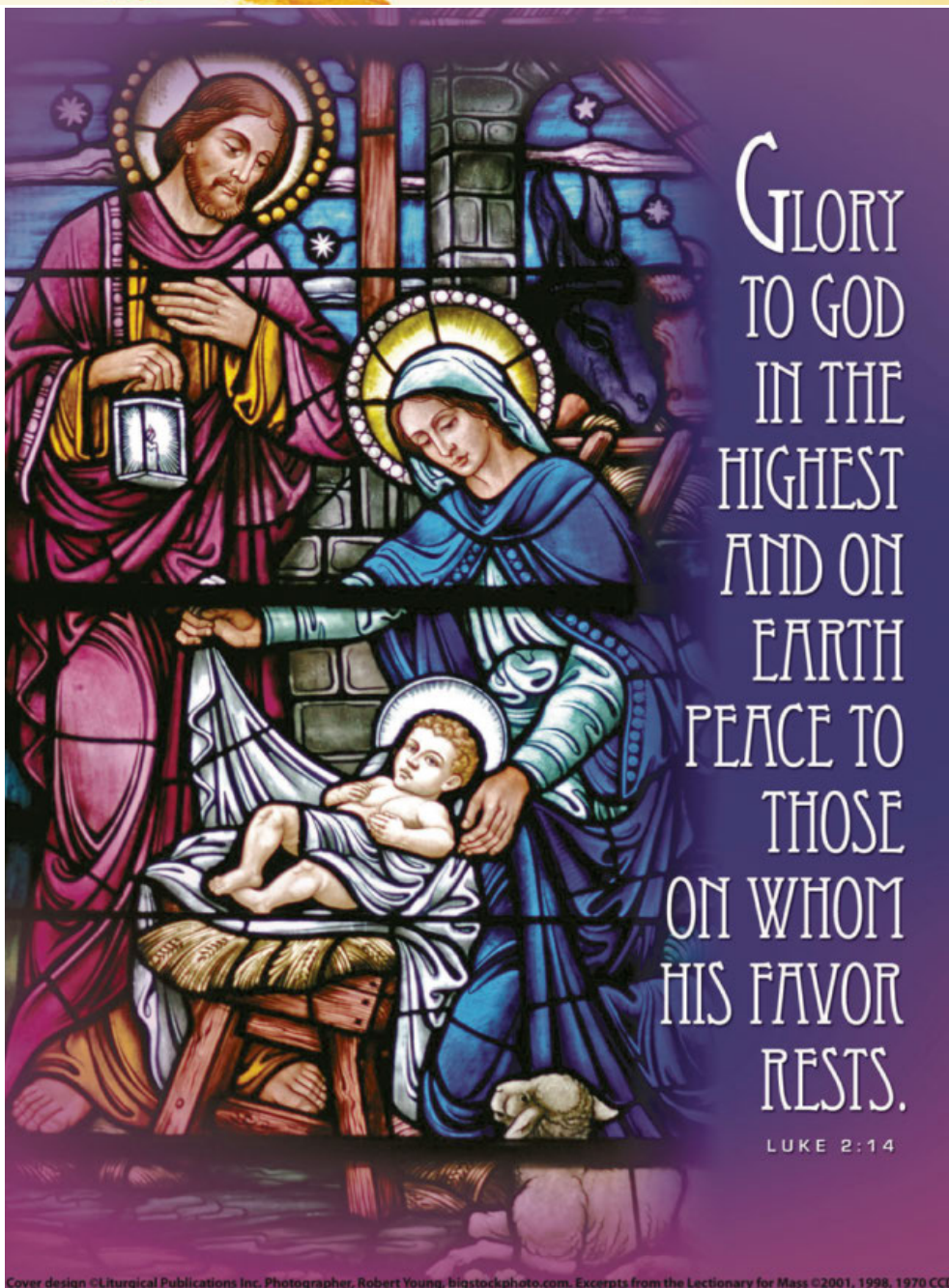

### From the Pastor's desk – December 26, 2021.

After explaining childbirth, the biology teacher asked her 3rd graders to write an essay on "childbirth" in their families. Susan went home and asked her mother how she was born. Her mother, who was busy at the time, said, "A big white swan brought you darling, and left you on our doorstep." Continuing her research, she asked grandma how she got her mother as a child. Being in the middle of something, her grandma similarly deflected the question by saying, "A fairy brought your mom as a little baby, and I found her in our garden in an open box". Then the girl went and asked her great-grandmother how she got her grandma as a baby. "I picked her from a box I found in the gooseberry bush," said

