Dear Believers,

Today we peer into the locked room where the disciples huddled in fear. We can relate to this moment in the scriptures since we have lived this past year reimagining our relationships, feeling stripped of intimacy and our everyday life routines. The pandemic has forced us into solitude and to explore what it means to live our faith and our lives in surrender and hope. We have endured job loss, racial tensions, depression among our teens and many people dying alone in hospitals. Today, Jesus stands in the center of our fear as well and offers us peace.

This gospel from John 20:19-31 invites us to acknowledge our own fear after Jesus' death. The Resurrection of Jesus unfolds with profound insight in this Easter season. Gradually, we come to terms with what the Resurrection of Christ Jesus means for our own lives. This text reveals to us that fear is useless.

We view the disciples behind locked doors. I can imagine how they felt, struggling to make sense out of the events of those past days. They encountered his suffering and their own grief. Their expectations of following him exploded in their faces. I imagine that room filled with body heat and fear, with few words floating in the tension. Their anguish roused silence and heightened hearing. Every move and sound must have brought fear to a deeper level.

Then a miracle happened. From the blackness of fear, Jesus appears to them. Without a key to the room, or hearing his footprints, he appears before them. Jesus mutters with great assurance the first words of the Resurrection, **"Peace be with you."** Those words have echoed down the centuries into our liturgies. I wonder if we ever reflect on the way those disciples first heard those words with their heightened hearing and beating hearts. Peace, I am sure, must have seemed impossible.

Jesus reveals himself. He showed them he was the real deal. His redeemed wounds, his scars on his hands and feet, teach them that he is the same person from before, but now incredibly different. They are following him into new spiritual territory. He becomes divine; he enters their hearts with profound hope.

Then John's account of Pentecost happens. Jesus sends them out the door. He breathes on them offering the Holy Spirit. I can't imagine this moment. There are many missing paragraphs it seems. Their bodies were weak with fear, and then in an instant they were sent into the world with a new vision. This is intense. There is so much to deal with from the disciples' perspective. Pentecost soars within hours of the Resurrection in the Gospel of John.

Thomas was not in the room at the time. He shows up a week later. Thomas is unable to put all the pieces together. I don't blame him. Who could have seen this coming? So Jesus returns and Thomas touches Jesus' redeemed wounds with his own hands. He puts his finger into the nail marks on his hand. He probes the mystery of the wound in his side. I want to feel what Thomas felt. How I wish I could have been with them in this encounter. From the depths of Thomas' soul, from his gut, he just can't keep it inside of him as he proclaims, "My Lord and my God!"

This particular gospel from John is proclaimed every year on the Sunday after Easter Day. Thirty-eight years ago, I preached on this text at my first Mass in South Bend, Indiana. In these months of COVID-19, our men who are ordained this year must limit their friends and families, even at their first Masses today.

On this Divine Mercy Sunday, we recognize the sheer gift of God's utter love, forgiveness and tenderness. Mercy is not earned; this love is a gift to help us all heal and to find our ways beyond the locked doors of hopelessness.

This profound encounter between Jesus and Thomas invites us into deep faith.

Every believer touches the mystery of Jesus' presence in various ways. We grow into touching the wounds of the Body of Christ in our service among people. We touch human suffering every day. We probe the mystery of the wounded and redeemed Body of Christ when we experience human suffering. Love changes us. Love enables us to proclaim on our lips, "My Lord, and my God!"

Reflection

Celebrating Divine Mercy



St. Margaret Mary Alacoque, a 17th century nun from France, popularized Catholic devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. The idea of a loving and merciful Jesus became widely embraced during her day, especially following the late medieval period in which Jesus was often portrayed in art as the final judge of history. A Jesus who was filled with compassion became a welcome alternative to a Messiah that was often seen as rather severe and unapproachable.

The Sacred Heart – aflame with divine light, pierced by a lance from the Crucifixion, bleeding, and encircled by a crown of thorns – stressed Christ’s suffering and His sympathy for all human pain. Our own Sacred Heart Church is dedicated to this belief that Jesus understands our own struggles and that His heart bleeds with compassion for us.

