

Tuesdays 8:00 am - 8:00 pm


"Blessed is the one who trusts in the LORD, whose hope is the LORD."

In today's readings we have two examples of Beatitudes, or statements of blessedness. While we might be most familiar with the Beatitudes from Matthew's Gospel, Luke includes not only Beatitudes, but also statements of woefulness. Jeremiah too presents us with more severe language, but this week's first reading ends on a much more positive note: Trust in the Lord, and you shall be blessed. Bring your doubts and needs to Him, truly present in the

Bible Bits

February 16, 2025:

In this Sunday's Gospel Reading, Luke 6:17, 20-26, we are given some of the beatitudes, a more complete list of which can be found in Matthew 5:3-12. But according to Luke, the blessed are those "who are poor . . . who are hungry . . . who are now weeping . . . when people hate you and . . . exclude and insult you, and denounce your name as evil." Wow! Those are blessings? Yes, because these things will happen — most often behind your back — when you are given the grace to be like Jesus Christ. But the blessings will come as a result: "the kingdom of God [will be] yours . . . you will be satisfied . . . you will laugh . . . your reward will be great in heaven." Jesus Christ is telling us that what we presently see around us, what we are currently experiencing, must not be the focus of our life. We must make our focus on the life after this life on earth, because the eternal reward will come when we are in the next life.

THE LORD'S PRAYER: "OUR FATHER"

Our Father, Who art in heaven, Hallowed be Thy name Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done on earth, as it is in heaven Give us this day our daily bread And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.



The "Our Father" as found in the Gospel of Matthew (6:9-13), is the most beloved and popular prayer in Christian tradition. Jesus taught His followers this prayer in the middle of the Sermon on the Mount. This prayer for the Christian journey has been offered up consistently for over two thousand years and continues to be offered millions of times a day around the world.

"Our Father...." We're praying that we might keep God's name holy, honor Him in and above all things, and that He will be the highest value in our lives. Since God created the world, He is not anything or anybody in the world. He is not one being among many, but rather the transcendent source of all that is.

"Thy Kingdom...." Understanding the teaching of Jesus and His manner of life gives us a good idea of what His kingdom is within the community of the Trinity (peace, love, mercy, compassion, justice, forgiveness, healing and non-violence). We are praying that Jesus' manner of being becomes more and more the manner of being of the world.

"Our daily bread" refers to the bread we need for the day: the Eucharist, the transubstantiated presence of the Body and Blood of Jesus. We should pray for the Eucharistic bread that readies us for eternal life, that food which renders us participants in God's own nature; food that feeds the soul as much as the body.

"Forgive us our trespasses" reminds us that sin blocks union with God; it keeps the kingdom from coming; it is inimical to the bread of life. Jesus taught us the way of love; He embodied what it means to live as a servant of the Lord; He healed; He performed miracles. But what He came to do, first and foremost, was to forgive our sins.

"As we forgive those who trespass against us." Central to the teaching of Jesus is forgiveness. This petition reminds us to call to mind our sins and remember how generous God has been to us. We need to learn to forgive others. Look at broken relationships. Can you do something to heal them?

"And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil" acknowledges that we are in spiritual warfare. It is referring to the forces, physical and spiritual, opposed to us that seek to draw us to them. We must evoke the mighty power of God to prevent us from being tempted and to liberate us from the Evil One.

This is a prayer for Christ. We pray that His kingdom might come; that we might commune with His Body and Blood; that we might receive His forgiveness; that we might accept Him wholeheartedly. We must put God's holy name first; we must strive to do His will in all things and at all times; we must be strengthened by spiritual food, or we will fall; we must be agents of forgiveness; we must be able to withstand the dark powers.
