Plant Your Works in the Word

One of the things about Scripture is that even the smallest word and shortest phrase can be critical to the overall message. When you take a quiet moment to rest with the Word, you find how quickly the most mundane sentence can reach out and grab you, pulling you into a deeper contemplation of some truth you hadn't even considered until then.

But we often fail to act as the Israelites in the Book of Nehemiah, standing before the Water Gate "listening attentively." Whether it's at Mass during the Liturgy of the Word or at home poring over the Bible, time after time we find ourselves less mindful than we could be. Our ears accept the sounds of the words and our eyes glance over the shape of the letters.

But are we mindful — truly?

The best answer is hopefully at least sometimes. There are always tasks to be completed, problems weighing on our minds that we can't quite give over to God. We lose ourselves in these things instead of in Scripture. We "clock in" with Bible reading instead of "diving in."

We can never forget that the words of the Lord are spirit and life. They are the soil that quickens the seed of all stewardship. There is no mindfulness, no prayer, no graciousness, no gratitude or accountability or sense of commitment unless there is the Word.

So let us pray today for mindfulness, that our every action will be grounded in the law of God — giving it true spirit and life.

Planta tus obras en la Palabra





VATICAN CORNER The word

diocese

originally referred to a governmental area in the Roman Empire, governed by an imperial vicar. The Christian Church adapted the term to be the territorial area administered by a bishop. In the Roman Catholic Church, since the eleventh century, it has been the rule that only the pope can divide or merge dioceses or create new ones. All dioceses are divided into parishes. each with its own church. Since the pope is the supreme power in the Church, he does not have to follow the cannon rules regarding the division of dioceses, but he generally does. The first rule is that there should be a sufficient reason, such as the



diocese is too large, has too many faithful, or the means of communication too difficult. The second rule is that there should be a suitable city or town for the episcopal residence. The third rule says that there should be enough resources for the bishop's own maintenance and for that of the clergy involved in the general administration, for the establishment of a cathedral church, the expenses of Divine worship, and the general administration of the diocese. In the past the resources were to include land, but today land is not always possible. The fourth rule is the required consent of the bishop affected; however Pope John XXII ruled that the pope can create the division in spite of the opposition of the bishop. The pope normally asks the advice of the archbishop and all the bishops within the province, and often a division takes place at the request of the affected bishop himself. In 1840 Pope Gregory XVI established the two Dioceses of Baja California and Alta California. Eight years later, thousands of people came from around the world to Alta California in the search of gold. Mexico ceded California to the United State and it became the 31st state. Pope Pius IX established the Diocese of Monterey which encompassed all of the State. In 1853 Pope Pius IX split off the 13 northern counties in California to form the Archdiocese of San Francisco. Population grow eventually complicate the Archdiocese pastoral ministry, and so sixty years ago on January 13, 1962, Pope John XXIII created three new dioceses: Oakland, Santa Rosa, and Stockton from the Archdiocese of San Francisco. Bishop Floyd L. Begin was appointed the first bishop of Oakland and was installed on April 28, 1962 in St. Francis de Sales Church which was designated to be the cathedral. Five months after Bishop Begin's installation the Second Vatican Council was convened, so he was able to participate in all its sessions. The Diocese of Oakland became a proving ground for making the changes called for by the Council in liturgy, lay involvement, and ecumenism. The cathedral was the first one in the country to be remodeled to follow the liturgical space changes directed by the Council. Bishop Begin died in 1977 and Bishop John S. Cummins ran the Diocese's until his retirement in 2003. The 1989 Loma Prieta earthquake damaged St. Francis de Sales Cathedral and Sacred Heart Parish beyond repair. Bishop Cummins began an exploration program which led to the building of the new \$131 million cathedral in downtown Oakland. Bishop Vigneron (2003-2009) dedicated the new Cathedral of Christ the Light in 2008. He went on to become the Archbishop of Detroit in 2009. Bishop Salvatore J. Cordileone was the fourth bishop of Oakland from 2009 to 2012. He went on to become the Archbishop of the Archdiocese of San Francisco. On May 3, 2013, Pope Francis appointed Bishop Michael C. Barber our current bishop. Upon this 60th anniversary, the Diocese asks for "the Lord's continued blessing and divine guidance on all our people, and we give thanks to God for all the blessings we have received as a diocese these 60 Years."
