

Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament is celebrated on Tuesdays after the 5:30 PM Mass and Fridays beginning with morning prayer at 9:00 AM and ending with Benediction at 5:00 PM.

FIRST HOLY COMMUNION AND CONFIRMATION

Faith Formation classes are in person for 1st to 12th grade.

While the secular season of Christmas started Halloween night with store displays and radio stations, for us Catholics, it started with our 4 PM Mass on Christmas Eve. This Sunday, we celebrate Christ's Baptism in the Jordan River by St. John the Baptist. Today's feast also signals the end of the liturgical season of Christmas. In my Christmas letter, I talked about gratitude and being more gracious in this season and coming year. Today, it's my turn to express my sincere gratitude. I wanted to take the time in this week's bulletin to thank all of the people that helped make this liturgical season of Christmas such an inspiring time for so many. I apologize in advance if I left anyone out.

I would like to thank all of the people that served, but never formally signed up or "volunteered." Your spur-of-the-moment service to the Lord, His people, and this parish did not go unnoticed. Whether you were a teen or young adult helping seniors get to their cars, or you noticed an issue and brought it to the attention of someone else, you filled an important "invisible" role. We thank you, and I hope that you'll consider volunteering in a more formal capacity.

I want to thank all of our formal volunteers. From lectors to ushers and greeters to Extraordinary Ministers to our Environment Team, you truly made the over 30 Masses that we celebrated during this season special. I received hundreds of compliments from parishioners and visitors alike about how so many felt so welcome and included in our liturgical celebrations that simply flowed in such a beautiful setting. Without all of you, our priests, staff, and parishioners would have been at a loss.

I also want to thank our parish staff. While we are one of the fastest-growing parishes in the nation and diocese, we have the smallest staff in Las Vegas. Our staff members possess so many different talents from their exquisite musicianship to this uncanny ability to read my mind completing tasks before I even say anything to repairing things that break. With over 30 Masses celebrated over this time period, we had staff present at everything. Thank you for your support of our volunteers and parishioners.

I want to thank all of the clergy that helped me with all of these liturgies. As I'm sure you all know, clergy are in short supply, especially in Las Vegas. With nearly 850,000 Catholics living in Las Vegas (this number goes way up on weekends) and only about 60 active priests, we struggle to keep up. All of the parishes here are in the same boat trying to schedule priests. These men had plenty of options of where to go, but they chose St. Anthony of Padua.

I need to thank God. I have been blessed with so many things in my lifetime, but I am particularly blessed and thankful that He called me to lead this parish and the wonderful people here. These past two years have not been easy. From the COVID-19 pandemic to racial tension to the economic uncertainty that has led to financial hardship for so many families, you have all stood firm by my side as we live out our Baptismal promises and spread the Light of Christ in our local community. Over the past two years, there has never once been a question of what corners do we cut to save money or will the people come? That has not been the reality for many pastors, and I acknowledge how blessed I am to be here at St. Anthony of Padua.

For those that have been sitting in the wings, we need you! Please consider volunteering in one of our parish's ministries. Even if you only can help out a couple of times a month, we need you. If you aren't sure how to get involved, ask the person currently serving in that role. Or call the office. Or speak with me, any of our priests and deacons, or staff members. If you aren't in a position to volunteer right now due to infirmity, grueling work hours, or family commitments, please pray for us and consider helping once you are able.




St. Anthony of Padua Day Prayer for the Legal Protection of Unborn Children Mass Friday January 21, 2022 5:30 pm Rosary at 5 pm The over 56 million abortions since the 1973 decisions of Roe v. Wade and Doe v. Bolton reflect with heartbreaking magnitude what Pope Francis means by a "throwaway culture." However, we have great trust in God's providence. We are reminded time and again in Scripture to seek the Lord's help, and as people of faith, we believe that our prayers are heard. The General Instruction of the Roman Missal, no. 373, designates January 22 (the anniversary of Roe v. Wade) as a particular day of prayer and penance, called the "Day of Prayer for the Legal Protection of Unborn Children": "In all the Dioceses of the United States of America, a day shall be observed as a particular day of prayer for the full restoration of the legal guarantee of the right to life and of penance for violations to the dignity of the human person committed through acts of abortion."

