

## STEWARDSHIP REFLECTION

### What's in it for me?

I think we've all been guilty of looking at a situation and wondering what's in it for us. It doesn't matter if it's a particular work assignment, someone at the parish asking for help with the mission trip bake sale, or your spouse asking if you'll take over the grocery shopping this week. Often, our first reaction to one of these requests is a heavy sigh and the thought: "If I do this, what will I get?"

Sometimes it surprises us to realize that the Apostles were no different. We tend to idolize these contemporaries of Christ as giants who walked with the Savior. But in reality, these individuals were merely human beings struggling to commit to the task of everyday stewardship.

In the Gospels, we see glimpses of them longing for praise and affirmation. We see them jockeying for positions of power within the group of twelve. We see them expect earthly rewards like honor and admiration. We see them acting a lot like us.

But in the end, we see them transformed by the grace of God. Like all the saints, their holiness stems from their commitment to their call. They stumble through, and as they stumble, they keep trusting God. They keep turning to Him. They keep asking for help. They don't give up just because they keep failing at it.

We are defined by what we give when we have no hope of being reimbursed, rewarded, or recognized. The Apostles understood this, eventually, and they gave accordingly. Most of them gave their very lives.

Remember, they're just like us. If they can do it, we can too.

En los Evangelios, tenemos vistazos de ellos anhelando elogios y afirmación. Los vemos compitiendo por posiciones de poder dentro del grupo de los doce. Los vemos esperar recompensas terrenales como el honor y la admiración. Los vemos actuando mucho como nosotros.

Pero al final, los vemos transformados por la gracia de Dios. Como todos los santos, su santidad proviene de su compromiso con su llamado. Ellos tropiezan, y mientras tropiezan, siguen confiando en Dios. Siguen volviéndose hacia Él. Siguen pidiendo ayuda. No se rinden solo porque siguen fallando.

Nos define lo que damos cuando no tenemos ninguna esperanza de ser reembolsados, recompensados o reconocidos. Los Apóstoles entendieron esto, eventualmente, y dieron correspondientemente. La mayoría de ellos dio su propia vida.

Recuerda, ellos son como nosotros. Si ellos pueden hacerlo, nosotros también podemos.

## A WALK THROUGH THE MASS: A STEP-BY-STEP EXPLANATION WEEK TWO: THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

### Storytelling (Liturgy of the Word)

When we gather at a friend's home for a meal, we almost always begin with conversation, telling our stories. At Mass, after the gathering rites, we sit down and listen as readings from the Word of God are proclaimed. They are the stories of God's people.

**Three readings and a psalm.** On Sundays, there are three readings from the Bible. The first reading will be from the Old Testament (except during the Easter season). We recall the origins of the covenants God made with our ancestors in faith. The first reading often relates to the Gospel selection of the day and will give background and an insight into the meaning of what Jesus will do in the Gospel. Then we will sing or recite a psalm—a song from God's own inspired hymnal, the Book of Psalms. The second reading will usually be from one of the letters of Paul or another apostolic writing. The third reading will be taken from one of the four Gospels.

**Standing for the Gospel.** Because of the unique presence of Christ in the proclamation of the Gospel, it has long been the custom to stand in attentive reverence to hear these words. We believe that Christ "is present in his word, since it is He himself who speaks when the holy Scriptures are read in the church" (Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy, #7). The priest will again greet us with "The Lord be with you." He then introduces the Gospel reading while marking a small cross on his forehead, lips and heart with his thumb while praying silently that God cleans his mind and his heart so that his lips may worthily proclaim the Gospel. In many places, the congregation performs this ritual action along with the priest. The Gospel reading concludes with the ritual formula "The Gospel of the Lord" and we respond, "Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ," again proclaiming our faith in the presence of Christ in the Word.

**Homily.** Then we sit for the homily. A homily is more than just a sermon or a talk about how we are to live or what we are to believe. Given by one who is ordained, the homily is an act of worship rooted in the texts of the Mass and Scripture, especially the readings which have just been proclaimed. *The homily takes that word and brings it into our life today.*

**Creed.** On Sundays we stand and together recite the Nicene or Apostles' Creed. The recitation of the creed is both a series of core truths we believe as Catholics, and a statement of our faith in the Word we have heard proclaimed in the Scripture and the homily.

"The profession of faith links the Liturgies of the Word and Eucharist as the congregation recalls the mysteries of faith which will again be proclaimed in the Eucharistic Prayer. The people accept God's Word before they move on to the celebration of the Eucharist, which itself is a profession of faith" (Mysteries of Faith, FDLC, p. 48).

**Universal Prayer.** The Liturgy of the Word comes to an end with the Universal Prayer. Responding to the Word of God, we offer prayers for the needs and the salvation of all the world. The petitions usually fall into four categories: the Church, nations and their leaders, people in special need, and the local needs of our parish.

