FEBRUARY— THE MONTH OF AHAVA



It's hard to think of the month of February without thinking about the secular holiday of Valentine's Day. You either love it or you

hate it. The idea of romantic love, however, is a relatively recent phenomenon. It began in France in the late 12th

century and quickly spread throughout Europe, even into the insulated Jewish world. Despite this idea infiltrating into our culture, the custom of the 'shidduch' or arranged marriage was very common,

"Any love that depends on a specific cause, when that cause is gone, the love is gone; but if it does not depend on a specific cause, it will never cease."

- Pirkei Avot, 5:19.

There are different words and concepts in Judaism regarding love. When one speaks of marriage, one uses the word 'yichud,' which implies together (oneness), alone, but separated from others. There is an intimacy and an exclusivity implied here that does not apply to other forms of love. The word 'ahava' is used when talking about love for

God, love for our neighbors, love of strangers. Interestingly, there is no commandment to 'love your spouse.' This may be because the idea is strongly engrained that no explicit instructions are needed.

and continues in many traditional and Orthodox communities. So, what does Judaism have to say about the idea of romantic love?

Judaism acknowledges the power and attraction of romantic love. But it considers ecstasy temporary and ephemeral, unless it can be transmuted into everyday acts of love: bringing home flowers or taking out the trash, making a lovely meal or offering a compliment. These things all go a long way toward creating a lasting bond between a couple. The choice of a partner also must be done through reason as well as the pure emotion of the heart.

At the end of the day, we need both forms of love in our lives. Whether or not you are in a special relationship, you can experience the love of community, the love of God, love for yourself, and love for the world. You are never truly alone. That is one of the things that makes coming together to worship and to spend time with one another so precious. It lets us know that we are valued and appreciated for who we are. THE BEST PRESCHOOL AGE - THREE YEAR OLDS (maybe)



They call them the "terrible 2's," "trusting 3's" and "pleasing 4's," but in reality having a 3-year-old can be harder than the 2's. Three year olds can really be the best age for preschoolers because their language skill are great, you can understand what they are

saying and they usually don't have an "attitude" yet. Here are some tips to help you appreciate and love being a three year olds' parent.

Get to know your child.

Learn to recognize your child's needs at any given time. Give your child your full attention in frequent, small doses. This requires looking them in the eyes, asking some questions and listening to the answers. Use body language that indicates you are paying attention, like putting your phone down.

Set expectations and boundaries.

Have a list of family rules, but keep the list short and simple. We have to teach our children to want to be obedient by giving lots of positive reinforcement and praise. Try to praise 10 times as often as you correct and be sure to praise a child's effort or process and not always the outcome. Using a behavior sticker chart is a powerful tool for a three year old, so enjoy and make the process fun.

Consistency is Key

Be consistent. If a child needs to hang up their jacket make sure you don't "help" somedays and hang the jacket up for them. Consistency doesn't mean yelling or punishing but rather reminding and addressing the same behavior over and over. Make sure the rules at home, at grandma's house and at school are as similar as possible. Here is a partial list of the new skills your three year old will have for you to enjoy,

Social Skills

More independent

More aware of and sensitive to other people's feelings Interested in structured games

Capable of taking turns and sharing

Able to develop friendships and be more responsive to other children

Motor Skills

Able to jump down from objects 18-inces high using both feet for takeoff and landing

Can draw a circle

Cuts paper into two pieces

Able to catch a ball with arms extended

Likes to use "tools" such as paper, crayons, and scissors to make projects

Can walk up and down stairs while alternating feet.

Language Skills

Uses plurals and pronouns

Can say their name

Able to answer the question, "How old are you?"
May mispronounce words and will become frustrated
when they are not understood.

Speaks in three or four word sentences

Have fun listening to those adorable three-year-old conversations. Trust me — it makes much of the hard stuff worth it! (Helpful hint: get a notebook and start writing down your kid's funny quotes... you won't regret it.)

Dear Temple Solel Members,

Israel's President, Isaac Herzog, upon his visit to the Bay Area, set some time aside to speak to a group of students from the Beged Kefet Hebrew program at the Oshman Family JCC in Palo Alto.

One of his statements caught my attention. He said to the students, "I think that it is very important to protect our Israeli and Jewish identity. It's not simple. We live in a very diverse world, but a part of a person's ability to develop is having an identity that you believe in and belong to." The words, having identity that you believe in and belong to, is the driving force behind Raker religious school.

It is important to me that our students are encouraged to participate in "learning and doing Jewish." As one of our teachers said, she grew up doing Jewish but not knowing the why! Attending religious school and coming to Shabbat services are just two ways your children will start knowing the why. Earlier in the year when I was teaching some of our 6th grade students, I discussed with them the idea that with knowledge comes choice. When they come of age, and have knowledge in making a choice of what to believe in or why they are celebrating or how they are celebrating, then their connection to Judaism becomes much stronger. It is not someone telling them to do Jewish, it is through their knowledge that they have made the choice to do Jewish.

Temple Solel Book Club

Greetings, Fellow Book Lovers!