the surprised great grandma. With this information the girl wrote her essay. When the teacher asked her later to read it in front of the class, she stood up and began, "I am very sad to find out that there was not even a single natural birth in our family for three generations... All our children were extraterrestrials." (Rev. Fairchild). On every Christmas we celebrate another non-normal birth. It's a non-normal birth, never before, nor after, seen or experienced, because it is the birth of God as man – Jesus Christ, Son of God and Son of Man, as our Savior.

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It was St Francis of Assisi who assembled the first crib in a cave on an Italian hillside. It was in 1293 that the first crèche was set up in the woods of Greccio near Assisi, on Christmas Eve. The crib was ready, hay was brought, the ox and the donkey were led to the spot. Greccio became a new Bethlehem. The aim of St. Francis was to make the Christmas story come alive for the people of the locality. His idea was to show them how close it was to them and their lives. And it seems that he succeeded. On Christmas Eve, the friars and the people assembled with candles and torches around the crib. Francis spoke to the people, who were mostly farmers and shepherds, about God's Son coming among us to teach us that we too are children of God and that as such we have an eternal destiny. The shepherds and farmers got the messages: God had time for simple folks like them. At the end of the vigil they all returned to their homes, full of peace and joy, feeling very close to God and to one another.

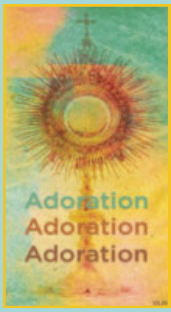
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The custom of placing lighted candles in the windows at Christmas was brought to America by the Irish. When religion was suppressed throughout Ireland during the English persecution, the people had no churches. Priests hid in the forests and caves and secretly visited the farms and homes to say Mass there during the night. It was the dearest wish of every Irish family that at least once in their lifetime a priest would arrive at Christmas to celebrate Mass. For this grace they hoped and prayed all through the year. When Christmas came they left their doors unlocked and placed burning candles in the windows so that any priest who happened to be in the vicinity could be welcomed and guided to their home through the dark night. Silently the priest would enter through the unlatched door and be received by the devout inhabitants with fervent prayers of gratitude and tears of happiness that their home was to become a church for Christmas. To justify this practice in the eyes of the English soldiers, the Irish people explained that they burned the candles and kept the doors unlocked so that Mary and Joseph, looking for a place to stay, would find their way to their home and be welcomed with open hearts. The candles in the windows have always remained a cherished practice of the Irish, although many of them have long since forgotten the earlier meaning.

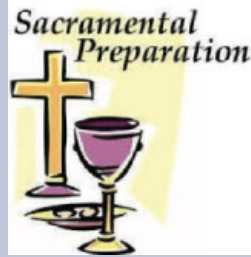

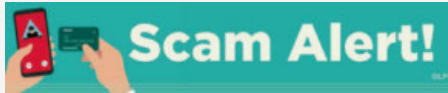

**GOSPEL MEDITATION**

Families can be very difficult things to negotiate. This is true not only of our families of origin, the current family of which we are a part, the family of our Church, our society, and our global family as well. Everything human can be found in family stories. Those stories speak of wonderful life-giving successes as well as painful spirit-robbing abuses. Our greatest joys and our greatest wounds are usually connected with the experience of family. Our needs, experiences, and unresolved baggage often color what we bring to our familiar relationships. They contribute to our level of defensiveness, how guarded and protected we become, and what prejudices we believe.

