GOSPEL MEDITATION

If I only knew then what I know now, how different life would be.

This sentiment, expressed in myriad ways, is found on every human being's lips at one point or another. Life may have brought us to a vulnerable place where we see some of the poor choices we made and the effects they are having. Perhaps we fell into some destructive and dysfunctional relationships or behaviors and are finding how they held us captive. Our zeal and passion for life may have drifted away, and we are waking up to the reasons apathy has taken hold. Life can be hard. In fact, some would describe their lives as a drudgery. They walk through each day with an anxious unsettledness, wondering when their restlessness will cease. There is a temptation to believe that what I see is all I will get. Mortality and hopelessness await the dawn. If I could only have known what would come in the future, I could have made better choices and avoided all of this misery!

Really? While we can certainly give into weakness, sin, impulsiveness, and idiosyncrasies that cause us to stumble over ourselves, life is really a journey. If we don't make the mistake of wallowing in the mire of self-pity and realize the new life God is calling us to, then there are thrills, adventures, surprises, and soul-searching graces we can surely miss. We are not tethered to our past nor are we bound to the ills life can bring upon us. We are never hopeless or helpless. The problem is that our myopic vision only allows us to see the misery and misfortune that is before us, not the potential that can come from choosing healthier and more life-giving options. Jesus came that we might have fullness of life. We need to learn how to reach for Jesus' hand and let him help us to our feet.

We need to allow God into our pain and heal our past. We have to wrestle with our histories, agonize and search and cry out for the Divine healing we need to restore our faith, hope, and love. Job could not see how his story would end or trust the guidance of the God who called him. We live in that same blindness and suffer from the same lack of confidence. Once we allow ourselves to be touched by God's healing power, we begin to see that all of the pieces of our lives are necessary parts of a greater whole. Along the way of our lives, God uses our omissions and failures to create new things and possibilities. When doors close, others open and we can be amazed by the joyful and unexpected surprises we receive. Once we know the power of God's creative, healing, life-giving, forgiving, and dynamic presence, it is no wonder we want to put ourselves at the service of others and show them what life can be.



NATIONAL MARRIAGE WEEK



Beginning February 7, the Church celebrates National Marriage Week, and it culminates on February 14, World Marriage Day. The USCCB has selected “To Have, To Hold, To Honor” as the theme for this year’s weeklong celebration. They have also published resources for the weeklong observance of National Marriage Week, and they can be found at <https://www.usccb.org/topics/marriage-and-family-life-ministries/national-marriage-week>.

What is the importance of World Marriage Week? While every single day of the year is more than appropriate and worthy of celebrating marriage, this particular week calls us to draw our focus to how we are working ourselves to build a culture of life and love that first begins with and depends upon supporting and promoting marriage and the family.

We cannot underestimate the importance of the Sacrament of Marriage. It was given as the first sacrament in the Garden of Eden when God joined Adam and Eve as one, and Jesus also chose to begin his public ministry at the Wedding at Cana. We can clearly see that marriage holds a special place among the sacraments; while each sacrament is special and irreplaceable by any other sacrament, marriage holds the place of being the primordial sacrament. Such importance certainly deserves not just a weeklong celebration, but a conscious and intentional observance every day of a couple’s marriage.

The Catholic Church believes that the Sacrament of Marriage is so beautiful and worthy of defending and honoring when it is attacked that the Church often finds herself at odds with our world’s secular culture. As Catholics, we believe that marriage is the sacrament that joins one man and one woman in a free, faithful, fruitful, and indissoluble union. As such, marriage is so important and must be celebrated and conferred with the proper form and matter for the effects of the sacrament to be fully received. When we talk about the effects of the Sacrament of Marriage, we aren’t simply talking about a man and a woman now being able to live freely in the same household, file for taxes jointly, or anything like that; while those sorts of things are certainly good things, we believe that there is so much more that happens that is even far more important within the Sacrament of Marriage. Rather, we talking about the graces that flow from the sacrament in order to perfect the couple’s love and strengthen their indissoluble union. Those special and essential graces strengthen spouses so they can help each other attain holiness on the way to eternal life, welcome and educate any children they are blessed with, and give them the grace to love one another with the love with which Christ has loved His Church, even when it is most difficult.

Consider the vows that spouses make to one another. Those beautiful vows speak volumes of the selfless and sanctifying love that spouses are called to have for one another:

I, N., take you, N., to be my wife. I promise to be faithful to you, in good times and in bad, in sickness and in health, to love you and to honor you all the days of my life.

I, N., take you, N., to be my husband. I promise to be faithful to you, in good times and in bad, in sickness and in health, to love you and to honor you all the days of my life.

The love that is being consented to and promised in these vows isn’t the fleeting and conditional love that our secular culture so often touts as the height and epitome of romance. Rather, the love that spouses declare to one another calls upon a lifelong and unconditional commitment. The Church knows that true love is so much more than a feeling because feelings change in the blink of an eye. True love, as the Church recognizes, is steadfast and lasting; it is an action and an intentional choice to choose to give of oneself for another, even unto death. This kind of love requires spouses to love as God loves us—freely, faithfully, totally, and fruitfully.

This love is a gift, so it must be freely given to one another. Consider God’s love for us: it is freely given to us even though we do nothing to earn that love. Even though we hurt God and wander from Him at times, He never withdraws His love from us at any moment of life for any reason; even though we are less than faithful to Him when we sin, He remains near to us and showers us steadfastly with His grace. God gives us His complete and total self and never holds any part of Himself back from us, and spouses are called to give of themselves in that same manner, sharing the good and the bad. As the Creator of all things, He holds all things in continued existence solely out of His love for us, and marital love is called to similarly be open to freely and lovingly accepting all that comes from it, both the blessings, such as children, and the sufferings that seek to unite spouses closer to one another and God.

Movies and stories tell the tales of star-crossed lovers overcoming extraordinary odds, defeating dragons and demons, and finally culminating with either true love’s kiss or the death of one of the lovers. Have you ever noticed that the bestselling stories rarely continue to include the monotonous day-to-day life that the lovers settle into, or the days when the flames and rush of emotions subside into mellowed and rote declarations of love? We can be drawn into the challenge and thrill of these fairytale romances, but if we are seeking to model our own marriage after the ideal couple, shouldn’t we look beyond these fictional stories to the Holy Family? This weeklong observance falls during the month of the Holy Family, and no other month could be more fitting for such a celebration than the month that celebrates the model of Christian families. Couples ought to look to the example the Holy Family when discerning how they can best live out their marriage vows. Husbands and wives, ask yourself these questions: How can we put our marriage at the service of God so He can accomplish great and wonderful things through our union, and How do we make our marriage less about ourselves and more about God, just as Joseph and Mary did?

From the outside looking in, the Holy Family seems like any other average family. As a family living during their respective era, they weren’t remarkable by any means. Their ability to love and serve one another in the midst of their ordinariness clearly exemplifies the many opportunities that are presented to couples to die to self in the little things of life. Each day, couples are presented with countless ways to show love to one another in the midst of the ordinariness of life. If you have seen the movie *Fireproof*, you’ve heard of a marriage challenge called “The Love Dare: 40 Days Love Journey.” The premise of this challenge is to find ways to show love to your spouse and to embrace the little opportunities that present themselves each day, not just to serve your spouse, but to help you better understand and emulate the free, total, faithful, and fruitful love that God calls us to have for one another.