In the same way, St. Faustina, a 20th century nun from Poland, popularized a devotion to the Divine Mercy of Jesus, which we now celebrate annually on the Second Sunday of Easter. The image for this devotion is far less bloody than the Sacred Heart of Jesus. The depiction of Divine Mercy is that of the Risen Christ, with one hand blessing all believers while the other hand touches a bloodless wound from which rays of white and red light stream out, much as blood and water poured out from Jesus’ side on the Cross.

Red and white are also the colors of the Polish flag, and it was St. John Paul II, the Polish pope, who encouraged this new devotion of Divine Mercy among the universal church. Just as the 17th century welcomed the image of a loving and merciful Savior, so too did 20th century Poland, and now the whole world, embrace a Savior who offers each of us who turn to Him the gift of compassion and love.

Anxiety and God’s peace

Isn’t it interesting that the first thing that the Risen Christ tells his disciples is “Peace be with you.”? Jesus understands anxiety and stress. After all, Jesus was human. He knows that when we are troubled, we often freely let anxiety take over our hearts and our minds. But God doesn’t want us to worry. Instead, he wants us to rely on his peace to live happy, anxiety-free lives. Easier said than done, right? Actually, it might be easier than you think. Scripture is full of instructions on how to live an anxiety-free life. After searching online, I came across a blog, Scripture Confident Living, that offered a really interesting piece. I’d like to share it here with you.

How to Trade Your Anxiety for God's Peace

How can God meet us when we are anxious and stressed? Let these Bible verses encourage you to leave your stress and anxiety at His feet and take up His peace instead. What a trade!

I talked to a dear friend of mine the other day. Her life is currently full of trials and illnesses but her heart and mind are at peace because of her faith in God’s presence and power. She described that even while she is waiting on God to answer her prayers, she is overcome by an unexplainable peace that can only come from God. Isn’t that how all of us want to face our trials?

“Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: Rejoice! Let your gentleness be evident to all. The Lord is near. Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. Finally, brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable—if anything is excellent or praiseworthy—think about such things. Whatever you have learned or received or heard from me, or seen in me—put it into practice. And the God of peace will be with you.” Philippians 4:4-9

Have you ever experienced God’s peace? It really surpasses understanding. Everything in your life is upside down. Nobody would blame you for feeling overwhelmed and hopeless, yet you have this peace. You know it’s from God. You don’t fully understand how it got there, and how it exists in the first place, but you are overcome by it. His peace surrounds you. In the midst of chaos, you can’t help but feel thankful and joyous because your heart is calm and at peace.

“Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.”

This passage is the conclusion of Paul’s letter to the Philippian church. He wrote to his friends about living a life worthy of the gospel with prayer, thanksgiving, humility, and contentment. Then he adds...

“Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: Rejoice! Let your gentleness be evident to all. The Lord is near. Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God.”

Paul encourages us to...

Rejoice: Isn't it interesting that we have to be reminded to rejoice? Paul repeats his exhortation. "Rejoice! No seriously: Rejoice!" Do you get the picture that he means it? We are to rejoice always - that means even when we feel overwhelmed. *Side note: Please, don't use this passage on your depressed friend to prove to her that her depression is a sin. Remember that Jesus said, "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest." (Matthew 11:28) God sees our anxiety and sadness and invites us with open arms.*

Be known for our gentle spirit: The English Standard Version translates this word "reasonableness" while the New American Standard Bible and New Living Translation use the phrase "gentle spirit." Commentators describe this type of person as considerate and selfless. Certainly, God doesn't want us to be self-consumed complainers. Yet sometimes when I feel overwhelmed that's exactly what I become. Anyone else?

Do not be anxious but rather...: The world may give us reason to be anxious, but in light of God being on our side, all worry should fade. God is sovereign - that means He is in control. Yes, that's right. The Almighty God who loves us is in charge. He is neither surprised nor overwhelmed by your situation. So instead of succumbing to anxiety, remember to pray!

With thanksgiving: Don't forget to count your blessings even in the midst of trials. Likely God is using this time to teach you something and to strengthen your faith. No, I am not saying that somehow makes your feelings of sadness and being overwhelmed insignificant. Rather, in the midst of those feelings, God is teaching you - and that's a reason to give thanks. Believer, don't forget that God has saved you out of darkness and restored you to a close relationship with Him which enables you to...

