## Introduction to the Liturgy of the Day

Just yesterday we came to this holy place to celebrate our Lord's birth. Today we return to expand that celebration to his immediate family, the Holy Family. Mary and Joseph cared for their son, raising him in the religious traditions of their faith.

In this loving environment, Luke says, "Jesus advanced in wisdom and age and favor before God and man."

Let us pray today that our families may provide fertile ground for our children to grow similarly.

## 1st Reading - 1 Samuel 1:20-22, 24-28

<sup>20</sup>In those days Hannah conceived and at the end of her term bore a son whom she called Samuel, since she had asked the Lord for him. <sup>21</sup>The next time her husband Elkanah was going up with the rest of his household to offer the customary sacrifice to the Lord and to fulfill his vows, <sup>22</sup>Hannah did not go, explaining to her husband, "Once the child is weaned, I will take him to appear before the Lord and to remain there forever; I will offer him as a perpetual nazirite.

<sup>24</sup>Once Samuel was weaned, Hannah brought him up with her, along with a three-year-old bull, an ephah of flour, and a skin of wine, and presented him at the temple

of the Lord in Shiloh.

<sup>25</sup>After the boy's father had sacrificed the young bull, Hannah, his mother, approached Eli <sup>26</sup>and said: "Pardon my Lord! As you live, my Lord, I am the woman who stood near you here, praying to the Lord. <sup>27</sup>I prayed for this child, and the Lord granted my request. <sup>28</sup>Now I, in turn, give him to the Lord; as long as he lives, he shall be dedicated to the Lord."

## **Gospel — Luke 2:41-52**

<sup>41</sup>Each year Jesus' parents went to Jerusalem for the feast of Passover, <sup>42</sup>and when he was twelve years old, they went up according to festival custom. <sup>43</sup>fter they had completed its days, as they were returning, the boy Jesus remained behind in Jerusalem, but his parents did not know it. <sup>44</sup>Thinking that he was in the caravan, they journeyed for a day and looked for him among their relatives and acquaintances, <sup>45</sup>but not finding him, they returned to Jerusalem to look for him.

<sup>46</sup>After three days they found him in the temple, sitting in the midst of the teachers, listening to them and asking them questions, <sup>47</sup>and all who heard him were astounded at his understanding and his answers.

#### THE SANCTIFICATION OF THE FAMILY

Today we celebrate the feast of the Holy Family --the family of Joseph, Mary, and Jesus. Although Son of
God, Jesus became a human child; he grew up in a family.
Thus the very first community sanctified by the presence
of God-made-man, is the family.

\*\*\*\*\*\*\*

And, the very first place in the family that Jesus sanctified by his presence was the womb of Mary where he dwelt as the youngest member, as yet unborn, and, as we learned in the gospel of last Sunday, his presence in the womb was recognized by another family member who was as yet in the womb too — John the Baptist.

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Like all other families, the family of Joseph, Mary and Jesus had to face dark moments. Like all other families they had to go through crises. But what makes their family different is their total loyalty and dedication to God. God's will was first in their lives as expressed in Jesus' words, "I must be in my Father's house," or in Mary's keeping "all these things in her heart," or in the attentive listening to God's will displayed by Joseph, the head of this family.

God did not tell Joseph all the plans at once, but only one step at a time. God through the edict of Caesar Augustus tells him to take his family to Bethlehem for the census (Lk 2:1-5). An angel tells him to marry Mary (Mt 1:20-24). Later an angel advises him to flee to Egypt (Mt 2:13-15), and then advises him again to return to Palestine (Mt 2:20), and finally to go back to Nazareth (Mt 2:22).

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God also acts in our life. Even if we do not understand right away the events or situations we are in, we should practice the same attentive listening to God's will as Joseph and his family did in order to find out God's plans for us and our family.

## Values Begin at Home

An old Chinese story relates that a wise teacher asks people what's the "Most Satisfying Thing in Life." "A happy marriage," some replied. Others said, "good health."

There were many more answers, but after everyone failed to give the correct one, the teacher said: "The most satisfying thing in life is to see a child confidently walk down the road on his own after you have shown him the right way to go."

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Christian values and virtues must be learned first in the family as it is the microcosm of society, and they must radiate from the family to our place of work, to schools, and communities. "Charity begins at home," we say. But it doesn't stop there.

#### "INTERACTION" IN THE TEMPLE

Let us ponder that moment when Joseph and Mary on the one hand, and Jesus on the other, are having their brief "interaction" right there in the midst of the doctors of the law in the Temple at Jerusalem.

Let's just focus our attention on the anguished "why" of either side. "Why have you done this to us...?" "Why were you looking for me...?"

Could the doctors present there, for all their learning, ever hope to understand, even just the question?

It is a tense moment. We may even say, a moment of conflict; but a conflict borne with love. Lovingly, each side is only seeking to understand the other. No attack on persons at all. No condemnation whatever.

It was a moment that was bound to come because Jesus is not just the Son of Mary; he is also the Son of God. Thus:

As Son of God, Jesus had to answer the call of the Father in the here-and-now without having to inform his human parents anymore: he had to be in his Father's business.

As Son of Man, he had to go down with his parents to Nazareth and be subject to them.

Jesus, Mary, and Joseph — a holy family because God's will is at the center of their lives; every moment of their lives is a demonstration of their union with God. Thus, the interaction among them in the Temple is itself a holy moment too.

Jesus, Mary, and Joseph, help us to be holy!

#### God Intended a FAMILY

An elementary school teacher was telling her class about statistics which indicate that more twins are being born these days than in the past.

"Why" asked a little boy.

"Because," replied a tiny, smart girl, "little children are afraid to come into the world alone."

What a very insightful remark. With the major threat to obstruct birth by means of abortion and various contraceptives, not to mention the scare of broken families, indeed, children have all the reason to fear coming out into the world alone!

Today's feast reminds us that from the beginning God intended that there be a place for parental love, care and affection beginning with the conception and infancy when we're helpless, a place where we find warmth and security, where we can grow, where we can be accepted. In short, God intended a FAMILY.

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There is the story of the little boy whose religion teacher was talking about God as "Father.' In a very serious tone, the little boy blurted out, "I hope he's not like my father. He's too busy."

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




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