The book club meets this month on <u>February 15</u> at 6 p.m. with *The Lake on Fire* by Rosellen Brown. *Kirkus Review* describes the novel as "[a] transporting drama of class and love, steeped in period feeling, written with beauty and conviction." It is an impoverished immigrants' tale told in the time of the Chicago Columbian Exposition of 1893. There's family conflict, love, devotion, thievery, and a lot of excellent writing, according to the reviews. Phoenix and Scottsdale public libraries have copies.

On March 15 we will explore a 20th Century classic, *Herzog* by Saul Bellow. Bellow was awarded the <u>Pulitzer Prize</u>, the <u>Nobel Prize for Literature</u>, and the <u>National Medal of Arts</u> for his literature. This 1965 National Book Award winner tells the story of Moses Herzog, great sufferer, joker, and moaner, cuckold, charmer, a survivor of not only his private disasters, but also those of the age. First published in 1964, it won the acclaim of both critics and readers. *Herzog* was a long-time best seller, and in 2005 *Time* magazine named it one of the 100 best novels in the English language since the magazine's founding in 1923.

On **April 19** we will read and discuss *The Physician*, in which an orphan leaves Dark Ages London to study medicine in Persia in this "rich" and "vivid" historical novel from a New York Times—bestselling author, Noah Gordon. It is a little on the long side, and you may wish to get a head start reading in March. The book is available in the Scottsdale and Phoenix public libraries.

"Bedazzled" at Torah Study



This month in Torah Study we encounter an intriguing question: Are there any drag queens in the Torah? I'm a fan of drag queens because they support LGBTQ+ c auses and help people like me. I have been Jewish and queer my whole life. Yet I've struggled to find the best way to present myself in the communal space of a synagogue. Are there any helpful tips in the Torah?

One clue comes in Terumah, a Torah portion we read in February. In Terumah, the Israelites are encamped in the desert and they desire God's presence. So they design a mishkan, or garment, for God to wear on earth. Surprisingly, this vestment is a dazzling masterpiece. It features "gold, silver, and copper fixings; blue, purple, and crimson yarns; lapis lazuli and other gemstones" (Exodus 25:1-9). Like a singer taking the stage, God debuts in luminous style. To me, God is a queer Jewish icon.

Additionally, God is queer in more ways than dress. God is a boundary crosser, constantly moving between heaven and earth. Similarly, LGBTQ+ folks live in constant motion. We move back and forth, and inhabit liminal spaces, between masculine and feminine qualities; between social rejection and acceptance; and between the anatomy of our bodies and the truth of our souls. We are the tribe of the boundary crossers, known as the tribe of the Hebrews, since the word "Hebrew" means "to cross over."

Today, when I enter a synagogue, I enter with God, both of us looking fabulous – God in a coat of many colors, and me in a rainbow tallit and sparkly kippah. Both of us feeling grateful to be Jewish, queer, and loved. I've learned that the best look is feeling comfortable with who you really are.

A Mandatory Donation? Parashah *Terumah* Ex 25:1 – 27:19

Our early parashah for February, 2022 is called *Terumah* calls for "God instructing <u>Moses</u> to tell all <u>Israelites</u> whose heart so moved them to bring gifts of <u>gold</u>, <u>silver</u>, <u>copper</u>, colored <u>yarns</u>, fine <u>linen</u>, <u>goats'</u> hair, tanned <u>ram</u> skins, <u>acacia</u> wood, oil, spices, <u>lapis lazuli</u>, and other fine stones to make a sanctuary — the Tabernacle (*Mishkan*, — () pand its furnishings, so that God could dwell among them." God instructed them to make the <u>Ark of the Covenant</u> for the commandments too. God commands the Israelites to give a *terumah* or gift. For what purpose, and how does this relate to the Temple Solel Endowment Foundation? Because growing long-term funds for the future of our Jewish community, our Solel community is giving *a terumah*!

Modern Hebrew "terumah" means donation which is collected 'from every person who heart so moves him." The act of giving is a voluntary one and no one can judge those who do not give. But should a terumah or donation be considered mandatory? The torah states the terumah (donation) is giving to God, but why does God need worldly riches or a sanctuary that he "may dwell among them." God does not need a physical sanctuary. As humans, Jewish humans, or the humans of the Solel community enjoy having a physical sanctuary that enables us to feel and know that God is part of us. It is why we ask for voluntary donations, but voluntary contributions, dues, events etc. do not always sustain our synagogue.

As a Jewish community of Solel, we are dependent on the members giving something that is not only voluntary but what about considering it mandatory in a sense to sustain the whole community. There is a fine line between voluntary and mandatory as both are needed to sustain an organization. The *terumah* is asking us in present day to give the community, both religious and spiritual something that we want to have. I see "*terumah giving*" is also for the long-term sustainability of our Solel community – to the Solel Endowment Fund. Yes, it is a voluntary (tax-deductible) contribution, or should we consider it a mandatory one to preserve our Jewish life for the next generation. Like Israel's Defense Service Law, the enlistment to the Israeli Defense Forces (IDF) is mandatory for all Israeli citizens who have turned eighteen, or the LDS Church uses tithing funds (approximately 10% of one's income after living expenses) for building and maintaining temples and to fund the church's mission and education efforts. What exactly must we give as our *terumah* depends not only on what we want and are able to give, but also on the needs of our Solel community. Consider the long-term power of your contribution or your *terumah* to the Solel Endowment Foundation.