Bring your requests to God: Let God know what's on your mind and ask Him for help. It's amazing that the God of the universe cares for us enough to invite us to bring our requests before Him. He wants to listen to our heartache. He cares. He is openly inviting you to ask Him for things. So take Him up on it. Ask for peace, for healing, for direction... whatever is troubling your heart.

What happens when, in the midst of our trials, we rejoice, retain composure and character, and pray with thanksgiving and petition?

“And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.”

When we refuse to get sucked in that black hole of negativity but instead keep our faith in the Lord, we are overcome by that unexplainable peace I've been talking about. That peace will in return guard your heart and mind. From what? In context, we can assume it will guard us from negativity, sinful outbursts, and anxiety.

Oh boy, do I understand the importance of that! Too often my poor family is on the receiving end of my frustration - whether they caused it or not. It's at those times that I wish for God's peace the most. I think, **“If I fully relied on God and unloaded my burden on Him in the midst of this, I would trade my anxiety for His perfect peace.** I would keep my cool and save my loved ones from a lot of heartache.”

This passage reminds me that this peace of God, that transcends our understanding and guards our hearts and minds, is available to me. Praise God!

“Finally, brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable—if anything is excellent or praiseworthy—think about such things.”

What's one way to turn our backs on negativity? Think positively!

Name one thing that is... true ... noble ... right ... pure ... lovely ... admirable ... excellent/ praiseworthy.

Dwell on those things! When grumpiness threatens to overtake your mood, write out that list, read it over a few times and decide to think about those wonderful heavenly blessings instead of your earthly mess.

“Whatever you have learned or received or heard from me, or seen in me—put it into practice.”

In the context of this letter, this statement encompasses all that Paul has taught and shown the Philippians in person or in written communication. Live biblically, Christian. It's not just what's in our minds but what shows in our actions. Trust God. Flood your mind with reminders of His blessings and character and live out your faith.

“And the God of peace will be with you.”

You won't be alone. **This is the life lived in close relationship with God. And because we serve a God of peace, that's exactly what you'll have in your life: peace.**

OLPH Ramp

Project Update:

Thanks to the generosity of so many, OLPH has currently

collected \$93,000 toward phase 1 of our present goal: to build an access ramp and deck that will connect the church with the Fr. Schultz House. Included in this exterior work is a restoration of the grotto and the repair of the front steps of the church. Phase 1 will cost \$143,000, so we need to raise up to \$50,000 more.

OLPH just received a matching grant from Catholic Extension (from whom we order our parish calendars) for \$45,000, which will now enable us to get closer to paying for Phase 1 and will also allow us to complete phase 2 of our proposal, making the bathroom ADA accessible as well, a \$43,000 expense. We will very soon be starting a pledge drive among OLPH parishioners, and inviting members of the other two church communities as well, to take advantage of the matching grant in order to finish both phases of our project. We have received official approval from the diocese, so we hope to begin construction in time for the Feast of Our Lady of Perpetual Help on June 27. APRIL IS NATIONAL
**CHILD ABUSE
PREVENTION MONTH**

Non-profit organization CASA of the Pikes Peak Region, which advocates for victims of child abuse and neglect, is observing Child Abuse Prevention Month with its "Month of Hope" campaign. According to CASA, they expect to see an additional 120 children enter its programs this year due to the pandemic. Usually, around this time, CASA would be preparing for their big fundraiser, but due to the pandemic, they are hosting their fundraiser online. Dispensation from Sunday Mass obligation to end May 23 in Diocese of Colorado Springs:

Most Rev. Michael J. Sheridan announced that the dispensation from Sunday Mass attendance for Catholics in the Diocese of Colorado Springs will be lifted effective May 23, Pentecost Sunday.

"In March of 2020, due to the coronavirus pandemic, I granted a dispensation from the Sunday Mass obligation for Catholics living within the Diocese of Colorado Springs. Parishes in the diocese resumed public Masses two months later, but the dispensation remained in effect due to capacity restrictions at churches and the need for social distancing. Now, since the worst of the crisis appears to be behind us, the faithful in the diocese will once again be morally obligated to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation.

As has always been the case, individuals who are unable to attend Mass due to serious illness or advanced age are dispensed from the Sunday obligation."