## RECORRIDO POR LA MISA: UNA EXPLICACIÓN PASO A PASO SEGUNDA SEMANA: LITURGIA DE LA PALABRA

### Narración (Liturgia de la Palabra)

Cuando nos reunimos en la casa de algún amigo para una comida, casi siempre comenzamos con una conversación, compartiendo nuestras historias. En Misa, después de los ritos de reunión, nos sentamos y escuchamos mientras se proclaman las lecturas de la Palabra de Dios. Son las historias del Pueblo de Dios.

**Tres lecturas y un salmo.** Los domingos hay tres lecturas de la Biblia. La primera lectura es del Antiguo Testamento (excepto en la temporada de Pascua). Recordamos los orígenes de los convenios que Dios hizo con nuestros antepasados en la fe. La primera lectura frecuentemente se relaciona con el Evangelio del día, y nos dará antecedentes y una idea del significado de lo que Jesús hará en el Evangelio. Posteriormente, cantamos o recitamos un salmo – una canción del himnario inspirado en Dios, el Libro de los Salmos. La segunda lectura por lo general es de las cartas de Pablo u otra escritura apostólica. La tercera lectura se toma de uno de los cuatro Evangelios.

**De pie para el Evangelio.** Debido a que la presencia única de Cristo está en la proclamación del Evangelio, durante mucho tiempo ha sido costumbre permanecer de pie en atenta reverencia para escuchar estas palabras. Creemos que Cristo "se encuentra presente en su Palabra, puesto que es Él mismo quien habla cuando se leen las santas Escrituras en la iglesia" (Constitución Sobre la Sagrada Liturgia, #7). El sacerdote una vez más nos saludará con "El Señor este con ustedes". Entonces presenta la lectura del Evangelio mientras marca una pequeña cruz en su frente, labios y corazón con el pulgar mientras ora en silencio para que Dios limpie su mente y su corazón para que sus labios puedan proclamar dignamente el Evangelio. En muchos lugares, la congregación realiza este mismo ritual junto con el sacerdote. La lectura del Evangelio concluye con la frase "Palabra del Señor", a lo que respondemos "Gloria a ti Señor Jesús", proclamando una vez más nuestra fe en presencia de Cristo en la Palabra.

**Homilía.** Entonces llega el momento en el que nos sentamos para escuchar la homilía. Una homilía es mucho más que un simple sermón o plática sobre cómo debemos vivir o qué debemos creer. Dado por uno que es ordenado, la homilía es un acto de adoración enraizado en los textos de la Santa Misa y las Escrituras, especialmente las lecturas que acaban de ser proclamadas. La homilía toma esa palabra y la aplica a nuestras vidas.

**Credo.** Los domingos nos ponemos de pie para juntos recitar el Credo de los Apóstoles. La recitación del credo es tanto una serie de verdades fundamentales que creemos como católicos, como una declaración de nuestra fe en la Palabra que hemos escuchado proclamada en las Escrituras y en la homilía.

"La profesión de fe une las Liturgias de la Palabra y la Eucaristía, al tiempo que la congregación recuerda los misterios de fe que de nuevo serán proclamados en la Plegaria Eucarística. Las personas aceptan la Palabra de Dios antes de continuar con la celebración de la Eucaristía, la cual a su vez es una profesión de fe". (Misterios de Fe, FDLC, p. 48)

**Oración Universal.** La Liturgia de la Palabra llega a su fin con la Oración Universal. Respondiendo a la Palabra de Dios, ofrecemos oración por las necesidades y la salvación del mundo. Las peticiones por lo general entran dentro de estas cuatro categorías: la Iglesia, las naciones y sus líderes, personas de necesidades especiales, y las necesidades de la parroquia local.



St. John Paul II was born Karol Wojtyla in the small Polish town of Wadowice. During World War II, when the Nazis invaded Poland, Karol secretly studied for the priesthood in an underground seminary. He was ordained to the priesthood in 1946, appointed Archbishop of Krakow in 1964, and three years later he was made a cardinal.



In 1978, he was elected the 264<sup>th</sup> pope, where he took the name John Paul II. St. John Paul II made evangelization a key part of his papacy and made pastoral visits to all parts of the world. In 1981, he was shot twice in an assassination attempt. Following Jesus' example of compassion, he later met with his would-be assassin in his prison cell, where he forgave him for what he had done. In 1992, his health began to decline, and it was later discovered that he suffered from Parkinson's disease, a degenerative disorder of the central nervous system. Near the end of his papacy, it became difficult for him to speak, and his poor health and physical suffering made public appearances difficult. Still, he continued his pastoral work. He died April 2, 2005, and he was declared blessed on May 1, 2011.


**Obispo Aux. Ramón Bejarano**


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


