From Our Pastor

On the day immediately following Christmas, I am so used to celebrating the Feast of St. Stephen, the protomartyr, or first martyr of the Church. This year, however, we roll right into the Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph, instead. The celebration of the martyrdom of St. Stephen falls off the liturgical calendar, as did the celebration of the Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe, which gave way to the celebration of the Third Sunday of Advent. There is something of a "science" that goes into determining what feasts and celebrations take precedence on the liturgical calendar, and if anyone wants to get into it, I'd suggest clicking on the US Bishops website (https://www.usccb.org/resources/2022-liturgical-calendar).

In thinking about what I might say about family, however, I find myself being somewhat reflective. I've been thinking about the joy that my nieces, Mollie and Anna, bring to our entire family. But I've also been remembering back into my own childhood, and my experiences of

growing up in a remote part of the world. I had a very blessed and carefree childhood. I was blessed to know my grandparents on both sides of my family. Not only did I know them, but I knew them as young men and women not much older than I am today. They were energetic and engaging, and deeply involved in my life. In fact, it was not uncommon for my father's parents to "kidnap" me without my parents knowing. We would be gone for the day, just driving around, visiting extended family and friends. I have very fond memories of those days, and of the times spent with my adoring grandparents. To this day I can remember things they said, jokes that I was told, and insights for life that they shared with me.

Much has changed in our experiences of family and I have learned that not everyone's experience is the same. Traditionally, family might have been understood as a husband and wife and their children. Today, there are a variety of realities embraced and being understood as family, for example, there are single-parent families, co-habiting couples with and without children, foster families, same-sex parent families, child-free families, etc. There are many people who enter into relationships of intentionality in which people choose others to be family together. Then there is the whole world of "extended family."

How we understand family is important in our society, and it seems to me that it's not as simple as articulating things according to any one person's experience. There are a myriad of related issues to this that we have to consider in society today. Immediately I am thinking of who gets to be with loved ones in hospitals or in other care settings. Caregiver

benefits and opportunities for leave from work, compassionate leave and other forms of leave, are often described in terms of family relationships. Likewise, how we understand family goes into our development of parental rights and responsibilities as well as maternity and paternity leave policies. Add to this that it is not uncommon in our time for multigenerational families to live within the same household, and as people live longer, it begins to stretch members of families in their relationships and the attendant responsibilities.

While these might all be issues that deserve our considered attention, on this day when we celebrate the Feast of the Holy Family, it's worth remembering

that our scriptures have an abundance of insights into family relationships and the range of experiences is reflected in the pithy sayings from the Book of Proverbs (e.g. "Listen to your father who begot you, do not despise your mother when she is old." Prov 23:22; "Discipline

your children, and they will bring you comfort, and give delight to your soul." Prov 29:17), as well as in the longer narratives such as we hear in todays' first reading and gospel.

While families have grown increasingly complex, and our understanding of what constitutes a family has been stretched and continues to be stretched in how we work to support and nurture families, it is good to remember that God-among-us in the person of Jesus, entered into this world and began the work of salvation as a child, as a son, with a mother and father to guide and guard him. It was within the context of family that the experiences and wisdom of generations before him was passed on to him as his birthright, and the history of his people was embodied in the lives of his immediate and extended family. This was true for Jesus, and it has its parallels in our own lives.

As we seek to live lives of Christian discipleship, we don't do this apart from the context of who we are in our relationships with one another, and foremost among those relationships are those we have within our families.

May God bless the families of our community. May God grace all those who take their place within their families, striving to be their best selves in their relationships with one another. May we find in our lives of love for our brothers and sisters, our children and our parents, a pattern of love to enable us to open our hearts to all those in need. May God bless us all, that we in turn, may be a blessing for our world.





GOSPEL MEDITATION - ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

The Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph

Families can be very difficult things to negotiate. This is true not only of our families of origin, the current family of which we are a part, the family of our Church, our society, and our global family as well. Everything human can be found in family stories. Those stories speak of wonderful life-giving successes as well as painful spirit-robbing abuses. Our greatest joys and our greatest wounds are usually connected with the experience of family. Our needs, experiences, and unresolved baggage often color what we bring to our familiar relationships. They contribute to our level of defensiveness, how guarded and protected we become, and what prejudices we believe.



In order to break the cycle of dysfunction we have to remember that it is not only by human effort that we negotiate the difficult and challenging events of our lives. There is a Divine Effort at work as well. For sure, the human effort can create quite a mess and easily destroy lives. This is true of any family with which we are associated. Today's Feast of the Holy Family serves to help us understand that there is a Divine Story being told as well. It is a story of perseverance in the face of hardship, determination in the face of despair, healing when we see nothing but wounds, and light where there is darkness.

Do we believe that God is always working, guiding, restoring, and leading? Unless we do, we will never be free from the imperfections and wounds that bind us and never be able to understand what it really means to forgive. Pope Francis tells us that the "light which comes from the Holy Family encourages us to offer human warmth to other families." While this is most certainly true, we can only really begin to do this when we realize that we are still works in progress, not anchored to the wounds and sins of our past, and still a leading star in God's continually unfolding story of love. The Holy Family persevered and radiated warmth because they knew they were not alone. We can too.
