about the cover

The *Baptism of Christ* is a fresco by the Italian Renaissance painter Pietro Perugino and his workshop, executed around 1482 and located in the Sistine Chapel, Rome. The scene follows a symmetrical pattern. In the center is the Jordan River flowing towards the observer and reaching the feet of Jesus and John, who is baptizing the former. A dove, symbol of the Holy Spirit, descends from the sky; it is sent by God, represented within a luminous cloud and flanked by flying seraphims and cherubims. The landscape includes a symbolic view of Rome, recognizable by a triumphal arch and the Colosseum.

DO YOU HAVE A CHRISTIAN WORLDVIEW?

The last few months I have been reflecting on the essay, *From Christendom to Apostolic Mission*, as a key resource for understanding the Church's need to engage the world through apostolic mission. As the world enters a post-Christendom era the Church must engage it differently.

Every society has a governing vision of what is real, important, and essential, and it interprets and judges things based on these core premises. When a society's governing vision is formed by Christianity then it is a Christendom society. If our society is becoming post-Christendom, that means its assessment of what is real, important, and essential is not formed by Christianity in any deep way. Secular humanism, egalitarianism, and even the ethical code of many people who are materialists all borrow from the legacy of Christianity, but the basic diagnosis of the problems of the world and the answer in the Good News of Christianity are not embraced.

Therefore, a key preliminary task is for us to strengthen, or simply recover, a full Christian Worldview among Christians themselves. A worldview is one's vision and assessment of what is real, important, and essential in the entire scope of existence. It gives the context for one to understand particular objects, events, and realities of life. It helps one even understand oneself! Everyone has a worldview, even if, for many, it is an unexamined assumption about what makes sense and what does not.

A person typically receives a worldview from the governing vision of society; learning it through family, schooling, culture, etc. But a person's worldview can change. This can happen through new personal experiences, shifts in society, encountering new ideas, and, of great importance for us, through receiving the Gospel, the Good News, of Jesus Christ. That was the experience of

people in ancient apostolic times, and also wherever and whenever Christianity has been proclaimed. People's worldview changed dramatically, and yet at the same time the Christian worldview typically finds a value and place for almost everything that is good and true.

This was certainly my own experience when in college, I had an awakening to this Christian vision, which honored, and had a place for my interest in science and engineering, but also called me to so much, and Someone, more. This conversion to the Christian vision continues in my life daily.

The Christian worldview is theocentric (God-centered) and christo-logical. That is, God is the most important part of the worldview, and we most fully know God through the unique revelation given to us in Jesus Christ. At the same time, nothing in creation is excluded because God is the creator and sustainer of all things. In Christ, God has even assumed our human nature and history. Therefore, the Christian worldview appreciates all parts of creation and the reality of history, even as it understands them primarily as the setting in which the drama of relationship between God and humans takes place. ▶

The first paragraph of the Catechism succinctly describes this drama of relationship that we have been calling the *Kerygma*:

CCC#1 God, infinitely perfect and blessed in himself, in a plan of sheer goodness freely created man to make him share in his own blessed life. For this reason, at every time and in every place, God draws close to man. He calls man to seek him, to know him, to love him with all his strength. He calls together all people, scattered and divided by sin, into the unity of his family, the Church. To accomplish this, when the fullness of time had come, God sent his Son as Redeemer and Savior. In his Son and through him, he invites men to become, in the Holy Spirit, his adopted children and thus heirs of his blessed life.

What follows from this are all kinds of subsidiary realities, for example: human nature, what is love and sin, the proper relationship in life between receptivity and activity, the arts and their purposes, the nature of truth, life in society, etc. All of these areas could be explored in a general Christian vision, but sooner or later we must dare to look at our own worldview. As Jesus once asked his disciples: *"Who do people say that the Son of Man is... but who do you say that I am?"* (Mt 16)

Here is the challenge: *Whatever my external actions may be, is my personal worldview in harmony with what God has revealed in Jesus Christ and given to be taught by His Church?*

There can be different ways this harmony is lost. For instance, a person could be a Christian through sacramental practice, but in his or her way of thinking may disagree in many ways with what Christianity finds real, important, and

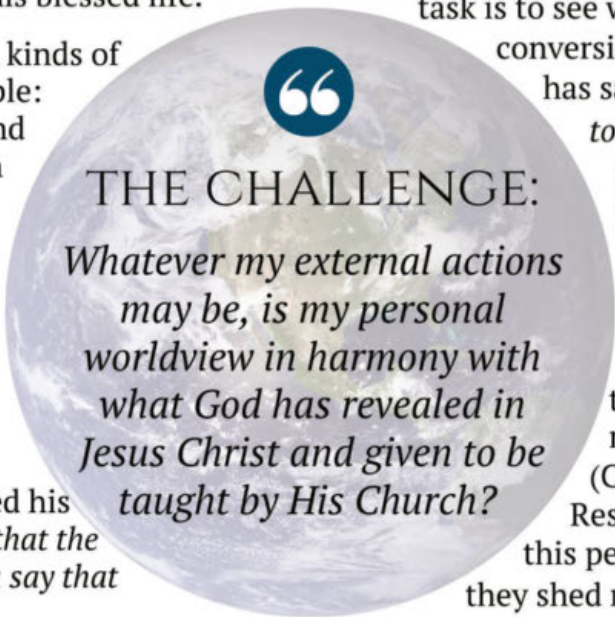
essential. That creates a huge and intolerable disconnect for that person. Or it might be that a Christian has let their worldview be formed by secular culture, worldly friends, and teachers antagonistic to faith, against which one hour at church on Sunday cannot compete. Or a third case could be someone who is sincerely Christian, and doesn't even realize that often their worldview is being formed more by a secular culture, in which they are immersed, than the deep truths of the faith. For each of these people this disharmony can destroy, or at least cripple, the gift of faith.

