THE LORD IS MY SHEPHERD; I shall not wart PSALM 23

MY DEAR SISTERS AND BROTHERS IN CHRIST,

Today is Good Shepherd Sunday. The central message for us today is that Jesus is the One True Shepherd and we belong to His flock. A few weeks ago—during Holy Week—we remembered the ultimate sacrifice that Jesus our Good Shepherd did for us when he died on the Cross. As the gospel tells us, one clear characteristic of the Good Shepherd is His willingness to die for His flock. Jesus was always one who would fulfill what He says. At one point, He said, "There is no greater love than this: to lay down one's life for his friends." (John 15:13). Oh, how great is the love of the Good Shepherd for His sheep.

The gospel also speaks of the relationship that exists between the Shepherd and the sheep. The Good Shepherd calls His own sheep by name and leads them out. He walks ahead of them, and the sheep follow Him, because they recognize His voice. They will not follow a stranger, but instead, they would run away from him because they do not recognize the voice of strangers. (cf.John 10:4-6) It is very clear that Jesus has always been our faithful Shepherd. He is the one who knows each one of us thoroughly, and in spite of what He knows about us, He loves us just the same. He continues to draw us to Himself so that He can lead us to greener pastures—where He would feed us with His own Body and Blood. As the Good Shepherd, He shields us from the stranger—the enemy—so that we may be kept safe from harm.

Jesus is the Good Shepherd and we are His flock. But today, we must look into ourselves and ask: "Are we being a good flock?" Or perhaps, "Am I a good sheep? Do I really recognize the voice of my Shepherd and follow His calls? Could it be that there are times when I also tend to look out for other voices out there other than the voice of my Shepherd?" The gospel says "the sheep does not listen to the voice of a stranger". But to be honest, sometimes we have the tendency to entertain "other voices" because they make very "interesting" promises. Sadly, those promises are often lures of the enemy—and they aim to lead us away from our Shepherd and eventually to destruction. Therefore, we as His sheep must stay with our Shepherd and must never stray away from Him even for a moment.

Today is also World Day of Prayer for Vocations. The USCCB tells us that the purpose of this day of prayer is to fulfill the Lord's instruction to, "Pray the Lord of the harvest to send laborers into his harvest" (Mt 9:38; Lk 10:2). The bishops state: "As a climax to a prayer that is continually offered throughout the Church, it affirms the primacy of faith and grace in all that concerns vocations to the priesthood and to the consecrated life." We need to continue praying for more men and women who would consider serving the Lord through the Holy Orders (priesthood and diaconate) and religious life (consecrated life). There is so much dearth for vocations especially here in the United States, so much so that our local church has to request for international priests to come and minister to our people. Fr. Thomas and I, both foreign born priests, are happy to be here. We join you in praying to God "to send more laborers" into this vineyard of the Lord, and that we may all produce good fruit at the time of harvest.

RECOGNIZING THE VOICE OF JESUS

When my wireless provider introduced HD Voice, the voice I heard on my phone was unbelievably clear, and it felt at times like both the caller and I were in the same room. The best aspect of this feature is that it didn't cost the customer any additional fees, and it didn't require any changes to the phone. I could say it was free, but I suspect I was already paying for it in my monthly bill anyway. At least it felt free.

The clearer the voice calling you, the easier it is to recognize who it is on the other end of the line. In John's Gospel, Jesus speaks of the gatekeeper who opens the gate and calls for his sheep. They respond because they know his voice. Others try to lure the sheep when the gatekeeper is not there, but the sheep find their voices unclear or unfamiliar.

Jesus is our gatekeeper. But unlike receiving something for free from a wireless company, to be able to hear his voice we need to pay attention and practice listening. By developing a stewardship way of life that is mindful and prayerful, we become attuned to his voice and are able to discern when the call is from our Lord and when it is from an imposter. It is great to talk about all the things we can do and all the gifts we can share, but if we are not listening for his call to hear where our offerings are needed, we can end up like a lost sheep searching for the gatekeeper. —Tracy Earl Welliver, MTS

THE TRUE VOICE

rowing up in the Omaha Archdiocese, we had a Catholic newspaper called the True Voice, (since named the Catholic Voice). I recalled this when I re-read today's Gospel about the shepherd and his sheep. For years we've heard the homilies about following the shepherd; about how the shepherd safeguards his sheep; about the lost sheep; the sheep knowing the shepherd. However today, I would like to focus on the "true voice".

When the sheep were in the fold and the shepherd decided to move them, he would call out and the sheep would follow him wherever he went. The shepherd was the guide.

Today we are bombarded by many voices. We have newsprint although many have gone digital which can leave out the population who doesn't really work with computers. We have cable news who project their own slant on stories and items of importance. We have media on our cell phones, on our desktops, on our I-pad, all the while streaming the latest events. And more recently we have AI (artificial intelligence) which not only can produce the articles we read but also can now imitate our voices. Amid all this, we are called to follow the shepherd, the true voice for us as followers of our Good Shepherd.

We need to be familiar with his voice or else we can be following the wrong shepherd and be led away from his loving care. We need to be open to hearing his voice. But how do we know what is the true voice?

We have Catholic writings. We have columnists who present the church's teaching. We have our sense of knowing that something is true or false. Sometimes, however, we don't want to hear the truth. We either don't believe it or don't want to hear it. We want to travel our own path. And then we get lost. We need to find our way back. Many times it could be a health scare, a death in the family, a tragic accident, anything that asks us to recall the faith we grew up with. We just need to open our ears, to hear the familiar voice of the past, calling us back. If our ears are open, we will be able to narrow all the voices down to the one we need to hear; the one who opens the gate for us; the one True Voice.

As we sing Psalm 23, "The Lord is my shepherd; there is nothing I shall want."

This week, let us hear the voice of the shepherd. He is calling us to respond. He is opening the gate for us. He is our Savior.




around a corner, she'll sprint toward me and jump up into my arms.

Throughout this coming week, we will experience many interior promptings to receive God's love, and to love Him in return. That's his voice. Follow it into the safe and tender arms of Christ.

By contrast, some voices we will hear do not convey God's concern and love for us, but rather produce fear, despair, and other harmful mischief. Jesus calls these voices those of robbers. Does an idea or thought make it harder for you to love God? If so, run away. Let it go. It is most likely not the voice of the Risen Lord. Keep waiting for him to speak. You will recognize his voice. Then run to him as fast as you can. -Fr. John Muir
