• **Marriage Preparation:**


Persons seeking to be married at Saint Michael's need to be registered six months prior to initial contact. The parish office must be contacted six months prior to the anticipated wedding date.

Dear parishioners of Saint Michael's,

Happy Birthday, Mary! (We celebrate the Blessed Virgin Mary's birthday on September 8, though there is some uncertainty about the date. It reminds me of a seminarian, now priest, who was a refugee from Vietnam during the "boat people crisis" of the 1970s. He did not have any records of his birthday, and so us seminarians would honor his birthday many times throughout the year, just to give us a reason to celebrate!)



The eve of Mary's birthday is also a significant date in the worldwide Church because on this day, the Legion of Mary was founded 100 years ago in Dublin, Ireland. Many of you may have seen the August 20 Southern Nebraska Register about this celebration and the role that I play in the Legion of Mary throughout the diocese.

Simply speaking, the Legion of Mary is a parish-oriented association of lay people who seek to grow in holiness through prayer and apostolic action while looking to the Blessed Virgin Mary's intercession and example. The handbook of the Legion of Mary describes its object as

the glory of God through the holiness of its members developed by prayer and active co-operation, under ecclesiastical guidance, in Mary's and the Church's work of crushing the head of the serpent and advancing the reign of Christ (Handbook, p. 11).

While this sounds like some pretty heavy-duty spiritual warfare, the Legion is more about helping people grow in holiness while helping others do the same.

The commitment to the Legion of Mary can seem intense. An active member is required to invest three hours a week – one hour for a weekly prayer and formation meeting, and two hours doing specific corporal and spiritual works of mercy that are classified as "Legion work". The active member also prays a daily prayer called the Catena Legionis, which includes Mary's *Magnificat* from the Gospel of Luke. However, if we consider how much time we spend watching television, checking social media, etc., an hour of prayer and faith formation and two hours of service to the people of our community would seem doable for many.

However, I recognize that active membership in the Legion of Mary is not for everyone, and so there is also auxiliary membership. These members are like the "prayer warriors" of the Legion of Mary, committing to praying the all the prayers of the Legion (including the Rosary) every day to support the work of the active members.

One of my goals while being at Saint Michael's is to get the Legion of Mary going again in our parish. The Legion of Mary was active at Saint Michael's from the 1960s until around the year 2000. It would be a blessing for the parish and for me to have a group of people committed to the "work of crushing the head of the serpent and advancing the reign of Christ". If you have any questions about the Legion of Mary, please let me know.

Just a reminder that I am gone the next two Sundays. Thank you to all who gave to the missions of Northern Alaska.

3. True or **False** – The Jews have a special responsibility for Jesus' death.

The historical complexity of Jesus' trial is apparent in the Gospel accounts. The personal sin of the participants (Judas, the Sanhedrin, Pilate) is known to God alone. Hence we cannot lay responsibility for the trial on the Jews in Jerusalem as a whole, despite the outcry of a manipulated crowd and the global reproaches contained in the apostles' calls to conversion after Pentecost. Jesus himself, in forgiving them on the cross, and Peter in following suit, both accept "the ignorance" of the Jews of Jerusalem and even of their leaders. Still less can we extend responsibility to other Jews of different times and places, based merely on the crowd's cry: "His blood be on us and on our children!", a formula for ratifying a judicial sentence. As the Church declared at the Second Vatican Council:

Neither all Jews indiscriminately at that time, nor Jews today, can be charged with the crimes committed during his Passion. . . the Jews should not be spoken of as rejected or accursed as if this followed from holy Scripture. (CCC 597)

4. What parable of Jesus perhaps best describes the process of conversion and the merciful love of the Father?

5. True or **False** – The Eucharist is not a sacrifice because Jesus dying upon the Cross only happened once.

When the Church celebrates the Eucharist, she commemorates Christ's Passover, and it is made present the sacrifice Christ offered once for all on the cross remains ever present. "As often as the sacrifice of the Cross by which 'Christ our Pasch has been sacrificed' is celebrated on the altar, the work of our redemption is carried out."

