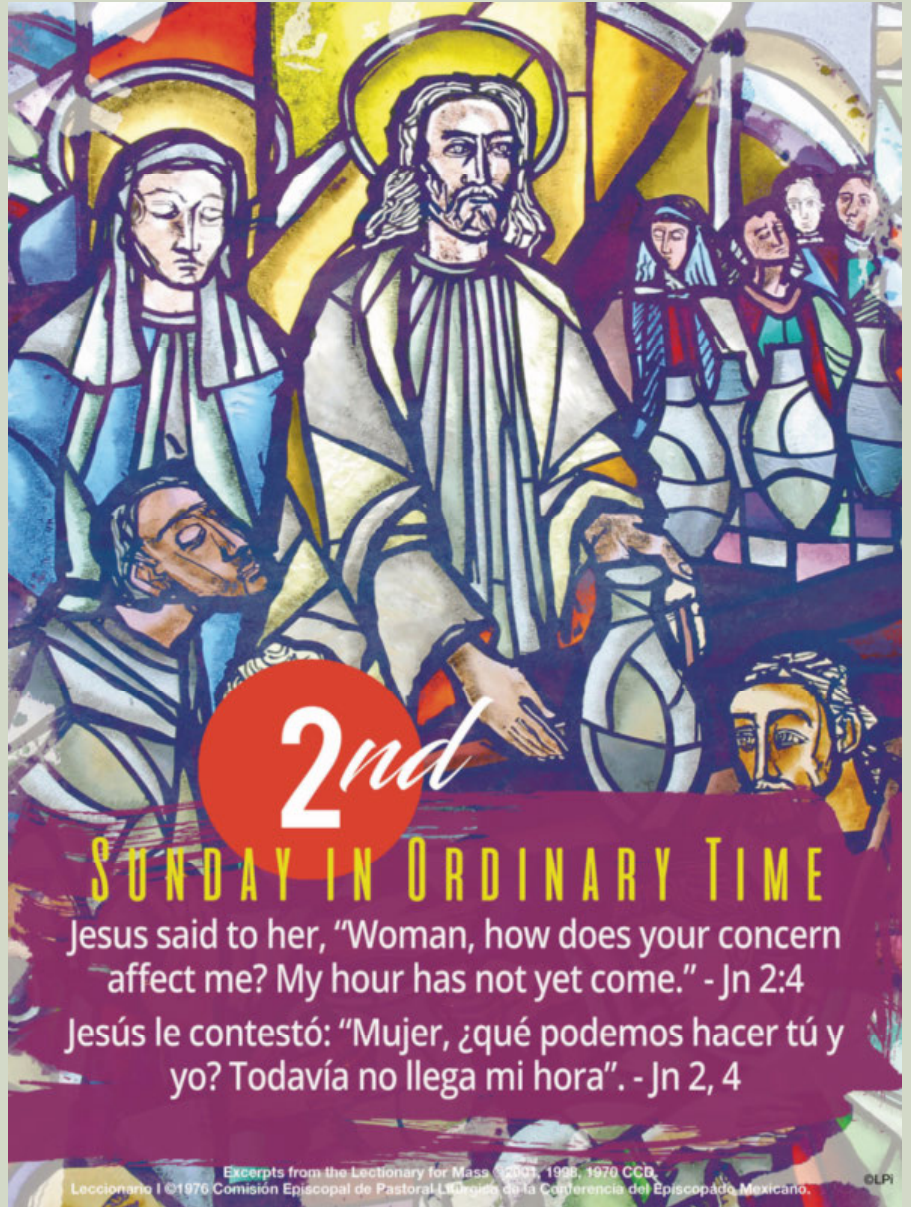

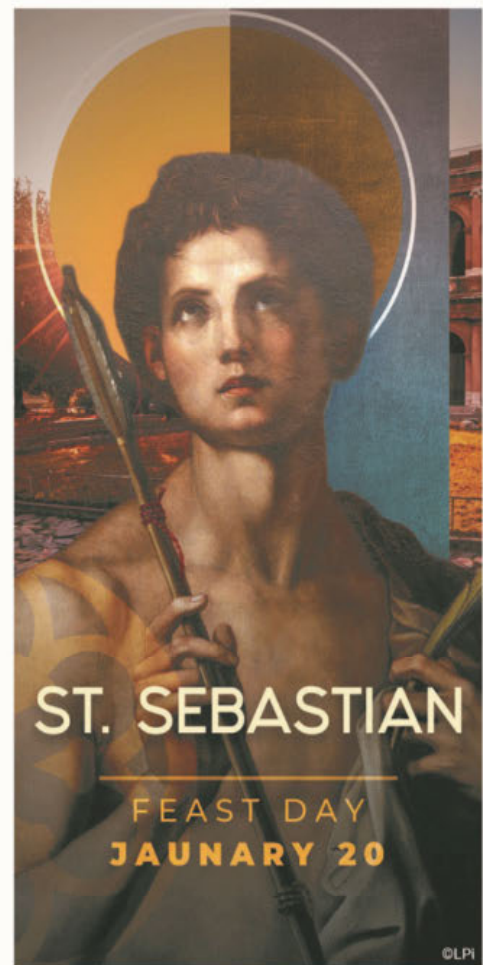

SAINT OF THE WEEK

Not much is known about the life of St. Sebastian (256 – 287), except that he was a Roman martyr whose name has been mentioned throughout history since early 350.

We see St. Sebastian many times in art, especially from iconic paintings from Guido Reni, Andrea Mantegna and Hendrick ter Brugghen. Historical scholars now agree that a spiritual story has the beloved saint entering the Roman army because only there could he assist Christian martyrs without arousing suspicion on himself. Eventually he was found out, brought before Emperor Diocletian and delivered to Mauritanian archers to be shot to death. Pierced with arrows, he was left for dead, but managed to survive. He recovered from his wounds but still refused to leave.

One day, St. Sebastian took up a position near where the emperor was to pass. He confronted the emperor, condemning him for his cruelty to Christians. This time the sentence of death was carried out, and St. Sebastian was beaten to death with clubs. Today he is the patron saint of athletes.

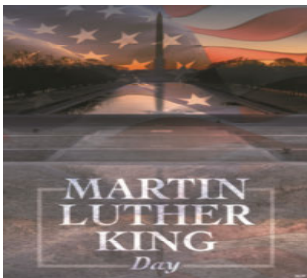

12 Things you should do during the Holy Eucharistic celebration

Holy Eucharistic celebration is an important celebration of our catholic faith. At the Holy Eucharist the bread and wine offered are transubstantiated to the Body and Blood of Christ. A great miracle of God's presence happens at the Eucharist and so we should be prepared to welcome Him to our hearts and lives. We have to maintain the awareness that we are in God's house and in God's presence.

1. Save Conversations for After the Mass – During the liturgy, those around you are praying and listening intently to the voice of God. The Word of God is read, the priest offers his insight and prayers are said as a community during the Mass. These are all things that the faithful wish to hear. If you are talking, it will disrupt the ability of those around you to focus on God. Respect others who are praying and silencing yourself helps you to hear the word of God.

