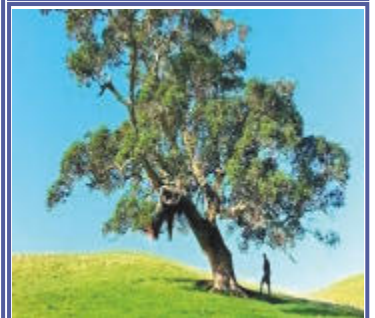

once it is sown, it springs up and becomes the largest of plants and puts forth large branches, so that the birds of the sky can dwell in its shade."

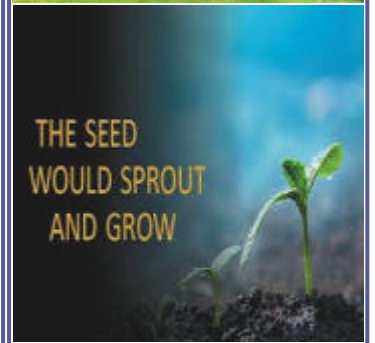
With many such parables he spoke the word to them as they were able to understand it.

REFLECTING ON THE WORD GUIDEPOSTS

IN GOD'S HANDS

The Easter season is over and we are back to ordinary time, the season characterized by anticipation and hope in the resurrection of Christ. Thus we are back to the color green for the next several months. Green is the standard color for "Ordinary Time." Green symbolizes the hope and life of each new day. It reminds us that our day-to-day life must be characterized by anticipation and hope in the resurrection of Christ . . . that we are an "Easter people."

It is the time to live the faith, to experience the working of the kingdom of God in our day-to-day life. Today's gospel reading uses the metaphor of the seed to help us understand the nature of the Kingdom of God.

The first parable of today's Gospel (Mk 4:26-29) points out the mysterious nature of how seed grows. Once the seed is sown, its growth is out of the hands of the Sower. The Sower may be cultivating the soil in which the seed is sown and watering it, but he has no idea how the seed actually grows. This is how the kingdom of God grows.

This parable reminds us that a man's faith is a gift from God and not a necessary result of our proclamation of the faith to him. As Christians it is our mission and responsibility to proclaim our faith to others through words and actions. But whether or not people will believe and be converted is not our responsibility, it is God's. (This was the first lesson on evangelization that Peter learned which he conveyed to the other apostles at the First Council of Jerusalem. See Acts chapters 10 and 11 and 15 — upon the instruction of the Holy Spirit Peter went to the house of Cornelius the pagan to proclaim the faith and he realized it was the Holy Spirit that converted Cornelius).

The second parable of today's Gospel — the parable of the mustard seed (Mk 4:30-34), points out that the Kingdom of God does not dawn upon the earth fully developed. It takes time, and it most often begins in small, seemingly insignificant ways.

Translated into day-to-day life: One person forgives another; one person reaches out in love to someone who feels unlovable; one person trusts God in the midst of suffering. It is in these small things that God's love is experienced, and love is contagious. A person who is loved then loves others, and that person loves still others, etc., until God's reign conquers hate and evil and fear.

Or the following oft-quoted experience of Saint Mother Teresa of Calcutta may bring the message home:

"Once when reporters encircled Mother Teresa, one called out, "Mother, you are seventy years old! When you

die, the world will be the same as it was before. What has changed after all your effort?

Mother Teresa smiled brightly and responded, "Well, I never thought I would be able to change the world! I have only tried to be a drop of clean water in which God's love could sparkle. Does that seem little?" An attentive and emotional silence had fallen among the reporters.

She started to speak again and asked the cheeky reporter, "Why don't you try to be a drop of clean water, and then there will be two of us. Are you married?"

"Yes, Mother."

"Tell your wife as well and then there will be three of us. Have you any children?"

"Three children, Mother."

"Tell your children too and then there will be six of us . . ."

Trust in the Lord

Trust in the Lord also underlies all of today's readings.

In the first reading **Ezekiel** prophesied during the time of Israel's exile. In the verses prior to today's reading he was hard on the people, preaching that the unfaithfulness of the Jews was what led to their exile. Many had lost faith that God would care for them. But in today's reading we hear Ezekiel give a word of hope. He assured them that God would "lift high the lowly tree . . . make the withered tree bloom" (Ezekiel 17:24). The message: *keep trusting in God.*

In the second reading **Saint Paul** says we should "walk by faith, not by sight," *trusting in the Lord's vision* (2 Corinthians 5:7).

Finally, in the gospel **Jesus** speaks to the crowd about seeds planted in the earth. We cannot see what is happening in the soil, but we trust that they will grow. Sure enough, eventually they sprout and flourish and become grain to be harvested or shelter for birds. *Trust in the Lord.*

Today's Gospel would certainly be a response for those who grow impatient with everything, even with God. Seeing so much evil around, the Covid-19, the slow progress in economic recovery, nagging problems about money, conflicts at home or in office, or even in the parish community, people complain: "Why does God not do something?" Some answers are provided in today's readings.

THAN OUR WAYS**

Or, simply—PATIENCE, ACCEPTING GOD'S TIME

Often we want to see extraordinary manifestations of God working in our midst. We want immediate results, a complete change of heart. But God does not force himself on human hearts. He wants a response of love. If we accept him and open ourselves to his grace, we will be transformed into new persons.

The first parable likens the kingdom of God to a farmer sowing seeds, and to the seeds sprouting, growing, and yielding fruits without the farmer knowing it. The farmer just waits. He has a built-in patience. The meaning is that as Christians, we must have *patience*.

The second parable likens the kingdom of God to a mustard seed that is so small but ends up big. This is an exaggeration, of course. We know that mustard plants are just shrubs, 35 to 40 inches tall, not trees like the cedar, but the point is: What God has started does not remain small. It will grow big. We must *patiently* wait for the fruits of every good deed.

NOVENA OF MASSES IN HONOR OF FATHERS

The novena of Masses in honor of fathers that Fr. George will celebrate will start on June 19 (Saturday) and running until June 27 (Sunday). To include your father, living or deceased, in the Novena of Masses, just pick up a Father's Day Novena envelope which you will find at the church entrance or in the pew pockets, write on the designated space the name of your father, put in the envelope a donation of at least \$10, then drop the envelope in the collection basket at one of the Masses next weekend.

Note: "When offerings are collected for a Novena of Masses, the provisions of the 1991 decree of the Congregation for the Clergy, *Mos iugitur*, are applicable. According to these norms, the priest is permitted to retain a \$10 stipend for each Mass offered during the Novena. Any amount exceeding the \$10 stipend for each Mass of the Novena is to be sent to the diocesan bishop as specified in canon 951, §1. In the Diocese of San Diego, Bishop McElroy has delegated authority to pastors to designate a charity of their choice as the recipient of the excess amount." *Your donation is your father's act of charity, especially to the receiving charitable institution which will express thankfulness through prayers for donors.*

Let us continue to pray for one another, asking the Lord to bless especially those parishioners who are in poor health and those who are encountering problems in their life.
