


2nd Reading: 2 Corinthians 5:14-17



REFLECTING ON THE WORD . . . GUIDEPOSTS

INTRODUCTION TO THE LITURGY OF THE DAY

In today's Gospel, we hear Jesus calm the raging sea as his disciples cling to the storm-tossed boat. The disciples were terrified that they would die, but Jesus suggests that their faith should have reassured them.

Many of us can probably recall a time when our father came to our rescue, protecting or supporting us, making everything all right.

Today, we honor our dads, our grandfathers, godfathers, uncles, and all who have acted as fathers in our lives. May their protection and constancy be a model of God's care for us.

The book of Job was an attempt to understand the dilemma: "How can God be just and fair and still allow bad things to happen to good people?"

As pointed out several times in the story of Job, he was a righteous man. In spite of his goodness, he suffered all kinds of tragedy – his children have been killed, he was stricken with a horrible disease, everything he owned has been lost, and his friends have turned on him. Out of frustration, he lashes out at God, he wants to know why. The question of innocent suffering is dealt with in 42 chapters.

Our first reading today gives us a very tiny portion of God's answer to Job. Basically, God told Job, "You don't know anything about how the universe operates; just let me take care of things and trust me."

The encounter with God that Job experienced satisfied Job. It gave him a new perspective or a new meaning and depth to "trusting God." To Job, "trust in God" was no longer just a word or phrase, no longer just intellectual knowledge, but one that was born out of the encounter with God that he experienced. It became a spirituality, that is to say, even though Job didn't fully understand, the encounter with God that he experienced was all the satisfaction he needed.

Thus Job returns to where he was at the beginning of this book when he simply blessed God for the gift of life (Job 1:21).



The small excerpt from Job is linked to the Gospel by the illustration of God's power over the elements. In both readings, God says, in effect and in young people's terms, "Why are you freaking out? Did you forget Who's got your back?"

DO YOU NOT YET HAVE FAITH?

In today's Gospel, in the midst of the storm the panicky disciples awaken Jesus, asking, "Don't you care that we are perishing?" After he calms the wind and the waves Jesus asks the apostles. "Why are you terrified? Do you not yet have faith?" Jesus asks us those same questions today.

Upon meditation on this gospel, I wondered how the apostles might have responded if Jesus had asked those questions before he calmed the storm. If he did, it probably would have gone in one ear and out the other as they would have been too worried about the storm.

It's easy for anyone to see we should have trusted more after danger has passed, but our Lord wants us to hear this question also when the storm is raging and the waves are high. God wants us to know he is still in control, even though we may wonder, "how can he be?"

Flight attendants always present a confident demeanor and a smile as they assure us that "in the unlikely event that we have to ditch at sea," we will find our seat cushions also double as flotation devices. But once the plane is airborne, we are all in the hands of God.

It was the same for the disciples in today's Gospel. Once the boat pushed off from the shore, they were on their own in an alien water world. They were at the mercy of the wind, the waves, and the integrity of the boat. Fragile and frightened, when the fury of the squall was upon them, they realized that their only hope was Jesus. We today, must have the confidence to ask: "Who then is this whom even wind and sea obey?"

Some people tend to call on God only when everything else seems hopeless, just like a scene in the hospital when the doctors admit that they are helpless medically. A member of the family, out of the hearing of the sick man, murmurs, "I guess all we can do now is pray." Such a statement reveals a lack of real faith, an attitude that turning to God in prayer is but a last resort, a last-ditch effort.

A story is told of a guy who docked under the table when a killer earthquake occurred. After he was rescued, he said, "I am no churchgoer nor prayerful but I was so scared that I said all the prayers that I know — including "Grace before and after meals."

PRAYER OF THE FAITHFUL

We now turn to God who stilled the waves and calmed the sea, confident that the storms in our lives are no match for the Lord.

- 1) For the church: That we, the baptized, be people who speak words of peace into the storms and troubles of life, let us pray to the Lord.
- 2) That nations compete with one another to bring peace instead of war, let us pray to the Lord.
- 3) For those who are in the midst of life's storms, for those who are facing terrible loss, for all who are frightened and need the comforting presence of Jesus, let us pray to the Lord.
- 4) For all fathers: That they cherish their wives, protect their children, and act as a source of strength in their neighborhoods and communities, let us pray to the Lord.
- 5) For all our parishioners, especially those who are in poor health and those who are encountering problems in their life, let us pray to the Lord.
- 6) For all the prayers that we hold in the silence of our hearts; for all our intentions spoken and unspoken, let us pray to the Lord.

CELEBRANT:

Ever-present God, you created the world and all that is in it. May we find our home in the world, shelter from the storm and comfort in your arms, as you respond to our needs through the one whom even the wind and sea obey, Jesus Christ our Risen Lord. Amen.

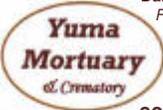
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