2. Put Your Cell Phone on Prayer mode (Airplane Mode) and Keep it in Your Pocket – Obviously, you're not in an airplane, you're in a church. However, this is more than a building. **It is a sacred space set apart for the worship of God.** Putting your phone on silent will help to avoid embarrassing disruptions during the quieter parts of the Mass. In today's world, it is difficult to not look at our phones for an hour, but out of respect and reverence, please try to refrain from texting or using the internet while you are present in the house of God. Teach the children to pray while they are in the church. Allowing children to play or watch movies or listening music while in the church is not appropriate manners.

3. Please Come Forward for a Blessing, but Don't Receive Communion – You may be invited to come forward and receive a blessing during Holy Communion. To do this, cross your arms over your chest so that the Priest (only a priest or deacon can give a blessing in this way) will know not to administer Communion. It is also perfectly acceptable to remain in your pew at this time and pray. There are many reasons why the Church asks those who have not yet received their First Holy Communion and not in the state of grace not to receive the communion. **Catholics firmly believe that the Eucharist is the body, blood, soul and divinity of Jesus Christ.** Please respect their beliefs by not receiving Communion at this time.

4. Spit out Your Gum and Leave Snacks and Drinks for Later. – In God's house, it is best that snacks be avoided until the liturgy is finished. Eating can be very disruptive when others are trying to maintain a prayerful mindset. Chewing gum during the mass and while receiving communion is very disrespectful. Under the pews are not the depositories of chewing gum.

5. You don't have to guess what is going on. – You can follow along in the missal. Most of the time you will be able to find a book in your pew that will have the readings, prayers, and songs available for you to use in order to follow along with the Mass.

6. Sit. Stand. Kneel. Repeat – Though the missal lists the prayers, not all have the physical actions of prayer listed. In this case, it is best to follow the lead of those around you.

7. Children are welcome to the community, but be mindful of their behavior. – Most people love to see babies and children present in the Mass. Little noises, cries, and sounds are a part of the package when it comes to children, but if your child becomes too disruptive it is best to take them to the cry room. Remember, that although others think your child is adorable, this is a time set aside for prayer and focusing on God.