In order to break the cycle of dysfunction we have to remember that it is not only by human effort that we negotiate the difficult and challenging events of our lives. There is a Divine Effort at work as well. For sure, the human effort can create quite a mess and easily destroy lives. This is true of any family with which we are associated. Today's Feast of the Holy Family serves to help us understand that there is a Divine Story being told as well. It is a story of perseverance in the face of hardship, determination in the face of despair, healing when we see nothing but wounds, and light where there is darkness.

Do we believe that God is always working, guiding, restoring, and leading? Unless we do, we will never be free from the imperfections and wounds that bind us and never be able to understand what it really means to forgive. Pope Francis tells us that the "light which comes from the Holy Family encourages us to offer human warmth to other families." While this is most certainly true, we can only really begin to do this when we realize that we are still works in progress, not anchored to the wounds and sins of our past, and still a leading star in God's continually unfolding story of love. The Holy Family persevered and radiated warmth because they knew they were not alone. We can too.

# Carta de Nuestro Pastor

Después de explicar el parto, la maestra de biología pidió a sus alumnos de tercer grado que escribieran un ensayo sobre el "parto" en sus familias. Susan se fue a casa y le preguntó a su madre cómo había nacido. Su madre, que estaba ocupada en ese momento, dijo: "Un gran cisne blanco te trajo, cariño, y te dejó en la puerta de nuestra casa". Continuando con su investigación, le preguntó a la abuela cómo consiguió a su madre cuando era niña. Estando en medio de algo, su abuela desvió la pregunta de manera similar diciendo: "Un hada trajo a tu mamá cuando era un bebé y la encontré en nuestro jardín en una caja abierta". Luego, la niña fue y le preguntó a su bisabuela cómo consiguió a su abuela cuando era bebé. "La recogí de una caja que encontré en el rosal espinoso", dijo la bisabuela sorprendida. Con esta información la niña escribió su ensayo. Cuando la maestra le pidió más tarde que lo leyera frente a la clase, se puso de pie y comenzó, "Me entristece mucho saber que no hubo ni un solo nacimiento natural en nuestra familia durante tres generaciones ... Todos nuestros hijos parecen ser extraterrestres". (Rev. Fairchild). Cada Navidad celebramos otro nacimiento anormal. Es un nacimiento anormal, nunca antes, ni después, visto o experimentado, porque es el nacimiento de Dios como hombre - Jesucristo, Hijo de Dios e Hijo del Hombre, como nuestro Salvador.

Fue San Francisco de Asís quien montó el primer pesebre en una cueva en una ladera italiana. Fue en 1293 cuando se instaló la primera guardería en los bosques de Greccio, cerca de Asís, en Nochebuena. La cuna estaba lista, trajeron heno, el buey y el asno fueron llevados al lugar. Greccio se convirtió en un nuevo Belén. El objetivo de San Francisco era dar vida a la historia de la Navidad para la gente de la localidad. Su idea era mostrarles lo cerca que estaba de ellos y de sus vidas. Y parece que lo logró. En Nochebuena, los frailes y el pueblo se reunieron con velas y antorchas alrededor del pesebre. Francisco habló a la gente, que eran en su mayoría agricultores y pastores, sobre el Hijo de Dios que vendría entre nosotros para enseñarnos que nosotros también somos hijos de Dios y que como tales tenemos un destino eterno. Los pastores y granjeros recibieron el mensaje: Dios tenía tiempo para gente sencilla como ellos. Al final de la vigilia todos regresaron a sus hogares, llenos de paz y alegría, sintiéndose muy cerca de Dios y unos de otros.

