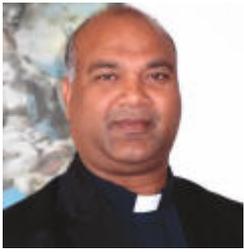

From the Pastor's Desk:

There is a true story in Ripley's *Believe It or Not* about a judge in Yugoslavia who had an unfortunate accident. He was "electrocuted" when he reached up to turn on the light while standing in the bathtub. His wife found his body

sprawled on the bathroom floor. She called for help. Friends and neighbors, police--everyone showed up. He was pronounced dead and taken to the funeral home. The local radio picked up the story and broadcast it all over the air. In the middle of the night, the judge regained consciousness. When he realized where he was, he rushed over to alert the night watchman, who promptly ran off, terrified. The first thought of the judge was to phone his wife and reassure her, using the funeral home phone. But he got no further than, "Hello darling, it's me," when she screamed and fainted. He tried calling a couple of the neighbors, but they all thought it was some sort of a sick prank. He even went so far as to go to the homes of several friends, but they were all sure he was a ghost and slammed the door in his face. Finally, he was able to call a friend in the next town who hadn't heard of his death. This friend was able to convince his family and other friends that he really was alive. Today's Gospel tells us that Jesus had to convince the disciples that he wasn't a ghost. He had to dispel their doubts and their fears. He showed them his hands and his feet. He invited them to touch him and see that he was real. And he even ate a piece of cooked fish with them--all to prove that he was alive and not a ghost or spirit. He stood there before them, as real and alive as he had been over the past three years. (The Autoillustrator)



VATICAN CORNER

St. Peter's Basilica has 11 chapels and 45 altars, of which many have been used every morning by priests to celebrate their daily Mass. The Code of Canon Law states that "priests are earnestly invited to offer the sacrifice of the Eucharist daily..." Priests generally meet this invitation by celebrating the Mass individually or concelebrating with other priests and with the faithful present. Many of the priests celebrating in the Basilica are Vatican officials who begin each day saying Mass. Frequently priests celebrate Mass alone and without any faithful participating. In the past there had been discussion of whether to end the practice of individual Masses in the Basilica. According to Fr. John Baldwin, professor of historical and liturgical theology, he says "in addition to the General Instructions of the Roman Missal, Scripture also makes it clear that "the Eucharist is essentially communal." "Many Masses being celebrated simultaneously in the same church is a contradictory and confusing sign." Fr. Mark Francis, retired president of Catholic Theological Union said "the Eucharist is a communal celebration; to have a private Mass is a sort of an oxymoron." He recalled how the sacristy of the Basilica often resembled Grand Central Station with priests constantly coming and going. He said that priests who have chosen to celebrate in the Basilica alone "claim it is out of piety and devotion, but ultimately celebrating the pre-Vatican II Mass is a rejection of the council and everything it stands for. What it stands for is basically the adapting the liturgy more suitably to the needs of our own times. Following the retirement of Cardinal Angelo Comastri and the appointment of the new Archpriest of the Basilica, Cardinal Mauro Gambetti, the restriction of holding private Masses in the upper part of the Basilica was issued on March 22, 2021. Holding private Mass is now forbidden. The restriction shocked traditionalist Catholic who described it as "forced uniformity." Reformists were delighted saying it is a long overdue prioritization of the communal nature of the Mass. 

HOW TO REQUEST A MASS INTENTION

If you would like to do a mass intention while the office is closed the easiest way is to do it online on our parish website saintjoachim.net / Select the Donate/Pay in the upper right hand corner and then select mass intentions , put all your payment information in and in

the comment section please put a date and time of the mass you would like your intention read at. Even though right now those mass times do not exist we would like to know which mass would be your preference. Intentions must be in by noon the day before except for the weekend masses - those must be submitted by noon on Friday. You can still drop mass intentions in the Rectory mail slot or in the mail but these must be a minimum of one week in advance since we are not in the office on a regular basis now. If you have questions about this process, please call the Rectory Office and someone will return your call.



Things we need to Remember

To receive Communion

~ Father will give communion to the One Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion at communion time.

~ Ushers will direct you to come to communion. The side pews will be first, then the main section.

~ To receive communion, you will receive The Body of Christ, in your hand, take a step to the side, remove your mask with your other hand, then consume the host, and then replace your mask. If you want to receive in the mouth go to the back of the church to the main double doors and be the last one that goes to Father for Communion.
