

The Ascension of the Lord

May 16, 2021

Dear Followers of the Messiah,

I cannot imagine what the disciples felt when they peered up into the unknown sky as Jesus ascended before them. After all they had been through, being called by him to follow, leaving everything, and even being with him when he died. And if all of that was not enough, he rose from the dead.

The disciples explored new areas of grief at every turn following the Master. I see them scratching their heads as their necks leaned back to see Jesus rise into the unspecified territory of the sky. Their hearts must have broken within their bodies as they witnessed Jesus ascend in his body, taking within him the love and the care he felt for them. The disciples were simply grounded and their feet must have felt like clay. Their hearts must have stopped as Jesus one more time took their breath away in sheer amazement and wonder.

Jesus had to depart human existence so that he could be known throughout the world through the glorious gift of the Holy Spirit in Pentecost. Jesus' body had to disappear so that his Spirit could live within all of us. The Ascension only means something when we also ponder the meaning of the coming of the Holy Spirit. Pentecost is the birthday of the Church. That is the celebration for next weekend.

In Mark 16:15-20, the disciples continue to have one foot in faith and the other in doubt. They still are not quite sure what to do as Jesus leaves them yet one more time, and of course, this time for good. Imagine how their ears must have buzzed hearing the next words of Jesus, "Go. Do not stop. Baptize. Love. Work. Leave everything. Do not look back. Take nothing with you. Hold serpents. Hold me in your heart. I will speak to you. I will show you the wonders of my presence. Preach everywhere."

I am stuck in this year as we celebrate the Ascension, that we have been experiencing our faith as somewhat disembodied. We are not all physically together as we once were in our churches. Yet, we know our deep connection in love. The disciples watched as Jesus left them. His body disappeared. So with us now, our bodies are not together. We rely on the gift of our faith to become the people he asked us to become.

Much of what Jesus asked is to take care of people's bodies. We are to comfort the sick. We are to visit the prisoner. We are to console the grieving. We are to wipe the tears of those who have been abused. We anoint the sick. We mark our bodies with the Sign of Cross before prayer. We are to take to heart the human lives of people who really need God. This happens within our own bodies, where the Spirit of God motivates us and consoles us.

The Holy Spirit brings soul and body together. We can never lose such a gift. No matter where we pray, we belong together. No matter our isolation, we are united in Him. No matter how we are frustrated in life, we are consoled mind, body and soul, in His sacred presence.

We may feel in this time that Jesus has left us. We wait to feel the breeze of the Holy Spirit gathering us in song, where human bodies are present, where our hearts turn once again in this Easter season to know we are one in Christ at the Table of God.

Reflection

"In the first book, Theophilus, I dealt with all that Jesus did and taught until the day he was taken up..." (Acts 1:1)

These are the opening words of the Acts of the Apostles, which is really just a continuation of the Gospel of Luke. We know this for three basic reasons: both books are written with a similar vocabulary and style, they are both addressed to "Theophilus," and the Book of Acts picks up precisely where Luke's gospel left off, at the Ascension of Jesus.

I'll leave the question of vocabulary and style to those who can read Greek. And Theophilus is either the name of some real person Luke knows or it is merely an honorific title meaning "Beloved (philos) of God (theos)." Luke could simply just be calling his reader a "friend of God."

But it's the moment of the Ascension that's really of great interest. In much of classical literature, the very center of a work was considered to be the most important theme or idea. I even had a professor in college who counted up all the words in the Aeneid and wrote a paper on the importance of the single word that was the halfway point in the whole book!

For Luke, as important as the death and resurrection of Jesus is, it's Jesus departure from this world after the resurrection that ends the gospel and begins the story of the church that Jesus left behind.

The Ascension completes the story of Jesus on earth and begins the story of Christ in the Church. Next week the Holy Spirit will come down upon the apostles in tongues of fire, and the mission of the Christian Church will officially begin. But for this week, between Ascension and Pentecost, Luke reminds us that this is the central point in history, when the Son of God who had come to earth to save us from our sins, has returned to His Father and has challenged us to take up the task of bringing about the Kingdom of God.



The ramp, the grotto, and the bathroom renovation in the Fr. Schultz House should all be completed in time for the Feast Day of Our Lady of Perpetual Help on Sunday, June 27.

In the meantime, postcards have gone out to everyone in the parish to remind everyone that each dollar given toward our project up to \$45,000 will be doubled by a grant from Catholic Extension. Thank you for helping us with the final payments to complete this project.