"A great prayer for life is urgently needed, a prayer which will rise up throughout the world. Through special initiatives and in daily prayer, may an impassioned plea rise to God, the Creator and lover of life, from every Christian community, from every group and association, from every family and from the heart of every believer."



Liturgical Catechesis

On the morning of Friday, July 16, 2021, I woke up thinking about the coming day. My wife and I had our firstborn staying at the St. Rose NICU after she arrived three months early. Later that morning, I was to direct the twenty-five voice choir and chamber orchestra for the Episcopal Ordination of now-Bishop Gregory W. Gordon, our first Auxiliary Bishop. This was set to be the first-ever Episcopal Ordination in Nevada. The Papal Nuncio was to be in attendance as well as over thirty-five other Bishops, Archbishops, and Cardinals from around the nation. Oh, and it would be broadcast internationally on EWTN. No pressure, right?

As is the case for many, reading headlines is part of my morning routine. Morning headlines out of the Vatican, especially those pertaining to liturgy always catch my eye. There was a major headline out of Rome that morning. As I received texts of encouragement and congratulations from colleagues, I also received texts regarding Pope Francis' moto proprio entitled *Traditionis custodes*, or, "Guardians of Tradition," which was released earlier that morning by His Holiness in Vatican City and was hitting American media.

While some viewed *Traditionis custodes* as a proverbial victory and the Pope's ringing endorsement of praise and worship liturgy akin to the big-box non-denominational churches, others viewed this as an attack by the Vatican on traditional Catholic worship and values. Being the father of a newborn in the NICU where the "glass-half-full" approach is encouraged, and with a very important morning ahead of me, I decided to wait until later to read, pray, and form opinions.

One thing that eventually became abundantly clear to me was something that I already knew all too well. Especially as a high school educator. Reading comprehension skills for many need work and we all jump to the conclusion that we want way too early. To think that Pope Francis was stamping out tradition was absurd. Just translating the title of his letter told you that. While the letter is mostly filled with Vatican legalese, His Holiness concluded his letter with something very profound, yet simply and sternly put (in a fatherly way), and missed by many:

AT THE SAME TIME, I ASK YOU TO BE VIGILANT IN ENSURING THAT EVERY LITURGY BE CELEBRATED WITH DECORUM AND FIDELITY TO THE LITURGICAL BOOKS PROMULGATED AFTER VATICAN COUNCIL II, WITHOUT THE ECCENTRICITIES THAT CAN EASILY DEGENERATE INTO ABUSES. SEMINARIANS AND NEW PRIESTS SHOULD BE FORMED IN THE FAITHFUL OBSERVANCE OF THE PRESCRIPTIONS OF THE MISSAL AND LITURGICAL BOOKS, IN WHICH IS REFLECTED THE LITURGICAL REFORM WILLED BY VATICAN COUNCIL II.

Out of curiosity, after such a seemingly tumultuous year in Church music, this past week I went back and watched Pope Francis Midnight Mass on YouTube. Just this past Christmas, Pope Francis celebrated Midnight Mass at St. Peter's Basilica using the Novus Ordo Mass in Latin. The *Novus Ordo* is the "new Mass" that we celebrate every day of the week here at St. Anthony of Padua. Unlike the Extraordinary Form of the Mass, which was the only way Mass was celebrated prior to Vatican II, the *Novus Ordo* allows Mass to be celebrated in Latin or the local vernacular. In the case of our diocese, the vernacular includes English, Spanish, Tagalog, Polish, Vietnamese, Korean, and even French. The Papal Midnight Mass consisted of chanted antiphons and some of the same familiar carols that we sang at our own parish Masses. The sung Mass parts came directly from the Roman Missal, and are the same ones that we use at daily Mass and our 4 PM Sunday liturgy.

How could this be? Are Fr. Bob, Bill, and the music staff telepathic, and able to read minds? No. Are we as cutting edge as the Vatican? Not really. The answer lies in something much simpler, but also deeper.

