GRATITUDE AND TRUST

Dear friends of Saint Brigid,

Recently, parishioner Brian Curry gave me a book by Brennan Manning, *Ruthless Trust: The Ragamuffin's Path to God*. Early on in the book the author quotes Brother David Steindl-Rast, a Benedictine monk and wonderful spiritual writer himself: "The root of joy is gratefulness.... It is not joy that makes us grateful; it is gratitude that makes us joyful."

The foundation of a spirit of gratitude is the realization that everything we have and are, beginning with the gift of life itself, is a gift from our all-loving God. With an awareness of the Lord's gifts and a spirit of gratitude we can trust God. We can trust that the God who has provided for us in the past takes care of us now and will continue to be with us for an eternity. Manning writes: "The foremost quality of a trusting disciple is gratefulness." I think it is fair and accurate to say that when we stop being grateful to God we stop trusting God.

What are some of the aspects of living in a spirit of gratitude each day? Brennan Manning identifies four: inclusive, attentive, contagious, and theocentric. First, gratitude is inclusive. This means we look for signs of blessing in every aspect of our lives, not only the good things and our successes but also in areas of struggle and challenge and failure. Second, gratitude as a way of living requires that we are attentive to the little things that happen each day, things that we will miss if we are preoccupied by our own busyness and caught up in worry or anxiety. The presence of God reveals itself most of all and most often in the very ordinary, too often unnoticed, dimensions of our daily lives.

Third, gratitude is contagious. When we notice gratitude being lived by someone else, it inspires us and "rubs off on us" – if we are paying attention! Finally, gratitude is theocentric. Sooner or later, genuine gratitude moves from the "what" to the "who", or from the gift to the giver. What we are grateful for leads to the One for whom we are grateful. Manning writes: "Arguably, it might be stated that the dominant theme of Jesus' inner life and prayer was gratitude." As it was for Jesus, may it be for us as well.

CELEBRATING BLACK CATHOLIC HISTORY MONTH

SPOTLIGHT: SR. THEA BOWMAN



November is Black Catholic History Month. In commemoration, we will pray for the canonization of one of the six African-American candidates for sainthood each week. This week, we pray for the canonization of Servant of God Sr. Thea Bowman.

She was born in 1937 as Bertha Elizabeth Bowman to Dr. Theon Bowman, a physician and Mary Esther Bowman, a teacher. Raised in Canton, Mississippi, she converted to Catholicism as a child, inspired by the Franciscan Sisters of Perpetual Adoration and the Missionary Servants of the Most Holy Trinity.

Growing up, she was a precocious and curious child, who soaked up the wisdom of her elders and was exposed early on to the richness of her African-American culture. The words of her community, "If you get, give—if you learn, teach," instilled a life-long love of serving God and others. At fifteen, she decided to become a religious and was given the name "Sister Mary Thea" in honor of the Blessed Virgin and her father Theon. "Thea" means "God" or "gift of God."

Sister Thea taught at all levels, but eventually earned her doctorate and became a college professor of English and linguistics. During the turbulent Civil Rights period of the 1960s, she challenged the Catholic Church to greater inclusivity. She was a founding faculty member of the Institute for Black Catholic Studies at Xavier University in New Orleans. Diagnosed with breast cancer, she spent the last few years of her life living with a spirit of joy despite her physical suffering. She died peacefully at 52, asking that her tombstone be inscribed with the simple, yet profound words: "She tried." "I want people to remember that I tried to love the Lord and that I tried to love them..."


Sister Thea Bowman's life was one of joy, enduring faith, and persevering prayer even in the midst of racial prejudice, cultural insensitivity, and debilitating illness. Asked how she made sense of suffering, she answered, "I don't make sense of suffering. I try to make sense of life...I try each day to see God's will..."

THE FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT

The First Sunday of Advent marks the beginning of a new year in the liturgical calendar of the Catholic Church. In contrast to the frenzied commercialization of the season, Advent is a time of waiting and preparing our hearts for Christ. As we light the first purple candle, which symbolizes hope, we reflect on the many ways we see the hope of Christ in our own lives and community.

The Advent wreath has four candles—three of the candles are violet because it is a liturgical color that signifies a time of prayer, penance, and sacrifice. The rose-colored candle, lit on the third Sunday of Advent, also known as Gaudete Sunday, symbolizes joy. The evergreens, wrapped around the candles base, are a symbol of eternal life.

THE WAY OF A DISCIPLE

USING GOD'S GIFTS TO CARRY OUT OUR MISSION

STEWARDSHIP OF TREASURE

During this month of Thanksgiving we are reflecting on the gifts we have been given and taking inventory of how we are using them. Stewardship—what we do with the gifts God entrusts to us—is often broken down into time, talent, and treasure. Today, we will reflect on how we use our financial resources.