Los irlandeses trajeron a Estados Unidos la costumbre de colocar velas encendidas en las ventanas en Navidad. Cuando se suprimió la religión en toda Irlanda durante la persecución inglesa, la gente no tenía iglesias. Los sacerdotes se escondían en los bosques y cuevas y visitaban en secreto las granjas y las casas para celebrar allí misa durante la noche. Era el mayor deseo de toda familia irlandesa que al menos una vez en su vida llegara un sacerdote en Navidad para celebrar la Misa. Por esta gracia esperaban y oraban durante todo el año. Cuando llegó la Navidad, dejaron las puertas abiertas y colocaron velas encendidas en las ventanas para que cualquier sacerdote que se encontrara en los alrededores pudiera ser recibido y guiado a su casa durante la noche oscura. Silenciosamente, el sacerdote entraba por la puerta abierta y era recibido por los devotos habitantes con fervientes oraciones de gratitud y lágrimas de felicidad porque su hogar se convertiría en una iglesia para Navidad. Para justificar esta práctica a los ojos de los soldados ingleses, los irlandeses explicaron que encendían las velas y dejaban las puertas abiertas para que María y José, en busca de un lugar donde quedarse, encontrarán el camino a su casa y fueran recibidos con corazones abiertos. Las velas en las ventanas siempre han sido una práctica apreciada por los irlandeses, aunque muchas de ellas han olvidado hace mucho tiempo el significado anterior. Era Nochebuena en un supermercado y una mujer estaba recogiendo ansiosamente los últimos pavos que quedaban con la esperanza de encontrar uno grande. Desesperada, llamó a un empleado y le dijo: "Disculpe. ¿Estos pavos crecen más?" "No", respondió, "Están todos muertos".

Justo antes de Navidad, un político honesto, un abogado generoso y Santa Claus viajaban en el ascensor de un hotel muy elegante. Justo antes de que se abrieran las puertas, todos notaron un billete de 20 dólares tirado en el suelo. ¿Quién lo recogió? Santa, por supuesto, porque los otros dos, un político honesto, un abogado generoso, ¡no existen!



La semana pasada, después de la misa del domingo a las 12.30 pm, uno de nuestros feligreses me llevó aparte y me dijo: "Sí, padre, ahora estoy libre. Puede hablar conmigo ahora ". Sus palabras no tenían sentido para mí. Entonces, le pregunté: "¿Por qué dices eso?" "Bueno, ¿Me envió un mensaje de texto preguntándome si estaba libre para hablar conmigo?" Inmediatamente comprendí el problema. Le dije: "Lamento mucho que hayas recibido ese mensaje. Desafortunadamente, no he enviado ningún mensaje de texto de ese tipo. Es una estafa. Más tarde supe que muchos de nuestros feligreses también habían recibido mensajes de texto y correos electrónicos solicitando tarjetas de regalo. Por favor, evite responder a dichos mensajes de texto y correos electrónicos. Nunca jamás le pediré ayuda para mí, mis amigos o mi familia. Si le pido ayuda, será para el mejoramiento de nuestra Iglesia y la solicitud se hará desde el púlpito o mediante el boletín de la iglesia. Por lo tanto, evite responder a dichos mensajes de texto y correos electrónicos.

## MEDITACIÓN DEL EVANGELIO

Hoy es un día para celebrar a la familia - a la nuestra y a las familias de todo el mundo, de celebrar y gozar a los hijos, nietos y parientes cercanos y lejanos. Dios quiso nacer en una familia y por medio de ella, se nos ofrece una oportunidad para conocerle mejor y amarle más. Recordemos que es en la familia donde se forjan los santos y santas de Dios. Y es también en ella donde están los vicios y malas acciones. ¡Cuidado padres de familia! Aprender de la familia de Nazaret es importante.

Cada día del año es una oportunidad para continuar la búsqueda de Dios, de Jesús, en nuestro hogar. Podemos vislumbrar, en la Liturgia de hoy, a tres figuras importantes del hogar de Nazaret: una mujer con su pequeño y su esposo, listos para hacer la voluntad de Dios, para orar y platicar en familia. El papa Francisco nos dice que: "Realmente, hoy es un día hermoso... hoy celebramos la fiesta de la Sagrada Familia de Nazaret. El término sagrada coloca a esta familia en el ámbito de la santidad, que es un don de Dios, pero, al mismo tiempo, es una adhesión libre y responsable al plan de Dios" Sé, y busco cuál es el plan de Dios para mi hogar o ¿ni siquiera me importa ese diálogo entre esposa, esposo e hijos? El tiempo de confinamiento debió ser una oportunidad para crecer en gracia y sabiduría en la familia. ¿Lo ve usted así?