The word *catholic* comes from the Greek word *katholikos*, which combines two Greek words that mean "universal." Pope Francis *moto proprio* reminded me, and serves to remind us all, that our individual opinions and preferences for liturgy are moot. We are all part of the much larger living and breathing Roman Catholic Church. His Holiness has, on numerous occasions, referred to the Catholic Church as a field hospital for wounded souls. The universal nature of the Church and the Mass is a critical component to Pope Francis' vision of the field hospital Church. Walk into any Catholic Church anywhere in the world, even if you do not know the language, and you can fully partake in the Sacrament. This realization is only possible if we all play by the same proverbial rules. Acknowledging this is difficult for many – both liberal and conservative – the guidelines are put into place not to elicit a robotic application, but rather active and vibrant participation for all by their universality in a uniform way around the world.

Over the next few weeks, look here as we explore in a series these liturgical books promulgated after Vatican Council II. Here I will relate how we as a parish are following the "prescriptions of the Missal and liturgical books," just as Pope Francis asked this past July. Additionally, I will be starting music classes this coming Wednesday, January 12. These classes primarily will focus on non-sectarian musical topics such as how to read music, how to sing, and how to count music; however, since we are a Catholic parish, we will explore musical topics as they relate specifically to our faith in action at the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. The Catholic Church spearheaded the use of music as a pedagogical tool in its catechesis, which is now a commonly accepted practice in non-sectarian settings ranging from the ABC Song with young children to Potsie's Parts of the Heart song from the classic 1970s sitcom Happy Days.

Acknowledging our faith's use of music as a tool for catechesis, next week we will explore how the lyrics in what we sing are so critical.

While the COVID-19 Pandemic has temporarily silenced our choirs these past two years, we have already begun the process of rebuilding our choral program in anticipation of the pandemic ending.

Starting on <u>Wednesday</u>, <u>January 12 at 7 PM</u> our Music Ministry will be offering <u>FREE</u> music classes to all persons 14 years of age and older. We will address various topics including note reading, rhythm, diction/pronunciation, and the historic/practical role of music within the Catholic faith. We will be starting at the very beginning. No experience or prior background knowledge required.

There is no long-term committment to become a member of our choral program once it is once again safe to-do so, but we really do hope you stay! View this as an opportunity to deepen your faith, investigate music's role in Catholic spirituality, and an opportunity to meet new people in a welcoming environment.

The objective of the current Synod is to listen, as the entire People of God, to what the Holy Spirit is saying to the Church.....the whole Synod Process aims at fostering a lived experience of discernment, participation, and coresponsibility. Synods are a time to dream and "spend time with the future". We are encouraged: to express an innovative outlook; to be inclusive; to keep an open mind; to listen to each and every one; to capture an understanding of journeying together; and, to value and involve the role and vocation of each member of the Body of Christ.

St. Hilary - Feast January 13

St. Hilary was one of those great Christian heroes who poured out their lives laboring and suffering in defense of Christ's divinity. Scarcely had the days of bloody persecution ended (313), when there arose, now within the Church, a most dangerous enemy of another sort, Arianism. The heresy of Arianism denied the divinity of Christ; it was, in fact, hardly more than a form of paganism masquerading as the Christian Gospel. The smoldering strife soon flared into a mighty conflict endangering the whole Church; and its spread was all the more rapid and powerful because emperors, who called themselves Christian, proved its best supporters. Once again countless martyrs sealed in blood their belief in Christ's divinity; and orthodox bishops who voiced opposition were forced into exile amid extreme privations.

Among the foremost defenders of the true faith stood Hilary. He belonged to a distinguished family and had received an excellent education. Though a married man, he was made bishop of Poitiers by reason of his exemplary life. It was not long before his valiant defense of the faith precipitated his exile to Phrygia. Here he composed his great work on the Blessed Trinity (in twelve books). It is a vigorous defense of the faith, which, he said, "triumphs when attacked." Finally, after four years he was permitted to return to his native land. He continued his efforts, and through prudence and mildness succeeded in ridding Gaul of Arianism. Because of his edifying and illustrious writings on behalf of the true religion, the Church honors him as one of her doctors.