In the Gospels, Jesus talks about money and possessions in an amazing 1 out of 10 verses! Why? Perhaps it was because our attachment to our possessions reveals a lot about the state of our hearts. Jesus said, "Where your treasure is, there also will your heart be (Matthew 3:21)," and when speaking of "The Greatest Commandment," He said, "you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all you soul, and with all your mind...you shall love your neighbor as yourself (Matthew 22: 37-39)."

Jesus emphasizes the word "all" because, since all we have is gift from God, we are to make a gift of our whole selves back to God. The best posture to take when it comes to every aspect of our lives, including our money, is that of open hands—ready to receive and ready to give—trusting that God will provide all that we need and will give us the grace to give freely all He is asking of us. In all that we do, we are called to live in the image of God, who is the greatest giver of all!

For reflection:

- What is the state of your heart when it comes to your possessions and financial resources? Are there areas where you need to grow in trust?
- How might you be called to give more generously to others?
- Meditate slowly on St. Ignatius' Suscipe prayer every day this week. Can you make the words your own?



These pages will take you through the Mass, whether you are new to our community, our Faith, or want to participate more fully. The italicized sections explain posture, plain text is the priest's or leader's part, and bold text denotes our response as the gathered Body of Christ.

THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

During this part of the Mass, we hear God's Word proclaimed. We listen to preaching, which makes Scripture come alive again today, and we express our Catholic faith.

INTRODUCTORY RITE

Please stand for the entrance and opening hymn.

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

The grace of our Lord...be with you all.

And with your spirit.

PENITENTIAL RITE

Brothers and sisters...celebrate the sacred mysteries I confess to almighty God, and to you, my brothers and sisters, that I have greatly sinned, in my thoughts and in my words, in what I have done and what I have failed to do, through my fault, through my fault, through my most grievous fault; therefore I ask the blessed Mary ever-Virgin, all the Angels and Saints, and you, my brothers and sisters, to pray for me to the Lord our God.

Repeat after the priest:

Lord Have Mercy. Christ have mercy. Lord Have Mercy.

OR Kyrie, eleison. Christe, eleison. Kyrie, eleison.

GLORIA

Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to people of good will. We praise You, we bless You, we adore You, we glorify You, we give You thanks for Your great glory, Lord God, heavenly King, O God, almighty Father. Lord Jesus Christ, Only Begotten Son, Lord God, Lamb of God, Son of the Father, You take away the sins of the world, have mercy on us; You take away the sins of the world, receive our prayer; You are seated at the right hand of the Father, have mercy on us. For You alone are the Holy One, You alone are the Lord, You alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

PROFESSION OF FAITH

Please stand as we proclaim the creed together.

I believe in one God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible. I believe in one Lord Jesus Christ, the Only Begotten Son of God, born of the Father before all ages. God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, consubstantial with the Father; through Him all things were made. For us men and for our salvation He came down from heaven, *and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man. *(*please bow during this profession*) For our sake He was crucified under Pontius Pilate, He suffered death and was buried, and rose again on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and His kingdom will have no end. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. I believe in one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church. I confess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen.

UNIVERSAL PRAYER

Please stand as we pray for our community, united with the entire Body of Christ.

After each intention, repeat the response said by the reader.

THE LITURGY OF THE EUCHARIST

In this part of the Mass, we re-experience Jesus' sacrifice. We acknowledge that He is present in the consecrated Bread and Wine—Communion. We pray together and take what we have received in Mass home and into the world.

THE OFFERTORY

As we bring up the bread and wine, we also offer our prayers, gifts, and even ourselves to be placed before God and be transformed.

PREPARATION OF THE GIFTS

Blessed are You, Lord... the bread of life.

Blessed be God forever.

Blessed are You, Lord... become our spiritual drink.

Blessed be God forever.

Pray...to God, the almighty Father.

Please stand and reply:

Deliver us, Lord ... Jesus Christ.

For the kingdom, the power and the glory are Yours now and forever.

THE SIGN OF PEACE

The peace of the Lord be with you always.

And with your spirit.

Let us offer each other the sign of peace.

At this time we usually exchange a sign of sharing God's peace by offering a handshake, hug, or similar gesture with those around us. However during these days of COVID protocols, please offer a wave or a nod of the head or other socially-distant expression of peace.

LAMB OF GOD

Lamb of God, You take away the sins of the world, have mercy on us. 2x

Lamb of God, You take away the sins of the world, grant us peace.

Please kneel as we prepare to receive the Body of Christ.

Behold the Lamb of God...the supper of the Lamb.

COMMUNION

Christ's Body and Blood are truly, fully present as He offers Himself to us in Communion. Catholics prepared to receive the Eucharist approach the minister as the ushers guide you. Non-Catholics or those choosing to abstain from Communion are welcome to come forward for a blessing (please indicate this by crossing your arms over your chest) or may remain in the pews to pray.