So the discussion on the general vision of Christianity must move into personal reflection for every believer. While much more could be said about that general vision, an equally important

task is to see where we personally need conversion and renewal. As St. Paul has said, *"Do not conform yourselves to this age but be transformed by the renewal of your mind."* (Romans 12:2)

The plan for the next four months is to take each of the four points of the Kerygma that we have preached and meditated upon during Advent (Created, Captured, Rescued, Respond) and look at them from this personal point of view. How do they shed new light on my own life and give new vision? Where do they prompt me to conversion and new freedom? How do they help me encounter the Living God?

Parishioner Speaks at Supreme Court

When I was in college here in Denver, I faced an unplanned pregnancy. As a student, I was the primary target for abortion, with so many questioning my ability to have my baby saying, "How will you finish school and start a career with a baby?" Thankfully, I was dissuaded from the lies of abortion, and I chose life. My son was born, I graduated on time, married my baby's father, and started working for Students for Life of America, a pro-life ministry that supports the pro-life generation by starting student clubs across the nation. For the past 9 years, I have witnessed firsthand the love, authentic compassion, and tangible support of the pro-life movement.



In November, when asked by Mississippi's Attorney General Lynn Fitch's office if I would speak at their rally at the steps of the Supreme Court the morning of the hearing for the *Dobbs v. Jackson* court case, there was no question God was calling me to share my testimony. I took my son who is now 8 with me to our nation's capital, stood with him on stage and shared our story, hoping to provide witness to those women finding themselves in unplanned pregnancies - *You have the strength and courage to choose life without regret.* One of the proudest moments of my life so far was watching my son confidently take the microphone and say, "Together we will save the babies," because he understands how precious life is.

This case is truly a historic one- it has the potential to overturn *Roe v. Wade*, and I ask you to pray, fast, and offer hours of Adoration for the hearts of the Justices. Let us hold fast to the objective truth that our Catholic faith teaches, that science upholds, and that our morality and laws must protect - *that life begins at conception and that all human life is inherently valuable.*

Neighbor in Need Finds Support & Independence

Mary* is one of our neighbors in need with a wonderful success story. We first met Mary in July of 2019. She has been disabled since birth and wears braces on both legs. Mary called us shortly after her mother passed away because she wanted very badly to drive to gain the freedom of mobility and become self-sufficient. Mary had neither driven nor held a job her entire life.

Mary had to overcome many obstacles to learn to drive and get a job. First, she had to pass a written driver's test, get a prescription from her doctor to get the adaptive equipment needed to drive with hand-manuevered gas and brake pedals, and get the equipment installed. Mary's neighbor drove with her until she learned to drive and got her driver's license. Mary further had to find an insurance company that would insure a disabled driver. It took Mary almost two years to get this all done, but she is a very determined young lady.

After the LOTW St. Vincent dePaul conference assisted her with rent she was finally able to take the first steps toward independent personal mobility, in turn enabling her to gain meaningful employment. Mary recently told us that she obtained a part-time job at the front desk of a nursing home. She loves her job, the staff, and especially the residents. She is ecstatic about driving. Mary is grateful for the assistance from SVDP and says life is good. Mary is such an inspiration to us all!

January Family Focus – Baptism

Truly, truly, I say to you, unless one is born of water and the Spirit, he cannot enter the kingdom of God. John 3:5

All the kerygmatic elements we learned about in the Advent Preaching series are vividly present in the effects of grace in baptism.

1. **Created.** Baptism makes it possible to partake in the divine life and love of Almighty God.
2. **Captured.** The disobedience of Adam and Eve, Original Sin, ruptured their relationship with God and was inherited by all of humanity.
3. **Rescued.** Through his life, death and resurrection, Jesus frees us from the bondage of Original Sin in the sacrament of baptism.
4. **Response.** In baptism, God has consecrated us, placing “his seal upon us and gives the Spirit in our hearts as a first installment.” (2 Cor 1:22) Jesus invites us to surrender our lives to him and “walk as children of the light.” (1 Thess 5:5)

Christians are people of the light and should equip themselves by “putting on the breastplate of faith and love and the helmet that is hope for salvation.” (1 Thess 5:8) At baptism, we receive the theological virtues of Faith, Hope, and Love to help us on our journey of faith. As a family, consider reading the Scriptures below. Select one for each virtue and paint “prayer rocks” that you can keep on your prayer table at home.



Faith: Heb 11:1, 1 Thess 1:3, Heb 11:6, 2 Cor 5:7, Rom 10:17

Hope: Rom 15:13, Col 1:27, Heb 6:19, Rom 12:12, Jer 29:11, Heb 10:23, 1 Pet 3:15


