Dear Followers of Jesus,

“Unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat; but if it dies, it produces much fruit.”

We read this familiar line in today’s gospel from John 12:20-33. It is a sentiment that we cannot overlook in this season of Lent. In fact, it is the core of our prayer in this holy season. We must learn how to die to ourselves and live in Christ. But what does that mean for us? How do we understand dying to self?

Humility is the path to faith. I learn this profound understanding from many people who are in recovery. Unless people learn to die to their own addictions, passions, and destructive behavior, they will never understand the Holy Spirit within them. Our over-inflated egos are very destructive. We don’t always get our way. We are not always entitled to the things we think we should have. Genuine humility is a gift from prayer. Prayer opens us up to view life in a new way. When we pray, we realize we are not the center of the world. Prayer expands our notions of life and that we are part of God’s plan in the world. This is truly liberating for all people, to learn how to die to self and live in Christ Jesus.


Fear keeps us from change. I remember when I ministered at Sacred Heart in 1984-87, I visited a young man in a nursing home who had just survived a motorcycle accident. He was completely paralyzed. As it turns out, we were both the same age, around 29. I was so frightened to go into his room. I was so fearful to face such suffering.

I slowly ambled into his room and introduced myself. He could barely speak. He didn’t need me to tell him any pious thoughts or flimsy notions of God. We struggled to communicate. After a few minutes of shared silence, he said to me. *“I am the one who is completely paralyzed, so why are you so afraid?”* I will never forget that moment. I hold on to his comment to me with dear life even after all of these years later. I was so afraid to just be a real person to him. I was really facing my own life in this encounter. It was not his letting go, his absolute suffering that frightened me, but rather it was the possibility of change and things being taken away in my own life. Encountering my own control and fear of suffering really opened me up to a deeper life of prayer and entrusting my life to God. I will always remember him.

Resistance is toxic to our spiritual growth. Conversion to a greater reliance on God is lifelong. We are called and challenge to die to self so that God can bring us greater joy, healing and purpose in our lives. In today’s gospel, we hear that we are to lose our life in Christ. One of the lessons we learn in the Lenten season and in the spiritual life is that we must allow God to be God in our lives, because God is God, and we aren’t. We don’t redeem ourselves. We are not the source of forgiveness. We can’t view the world believing we are at the center of it and still believe in God’s loving plan for our own lives.

In today’s gospel, our resistance can stop our spiritual change and growth when we hear about the grain of wheat. How can we view the Lenten season as a source of new life in our own hearts? How can the grain of wheat die and rise, that is our very own lives in Jesus Christ? How can we learn to listen to Christ Jesus in this Lenten season so to grow in humility, faith and love? So, what needs to die in you to discover a deeper, more abundant faith in Jesus Christ?


But this year we don't have just a single day dedicated to St. Joseph. Pope Francis has declared this entire year dedicated to him, and not just for Italians, but for the universal church.

The Brothers of Holy Cross have always claimed St. Joseph as their patron, and St. André Bessette would always tell people who came to him for healing that they should pray to St. Joseph. André would spend much of his life building the immense Oratory of St. Joseph that overlooks all of Montreal. Holy Cross priests and brothers still oversee this important site of prayer and healing.

We know little about St. Joseph other than what we read in the gospels of Matthew and Luke. Like his namesake from Genesis, Joseph was a dreamer. An angel warned him to protect Mary and her child. He was a builder, a simple laborer. But most importantly, Joseph was a humble man of faith.

As St. André and Pope Francis both suggest, may we turn to Jesus' foster father in our need. He is a model of fidelity and compassion, both of which we can always use more of in this world. And during this year of St. Joseph, let us all pray for those in our lives who like Joseph have been humble men of faith.