Because it is the memorial of Christ's Passover, the Eucharist is also a sacrifice. The sacrificial character of the Eucharist is manifested in the very words of institution: "This is my body which is given for you" and "This cup which is poured out for you is the New Covenant in my blood." In the Eucharist Christ gives us the very body which he gave up for us on the cross, the very blood which he "poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins." (CCC 1364-1365)

6. **True** or False – Grave sin not only ruptures our relationship with God, but also harms our communion with the Church.

Sin is before all else an offense against God, a rupture of communion with him. At the same time it damages communion with the Church. For this reason conversion entails both God's forgiveness and reconciliation with the Church, which are expressed and accomplished liturgically by the sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation. (CCC 1440)

7. **True** or False – In order to accept God's mercy, we must acknowledge sin.

"God created us without us; but he did not will to save us without us." To receive his mercy, we must admit our faults. "If we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just, and will forgive our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness." (CCC 1847)

8. The place where God's law is written in our very self is called the ___?___.

"Deep within his conscience man discovers a law which he has not laid upon himself but which he must obey. Its voice, ever calling him to love and to do what is good and to avoid evil, sounds in his heart at the right moment.... For man has in his heart a law inscribed by God.... His conscience is man's most secret core and his sanctuary. There he is alone with God whose voice echoes in his depths." (CCC 1776)

9. What prayer at Jesus' agony echoes his mother's prayer at his conception?

"Thy will be done..."

10. This saint born in England as a Roman citizen. He was kidnapped and taken to Ireland, would escape, but eventually return to Ireland as a missionary and bishop. He is the patron saint of Ireland, known for his biography (*Confessio*) and his hymn, the *Lorica* (or breastplate).




A Look at This Sunday's Bible Readings for the 23rd Sunday of Ordinary Time

Most Americans have come to view Labor Day as a secular holiday that marks the unofficial end of summer. Football season usually starts this weekend, and many people get Labor Day off from work. Few people actually take the day to ponder what we mean by work or labor. While Labor Day is not on the Church liturgical calendar, the day was originally proposed by a man from an Irish Catholic immigrant family who had been influenced in his youth by early Catholic social teachings. In a world that had radically changed from a primarily agrarian economy to one based on a much more ruthless industrialism that treated workers as expendable, the system had become exploitative to the working poor. A few years later, Pope Leo XIII issued a remarkable encyclical, *Rerum Novarum*, which laid out basic Catholic teachings on what a just economic system must look like.

The Mass readings today touch on the general theme behind much of Catholic social teaching in regards to labor and the poor. Those who have limited means often fear not having enough to survive. Today's reading from *Isaiah* speaks to Jews who have been taken into exile in Babylon and lost everything of material worth. Isaiah is very clear that they should not fear because God will provide and come to their vindication.

In the *Letter of James*, the author is concerned with social justice in a different way. James says that Christians should not give preference to the rich and well to do of society and should not treat the poorer members of the congregation like second class members of the community. James is adamant that God often has chosen to speak through the poor and downtrodden, for such people know what it means to have to rely on God every day for their very survival. In that daily reliance upon God is found a strength and bond with the Almighty that often alludes those with wealth and power.

In a similar way, The *Gospel of Mark* reading portrays an element of Jesus' human life that is often overlooked. Jesus is in the Decapolis, which was a group of ten of the most wealthy cities between Jerusalem and Syria. They were wealthy because the area was extremely pro-Roman. The Roman Empire was very generous to its friends and allies in both trade and patronage. In traveling through the area, a man is brought to Jesus to be healed. Instead of simply healing the man with no effort, Jesus has to labor to heal the man. In an area of easy wealth and prosperity, Jesus shows solidarity with the working poor by healing the deaf man in a manner so difficult he physically groans in the process and reverts back to speaking Aramaic, the language both of his youth and of the working poor of Judea. This healing is a labor of love for Jesus that did not come easily, but shows how Jesus saw the inherent good found in the value of man's labor. Even a Messiah who was also fully God was not above showing solidarity with the poor by physically working to heal a poor man, for in the words of Pope Leo XIII in his encyclical, "Jesus lovingly invites those in labor and grief to come to Him for solace."