8. Dress appropriately. – In our comfortable and casual culture, we sometimes forget that we shouldn't wear yoga pants and flip flops everywhere. At many important events, there is somewhat of a dress code. A Catholic Mass is one of those events. Your clothes don't have to be fancy, but they should be modest and respectful of the atmosphere of prayer. Let us not dress for Walmart or gym and come to mass.

9. Be punctual. – Please come to mass at least 5 minutes before the mass time and prepare yourself for the Eucharistic celebration. Physical and spiritual preparation is a must for the better celebration of the Holy Eucharist.

10. Avoid walking around. – Once the procession starts we start the mass. Avoid as much as possible walking around during the mass. Sign of peace is to be offered being where you are. It is not the time to greet the family members. Immediately after the sign of peace we start preparing ourselves for the reception of the Holy Communion.

11. Communion to the sick. – The communion to the sick and the homebound is to be taken by the extra ordinary ministers of the communion. Asking for extra body of Christ to take home is not the proper way. If you need communion for someone at home please contact the priest or the office and make arrangements.

12. Wait until the priest exits before you leave the Mass, begin talking or take out your phone. – You will probably see people start to exit and get their things ready immediately following Communion, but that doesn't mean it is time to go. The correct protocol is to wait until the priest processes out of the Church and to follow after him. The procession signifies that the celebrant comes from the people and bring the congregation to the altar and they process out together to live the mission received from the celebration.

12 Cosas que debes hacer durante la celebración de la Sagrada Eucaristía

La celebración de la Santa Eucaristía es una celebración importante de nuestra fe católica. En la Sagrada Eucaristía el pan y el vino ofrecidos se transubstancian al Cuerpo y Sangre de Cristo. En la Eucaristía ocurre un gran milagro de la presencia de Dios, por lo tanto, debemos prepararnos para recibirlo en nuestros corazones y en nuestra vida. Debemos estar conscientes de que estamos en la casa y presencia de Dios.

1. Guarde las Conversaciones para después de la Misa – Durante la liturgia, las personas a tu alrededor están rezando y escuchando atentamente a la voz de Dios. La Palabra de Dios es proclamada, el sacerdote ofrece su percepción y se dicen las oraciones en comunidad. Estas son todas cosas que los fieles desean escuchar. Si estás hablando, vas a interrumpir la concentración de aquellos a tu alrededor de enfocarse en Dios. Ten respeto por aquellos que están rezando. Mantenerte en silencio te ayuda a escuchar la palabra de Dios.

2. Cambia tu celular a modo de Oración (Modo Avión) y déjalo en tu bolsillo – Obviamente, no estás en un avión, estas en la Iglesia. Sin embargo, esto es más que un edificio. Es un lugar sagrado, apartado para la adoración de Dios. Poner tu teléfono en silencio ayudara a evitar interrupciones embarazosas durante las partes más tranquilas de la Misa. En el mundo de hoy, es difícil no mirar a nuestros teléfonos por una hora, pero debido al respeto y reverencia, por favor trate de abstenerse de enviar de enviar textos o usar el internet mientras esta en la casa de Dios. Enséñales a tus hijos a rezar cuando están en la Iglesia. Permitirles jugar o ver películas, o escuchar música mientras están en Misa es inapropiado.

3. Por favor, si pasas a recibir la Bendición, pero no recibes Comunión – cruza tus brazos sobre tu pecho para que el sacerdote (solamente el sacerdote o diacono pueden dar la bendición) sepa que no debe administrar la Comunión. Es también correcto permanecer en la banca y rezar durante este momento. Hay varias razones porque la Iglesia pide a los que aún no han recibido la Primera Comunión y no están en estado de gracia no recibir la Comunión. **Los católicos creen firmemente que la Eucaristía es el cuerpo, sangre, alma, y divinidad de Jesucristo.** Por favor respete estas creencias al no recibir la Comunión en estos momentos.

4. Desecha tu chicle y deja los bocadillos y bebidas para más tarde – En la casa de Dios, lo mejor es evitar los bocadillos hasta que termine la celebración. Comer puede ser perturbador cuando otros intentan rezar. Mascar chicle durante la Misa y mientras recibes la comunión es una gran falta de respeto. Debajo de las bancas no es el lugar apropiado para deshacerte de tu chicle.

5. No tienes que adivinar lo que está pasando – Puedes seguir el misal. El misal, es el libro en las bancas y contiene lecturas, oraciones, y canciones. Lo puedes usar para seguir la Misa.

6. Sentado, De Pie, Arrodillado. Repetir – Aunque el misal contiene las oraciones, no menciona las acciones físicas de cada oración. En este caso, lo mejor es seguir el ejemplo de los que te rodean.