Year of St. Joseph

On March 19th, we celebrated the Solemnity of St. Joseph and the holiness in the midst of unpredictable fatherhood. We first meet Joseph when he discovers his betrothed is pregnant... and not by him! St. Joseph does not know who the father is (yet), but he knows the punishment for adultery is death. He decides to divorce Mary quietly, and thus save her life. When an angel appears to reveal that Mary is pregnant by the Holy Spirit, St. Joseph trusts his dream and marries her. As a new foster father, Joseph must help his wife give birth in a stable. Later, he needs to escape the threats to his son's life by immigrating with his family to a foreign land. We know that St. Joseph is faithful, brave, and willing to sacrifice for those he loves. On the solemnity of St. Joseph, we don't merely celebrate a carpenter. We celebrate a hero!

With the Apostolic Letter "Patris corde" ("With a Father's Heart"), Pope Francis recalls the 150th anniversary of the declaration of Saint Joseph as Patron of the Universal Church. To mark the occasion, the Holy Father has proclaimed a "Year of Saint Joseph" from December 8, 2020 to December 8, 2021.

The Holy Father wrote *Patris corde* against the backdrop of the Covid-19 pandemic, which, he says, has helped us see more clearly the importance of "ordinary" people who, though far from the limelight, exercise patience and offer hope every day. In this, they resemble Saint Joseph, "the man who goes unnoticed, a daily, discreet and hidden presence," who nonetheless played "an incomparable role in the history of salvation."

As Lent began, I sat in the pew and listened to Father Ron reflect on what Lent is and is not. I often look for those nuggets of wisdom that stick in your head for the rest of the day or the week. That week, I heard “giving up chocolate is child’s play” (and perhaps my excuse to not give up wine for Lent!) and, more emphatically, I heard him yelling (maybe just at me?) “you need to listen!” Lent is a time to listen!

As we continue the theme “Create a clean heart in me, O God,” the need to listen in my life seems so powerful right now in grounding and connecting me to God’s love and grace. Over the past year I have gained a realization of how little we listen to one another and maybe even to ourselves. Father Ron’s scolding to listen resonated so strongly because my awareness of the lack of it in my life and perhaps in our culture, is also shouting at me.

I couldn’t help but reflect on the need to listen with my family. With less travel happening, spending time with my brothers, sisters and parents has taken on a new dimension. I have seven brothers and sisters spread out across the country and into Europe. Regular, in-person visits are difficult anyway but this past year, connecting has been even more important and also more meaningful. We are probably a normal big family, with our share of dysfunctionalities and I am sure there are times that we all wonder, how can we be from the same family?

We have used Zoom to celebrate anniversaries and holidays, as well as a memorial service, deployment party, sporting events, and we even did our own Stations of the Cross. While those were the tender moments, we have also started a big chat (group text) where we message on the topics of the day. Our family is consistently evenly divided—and our division has grown deeper over the past 12 months regardless if we are talking politics, pandemic, or church. While there may be an attempt at an intellectual discussion, the texts have evolved to being hurtful, cynical, and defensive where headlines or videos are shared in order to get a point across. Ultimately, no one is listening but each of us wants to be heard.

I know that my family loves one another, but I am beginning to see the damage that this lack of listening can do on our most important relationships, let alone our communities. Are we really trying to understand why we have these beliefs and opinions or are we thinking about our response without even trying to understand?

I have read that we typically listen with one of two filters, with a WANT or a FEAR. When we listen with the WANT filter, we might be thinking about how we will change the other person’s mind, or how we can tell our great idea, or maybe just wanting the conversation to be over. When we listen with the FEAR filter, we may be defensive or argumentative or we might just avoid the conversation all together.

This lent, I am working to clean my heart by listening with no filter.

For me, it is not just about engaging, but it means being present. I want to be genuinely curious about others, especially those closest to me with whom I can often be overly task oriented. I try to listen patiently, and not being in a rush for an answer so I can move on to the next thing that is on my list.

This awareness is opening my heart and is giving me a great satisfaction that for a brief moment, “I get it.” Father Ron was NOT yelling at me, but rather he was excitedly sharing one of the keys to understanding the mystery of Christ Jesus.
