


MY DEAR SISTERS AND BROTHERS IN CHRIST,

s I ponder on the theme for this week which is Christian Unity, I could not help but remember the song "They'll Know We are Christians". We can find it in our book Breaking Bread #586 and I believe most of us are familiar with this song that goes:

We are one in the Spirit, we are one in the Lord.
We are one in the Spirit, we are one in the Lord.
And we pray that all unity may one day be restored,
And they'll know we are Christians by our love, by our love,
Yes they'll know we are Christians by our love.

As beautiful as the first lines of the song are, the verse also makes an admission that there is a need for unity in the Church. The Lord Jesus seems to have already anticipated disunity among his followers. In the gospel of St John 17:20-21, the Lord prayed to the Father "that they may all be one, even as you, Father, are in me, and I in you, so that they may be in us, so that the world may believe that you sent me". From the outset, there were already disagreements among the apostles, especially between St. Peter and St. Paul. By the grace of God, that conflict was resolved—and they walked the same way of dying for Jesus. In the early centuries of the Church's existence, there were many instances of rifts and disagreements: ecclesiastical, theological, political, cultural, jurisdictional, and language differences.

The Great Schism of 1054 placed a huge wedge between two opposing sides of the Church—and it finalized a great divide between the East (Orthodox Church) and the West (Roman Catholicism). It was a very bitter time for the Church so much so that many attempts to reconcile the two sides proved futile. While there have been some lights of hope with the more recent attempts at reconciliation by Pope St. John Paul II, Pope Benedict XVI, and Pope Francis, major issues still remain unresolved. (The Protestant Reformation started by Martin Luther in 1517 even paved the way for more challenges to the Church that spread from Europe to many parts of the world. It brought more division among Christians and caused the spread of thousands of different religious denominations that broke away from the Latin Rite of the West.) It is very sad to admit that while Christians worship the same One True God, we do not worship in the same way and do not believe in doctrines the same way. That is why we are being asked to pray for Christian Unity—that we may be one as Jesus prayed "Ut sint unum."

There is only one way for this disunity to be resolved—and it is stated by the song that we mentioned above: it is only LOVE that can bring true unity. They will know that we are Christians by our LOVE. Love heals all wounds. Love dispels distrust and opens the way for reconciliation. Love leads to forgiveness. Love conquers all.



"UNITED WE STAND, DIVIDED WE FALL"

he title is a common phrase that's been used for multiple years. It has been attributed to Aesop in a short story he wrote about the Four Oxen and the Lion.

From then on it's been used in the founding documents of our country, in strife among churches, in political arenas, but the lesson is always the same. If we do not work together, we will not solve our issues. We are in the midst of the week of Christian unity, and we know that we are still divided. We are in the midst of our own church that is dealing with different viewpoints on how we do things, on what we stand for, on challenges to moving forward, on a world wide synod to define how we can move forward.

The readings today are similar. The first reading refers to light in the darkness. There is a way forward. Christ is our light and our salvation. In the second reading, Paul urges the Christians to "agree in what you say, and that there be no divisions among you, but that you be united in the same mind and in the same purpose." Is this not a lesson for us today? How united are we as a church? How often can we even bring up church issues? We are in the midst of change and sometimes don't know how to come out of the darkness, but we need to find the light that will lead us on.

The Gospel describes the call of Peter and Andrew and by extension all of us. We are called to leave behind our differences and seek Jesus with all our determination and hearts. We need to leave behind our pre-conceived notions. We need to leave behind our prejudices. We need to leave behind our "boat", our safety net. Even our jobs might need some review as to how unifying they really are. We see and hear on TV and media the people with contrasting views of everything. If we try hard enough (or maybe not even try), we can stay focused on our ultimate goal. We do have a job to do, like Peter and Andrew. We had a Christian church that was unified at one time, but if we pursue the dialogue, at least we can begin to understand each other; we can begin to heal.

This week maybe we can be conscious of the dis-unifying positions surrounding us and make a resolve to listen, to understand, and maybe even take the first steps towards unity. Let us pray for this unity.

PRAY WITH LIGHT IN DARKNESS

hen I was a young seminarian, I asked a wise old priest how to pray better. He said simply, "Don't lie when you pray." He helped me to see how much energy I waste in trying to appear acceptable to God when I pray. For me, prayer was showing off for God and hiding what was ugly.

It's stunning that the Gospel of Matthew tells us of Jesus, "He left Nazareth and went to live in Capernaum by the sea, in the region of Zebulon and Naphtali..." This isn't just the Lord's relocation up north. It's his moving into places of shame and defeat. This region was where the enemy invasion of Israel began centuries before. Jesus left the comfortable confines of Nazareth and sought out a place of darkness, not to bring shame, but to announce the dawning of his light.

When we pray, we usually prefer Jesus to stay put in our little Nazareths—where we feel comfortable. successful, and in control. But he moves, He re-locates into the Zebulons and Naphtalis of our shame, embarrassment, fear, and sense of being defeated. The question for us is: will we allow him to take up residence in those places in our prayer time? Will we talk to him honestly about our places of darkness? If we do, we're no longer lying when we pray. — Fr. John Muir



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
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