The Domestic Church Celebrates Marriage By: Melissa Musick Nussbaum

The Catholic Church sets a high bar when it comes to marriage: lifelong fidelity in good times and bad. That life costs nothing less than everything. But when it comes to the marriage *ceremony*, all that is required is a bride and groom (one of whom must be a baptized Catholic), a presider priest or deacon, and two witnesses. That ceremony costs nothing. Contrast this with the wedding industry, which says the essential element for a marriage ceremony is a credit card. You'll need it, they tell you, for the diamond, the tuxes and the gowns, the caterers, florists, photographers, wedding planners, makeup artists and the honeymoon several time zones away. As for the marriage promises, well, according to wedding industry ads, only diamonds are forever.



Catholics have cause to celebrate. We serve a risen Lord. Throw a party when you marry! Dance all night! But celebration is not synonymous with debt. Take the wedding cake: bakers generally charge \$100.00 to \$150.00 a tier. For a standard three-tier cake that's a cost of between \$300.00 and \$450.00. Some \$500.00, or more, for a cake that is often nicer to look at than it is to eat. There's no rule that says wedding cake can't be homemade.

Before one of our daughters got married, she thought about the needs and tastes of the guests invited to her wedding. And she thought about her budget. So she enlisted her prospective groom and her family in making the wedding cakes.

Because most cakes freeze well, we were able to do the baking well before the reception. On the morning of the ceremony, aunts decorated the cakes (some iced, some not) with edible flowers. Each cake had a card with its name and ingredients for people with allergies, say, or those who avoid dairy.

We're not professional bakers. We don't know how to decorate multiple layers with fondant and icing roses. So, we opted for simple cakes we knew we could turn out. Pound cakes and fresh fruit tortes don't need icing. If icing is desired, a simple butter cream frosting is delicious and easy to make.

This marathon session requires: a kitchen with room for many hands, multiple mixers and pans, ample requisite ingredients, clear instructions, good music, genial dispositions and at least one experienced home baker. Imagine hosting "Wedding Cake Day" for an engaged couple. Enlist friends to help. Watch it become a kind of informal marriage prep as older and younger people get together to work and talk together. It's a natural setting for asking and giving advice, for sharing stories, for asking and answering questions.

I know from experience that a group of five people can make ten Bundt cakes in one day. That's enough to serve 150 wedding guests. (Bundt pans come in various shapes and sizes. Scout garage sales and thrift stores for inexpensive cake pans and cake stands.)

These high-altitude recipes were among those served at a family wedding. Ice, glaze, or sift powdered sugar over the top and decorate with edible flowers:

FOOLPROOF CHOCOLATE CAKE

Mix together in one large bowl until smooth: 2 cups (- 2 tsp) sugar; 2 cups (+ 2 TBS) flour; 1/2 cup good quality Dutch cocoa; 1 1/2 tsp baking soda; 1/4 tsp salt; 2 eggs; 1 cup (+2TBS) buttermilk; 1 cup vegetable oil.

Add to the mixture: 1 cup (+2 TBS) boiling water (add in a slow stream as batter is mixed on lowest setting). *Then add:* 1 tsp real vanilla

Filling: *Combine:* 1 egg white; 1/4 cup sugar; 3 ounces softened cream cheese; Pinch salt; 1/2 cup chocolate chips.

Spray Bundt pan with a product like *Baker's Joy*. *Pour* batter into prepared pan.

Drop spoonfuls of the cream cheese mixture evenly on top of the batter.

Bake in a preheated 350 degree oven for 35-40 minutes or until toothpick inserted into cake comes out clean.

SOUR CREAM POUND CAKE

Cream: 1 cup butter (no substitutions) with 2 3/4 cups sugar

Add: 6 egg yolks, one at a time (*reserve* egg whites)

Combine & sift: 1/4 tsp baking soda and 1/2 tsp salt with 3 cups cake flour

Add: flour mixture to butter mixture alternately with 1 cup sour cream, 1 tsp real vanilla extract and (1 tsp ground mace, if desired). *Whip:* 6 egg whites until stiff.

Gently fold egg whites into batter.

Spray Bundt pan with a product like *Baker's Joy*. *Pour* batter in prepared pan.

Bake in a preheated 350 degree oven for 1 1/4 to 1 1/2 hours or until toothpick inserted into cake comes out clean.

VEGAN CHOCOLATE CAKE

(Mama called this "Depression Cake," not a good name for a wedding confection.)

Mix together: 1 1/2 cup flour (almond flour for gluten-free); 1 cup sugar; 2 TBS cocoa; 1 tsp salt; 1 tsp baking soda; 1TBS vinegar; 1 tsp real vanilla; 1/3 cup vegetable oil; 1 cup strong coffee (If you don't have any brewed coffee, put 1 heaping TBS instant coffee into 1 cup hot water and stir until dissolved.)

Pour into prepared (*Baker's Joy*) 9"X13" pan. *Bake* in preheated 350 degree oven for 35-40 minutes, or until toothpick inserted into the center of cake comes out clean.
