

Music & Liturgy Notes Understanding the Psalm and readings:

As parents, and children, we can all understand that intense moment of panic when you've "lost" your loved ones. I simply can not imagine the level of relief Mary and Joseph must have felt upon finding Jesus in the temple on the third day, followed by the profound confusion at his answer to his question. How many times have I asked my children a question only to get an answer that, to me, makes no sense at all? My husband and I try to teach our children to "question everything" and this is what we see today. Jesus is in the temple, not just teaching, but listening and asking questions. It is through questioning that we find our faith. You cannot believe in something that you have not taken the time to study and truly understand, looking at it from all sides. If we don't understand our faith, it can easily be put to the test and torn down by questioning. But the caveat to "question everything" is that you have to follow it up with searching for the answers. Jesus, as a child here, is growing up and beginning this time of questioning and Mary and Joseph, though justified in their question "why have you done this to us?", are realizing that they are now in the beginning stage of parenting when you learn to give just a little bit of independence to allow your children to explore and discover all the answers to their questions on their own (in a somewhat controlled environment).

In complement to the Gospel reading today, we have the story of Hannah in the first reading from Samuel. After years of praying for a child, and finally being blessed with a child, she is fulfilling her promise by bringing her son to the temple and dedicating him there to God. How many times have we made our own promises to God in times of extreme distress and not lived up to them? Hannah made a promise and is doing, what I personally find very difficult; she is giving up her son who she has prayed so long for. She's giving him to the temple to be raised, of course, but he will no longer live with her. To give up a child, somewhere around the age of 2 or 3, for me, seems an unbearable choice. But Hannah has something that we sometimes lack; trust. She knows that Samuel is God's, just as Mary and Joseph know that Jesus is God's son. Sometimes in our humanity we forget that we are all "children of God" as we see in Paul's first letter to John today. Paul says "the reason the world does not know us [as children of God] is that it did not know him." And that brings us full circle to today's lesson; we must continue to know, learn and understand our faith. We must take the time to truly know who God is, so that we can be better examples to the world. So that those around us, in turn, can see and know God through us. The Psalmist today says "Blessed are they who dwell in your house, O Lord." Hannah knows this when she brings Samuel there. Jesus knows this when he spends 3 days in the temple. Do we know this as we look around our church today? In a few short days we start a new year. Let's all take this opportunity to learn even more about our faith and share it with the world.

WHY CELEBRATE FOR JUST ONE DAY WHEN WE CAN HAVE EIGHT?

We've all heard "The Twelve Days of Christmas" but how about the Eight Days of Christmas? I am just becoming familiar with the Octave of Christmas when, like during the Easter Octave, each day is to be treated as a "little Christmas." Let's take some time to dig into the history of octave celebrations in the Catholic Church and how we as cantors can make these "little Christmas" days even more special.

Why eight? The bible is full of numbers. Just to name a few; God's creation took six days and He rested on the seventh. Jesus fasted and prayed in the desert for 40 days. There are 12 tribes of Israel, and Jesus chose 12 apostles. The number eight, though less well known, is also significant. The circumcision of Jewish boys always occurs on the eighth day. The Dedication of the Temple by Solomon lasted eight days. And the early Christians understood an "eighth day." It signified a re-creation because it is the day Jesus rose from the dead. As in Genesis, where God separated the light from the dark on day one of creation, Jesus' resurrection on Sunday (day one of the week) brought us out of the dark and into the light of Heaven when he redeemed us for our sins. While Sunday, per Roman culture, was the beginning of a new week and a normal workday, Christians were careful to observe it as the day Jesus' death on the cross brought us to a new creation. They celebrated it as a "day out of time" and thus the "eighth day." It became the day they would celebrate the very earliest forms of the Mass we celebrate today.

Take Time to Grasp the Mystery. Rev. Pius Parsch once said: "In the spirit of the Church the great feasts of redemption should not be restricted to a single celebration but should continue on through a full week... When a feast comes, the soul is amazed and not quite prepared to think profoundly upon its mystery; but on the following days the mind finds it easy to consider the mystery from all sides, sympathetically and deeply; and an eighth day affords a wonderful opportunity to make a synthesis of all points covered." (*The Church's Year of Grace*, Volume I, pp. 244-245). After Easter Sunday, the second most important feast day is—you guessed it—Christmas Day. With so much joy to be taken in during these two principal feasts, it's truly unfair to limit ourselves to one day of celebration. Why not take a full eight?

Reflect on Perfect Octaves. Musicians are familiar with the musical "octave" which is a diatonic scale built from eight consecutive notes. There's a certain circular, perfect nature when you start and end on the same note, just one octave up or down. This is not unlike how we can view the octave of Christmas. The first day is the Solemnity of Christmas Day, and each day thereafter is celebrated to a lesser extent, finally ending with the Solemnity of Mary, the Mother of God. If you take a close look at the readings for January 1, they take us back to the Nativity and pick up where we left off on Christmas Day. These eight days are a perfect time to sit and pray on each Gospel reading. As you do, see both their relation to the Nativity and to us today as we await the second coming of Christ. And if you attend Mass, you'll get to sing the Gloria each day!

Keep Singing Christmas! I don't know about you, but the day after Christmas I'm always a little disappointed when the Christmas music on the radio has stopped in favor of "Top 10" lists of the past year. We've spent the last month in Advent waiting and preparing for the Anniversary of Jesus' birth and, now that we're finally celebrating Christmas, the world has already moved on! These eight days are a perfect time to continue to sing all those beloved Christmas carols; The First Nowell, Silent Night, Away in a Manger... they're all a perfect complement to the Octave of Christmas as we celebrate a "little Christmas" each day.


The treasury of our Catholic faith is full of ways that we can deepen our knowledge to connect with God. As a cradle Catholic, I continue to be amazed at all the "new" things I am still learning. The number eight already held significance in my life as I have eight children, but now I have yet another reason to celebrate for eight full days. I pray you too will find joy and connection with God in your Octave of Christmas.




