for sure. He saw God in the burning bush and brought the flame of Gospel faith to the poorest of the poor, challenging the evils of the society in which he lived. He was tireless and persistent. He must have gotten very close to the problem because it cost him his life. He suspected it would. St. Romero said, "When we leave Mass, we ought to go out the way Moses descended Mt Sinai: with his face shining, with his heart brave and strong to face the world's difficulties." We can learn from this wisdom. If we allow the power of the Mass to truly transform us, we will leave that holy encounter changed. Our face will shine, and we will have courage. We can then bring what we have received to life's challenges. That sounds doable, doesn't it? Because of the example of our simple holiness, people will be amazed.

It's officially one month since we popped the champagne, toasted 2021 and wrote down a list of resolutions. This is usually the time when we start to take a good, hard look in the mirror to assess what we have done — or have not done — with the first month of this brand-new year.


New years can be scary, can't they? Full of promise, sure, but also full of room for failure. Full of space for our old baggage, old fears and the continuation of old mistakes.