7. Los niños son bienvenidos a la comunidad, pero tenga en cuenta su comportamiento- A la mayoría de las personas les agrada ver a los niños presentes durante la Misa. Ruidos menores y llantos son parte del paquete cuando de niños se trata, pero su tu niño se vuelve demasiado problemático es mejor llevarlo a la sala de niños. Recuerda, aunque otros piensen que tu niño es muy lindo, este tiempo está reservado para oración y enfocarnos en Dios.

8. Vístete apropiadamente – En nuestra cultura cómoda e informal, a veces nos olvidamos que no debemos vestir con pantalones de yoga y chanclas a todas partes. En muchos eventos importantes existe un código de vestimenta. La Misa Católica es uno de esos eventos. Tu ropa no tiene que ser muy elegante, pero debe ser modesta y respetuosa con el ambiente de oración. No nos vistamos como para ir a la Wal-Mart o al gimnasio para venir a Misa.

9. Se Puntual – Por favor llega al menos 5 minutos antes que empieza la Misa y prepárate para la celebración Eucarística. Preparación física y espiritual es imprescindible para una mejor celebración de la Santa Eucaristía.

10. Evita caminar – Una vez iniciada la procesión, comenzamos la Misa. Evita todo lo posible caminar durante la Misa. El signo de la paz se ofrece donde estas. No es un tiempo para saludar a los miembros de la familia. Inmediatamente, después del signo de paz, comenzamos a prepararnos para recibir la Santa Comunión.

11. Comunión a los Enfermos – La comunión a los enfermos y los confinados debe ser distribuida por los ministros extraordinarios de la comunión. Preguntar por el Cuerpo de Cristo de manera adicional para llevar a casa no es la manera correcta. Si necesitas la comunión para alguien en casa, por favor contacta al sacerdote o a la oficina para hacer los arreglos necesarios.

12. Espera hasta que el sacerdote salga ANTES que tu salgas de la Misa, y antes que comiences a usar tu celular Probablemente veras que la gente comienza a tomar sus cosas y prepararse para retirarse inmediatamente después de la Comunión, pero eso no significa que es hora de irse. El protocolo correcto es esperar hasta después que el sacerdote salga de la Iglesia y seguirlo después. La procesión significa que el celebrante viene del pueblo y lleva a la congregación al altar y juntos salen en procesión a vivir la misión recibida de la celebración.

THE IMPORTANCE OF BEING REGISTERED!

Being a registered, active and participating member of a Parish is very important especially when you need to baptize, register for religious education classes, sponsor a child for sacraments, get married, obtain letters (letters of good standing, immigration letters, sponsor letters, letters of transfer etc.)

For parents who have children enrolled in Catholic Schools, in order to receive the school reduced Catholic Tuition Rate, your family needs to meet the criteria set by the Parish for being a registered, ACTIVE and participating member.

The definition of a registered, active and participating member of this parish includes: being registered for the minimum of six months, attend Sunday Mass regularly as well as contributing with an envelope to our offertory along with (if possible) supporting the ministry life of our parish which is a HUGE plus.

If you aren't registered, come and join our parish family by obtaining a registration form from the parish office OR if you aren't sure if you are registered, call the front office to verify.

¡ES IMPORTANTE ESTAR REGISTRADO!

Ser un miembro registrado, activo y participante de una parroquia es muy importante especialmente cuando usted necesita bautizar, inscribir a los niños o adultos en clases de educación religiosa, ser padrino para los sacramentos, casarse, obtener cartas (cartas de buena reputación, cartas de inmigración, cartas de permiso, etc.)

Para los padres de familia que tienen niños inscritos en las Escuelas Católicas, para recibir un descuento en la colegiatura, su familia debe cumplir con los requisitos establecidos por la parroquia para ser considerado un miembro registrado, **ACTIVO** y participante.

La definición de ser un miembro registrado, activo y participante de esta parroquia incluye: estar registrado por lo mínimo de seis meses, asistir regularmente a misa los domingos y contribuir con un sobre a nuestra colecta junto con (si es posible) estar involucrado en uno o más ministerios de nuestra parroquia, que es una ventaja enorme.

Si usted no está registrado, venga y sea parte de nuestra familia de San Carlos Borromeo obteniendo una forma de registro de nuestra oficina. O si quiere saber si está registrado, llame a la oficina para verificar.

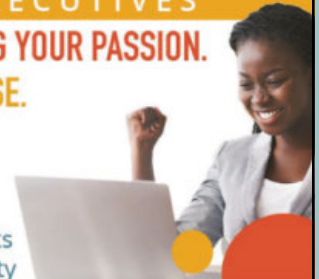
