THE READINGS. . . . SOME REFLECTIONS. . . . AND GUIDEPOSTS.

Introduction to the Liturgy of the Word

At the beginning of the book of Jeremiah (today's first reading), we hear how God called him to be a prophet; but even more important, we hear how God promises to be with him in his ministry to fortify and support him (See Jeremiah 1:19).

In the Gospel too, having started his ministry in the power of the Spirit (See Luke 4:14), Jesus speaks with confidence, even brashness in his hometown, yet by the grace of God is able to escape their wrath.

As we listen to these words of God today, let us allow them to give us the courage we need to witness to the gospel in our own lives.

1st Reading - Jeremiah 1:4-5, 17-19

⁴The word of the LORD came to me, saying: ⁵Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, before you were born I dedicated you, a prophet to the nations I appointed you.

¹⁷But do you gird your loins; stand up and tell them all that I command you. Be not crushed on their account, as though I would leave you crushed before them; ¹⁸ for it is I this day who have made you a fortified city, a pillar of iron, a wall of brass, against the whole land: against Judah's kings and princes, against its priests and people.

¹⁹They will fight against you but not prevail over you, for I am with you to deliver you, says the LORD. The Word of the Lord. All: Thanks be to God.

2nd Reading – 1 Corinthians12:31-13:13

Brothers and sisters: ³¹Strive eagerly for the greatest spiritual gifts. But I shall show you a still more excellent way.

¹If I speak in human and angelic tongues, but do not have love, I am a resounding gong or a clashing cymbal. ²And if I have the gift of prophecy, and comprehend all mysteries and all knowledge; if I have all faith so as to move mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. ³If I give away everything I own, and if I hand my body over so that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing.

⁴Love is patient, love is kind. It is not jealous, it is not pompous, It is not inflated, ⁵it is not rude, it does not seek its own interests, it is not quick-tempered, it does not brood over injury, ⁶it does not rejoice over wrongdoing but rejoices with the truth. ⁷It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.

⁸Love never fails. If there are prophecies, they will be brought to nothing; if tongues, they will cease; if knowledge, it will be brought to nothing. ⁹For we know partially and we prophesy partially, ¹⁰but when the perfect comes, the partial will pass away. When I was a child, I used to talk as a child, ¹¹think as a child, reason as a child; when I became a man, I put aside childish things. ¹²At present we see indistinctly, as in a mirror, but then face to face. At present I know partially; then I shall know fully, as I am fully known.

¹³So faith, hope, love remain, these three; but the greatest of these is love.

They also asked, "Isn't this the son of Joseph?" ²³He said to them, "Surely you will quote me this proverb, 'Physician, cure yourself,' and say, 'Do here in your native place the things that we heard were

done in Capernaum."²⁴And he said, "Amen, I say to you, no prophet is accepted in his own native place.

²⁵Indeed, I tell you, there were many widows in Israel in the days of Elijah when the sky was closed for three and a half years and a severe famine spread over the entire land. ²⁶It was to none of these that Elijah was sent, but only to a widow in Zarephath in the land of Sidon.

²⁷Again, there were many lepers in Israel during the time of Elisha the prophet; yet not one of them was cleansed, but only Naaman the Syrian."

²⁸When the people in the synagogue heard this, they were all filled with fury. ²⁹They rose up, drove him out of the town, and led him to the brow of the hill on which their town had been built, to hurl him down headlong.

³⁰But Jesus passed through the midst of them and The Gospel of the Lord. went away.

All: Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

A Recapitulation Lest we miss what is Essential

At Jesus' baptism which inaugurates his public ministry, "... the Holy Spirit descended upon him" (cf. Luke 3:22).

Afterwards, "filled with the Holy Spirit, Jesus returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit into the desert" (Luke 4:1).

After 40 days in the desert where he overcame temptation by the devil, "Jesus returned to Galilee in the power of the Spirit" (Luke 4:14). And thus, in today's Gospel, we see Jesus in the Galilean town of Nazareth — Jesus' hometown, where in the town's synagogue he speaks with confidence; we witness his strength in overcoming the hostile crowd facing him in his hometown.

What was the formula for Jesus success? Answer: The Holy Spirit. Jesus' whole public life or life as a human being was one lived under the direction and guidance of the Holy Spirit.

The Risen Lord Jesus breathes the same Holy Spirit into us at our Baptism. Thus, we are called to follow in Jesus' footsteps, to live his life. The very first and essential step is that we recognize the Holy Spirit, that we subject ourselves to the Spirit's direction and guidance – something that we can easily miss or take for granted. The following often-told story may aid in opening our eyes:

"The security guard at a wheelbarrow factory saw a worker coming out of the factory pushing a wheelbarrow with a suspicious looking package in it. The security guard opened the package and found it contained nothing but some old bits of rubbish and let the guy go. The next day he stopped the same worker who was again pushing a wheelbarrow containing a small box. The guard opened

the box and found it contained nothing but sawdust and floor-sweepings this time. The same thing happened several days on the trot, until the security guard finally said, 'OK, I give up. I know you are up to something, but I just can't tell what. Please. I promise not to report you, but put me out of my misery; tell me what you are stealing.' 'Wheelbarrows, 'smiled the worker, 'I'm stealing wheelbarrows.'"

The Holy Spirit is, so to say, the "wheelbarrow" in the public life of Jesus. As followers of Jesus it is essential that we be in the "wheelbarrow" - that is, that we put ourselves under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. *****

The Christmas liturgical season already showed us that no one arrived in Bethlehem without divine guidance either through a star (for the magi) or angels (for the shepherds). Human knowledge is not enough as in the case of the chief priests and scribes who were serving the interests of Herod. They were knowledgeable and could show to the magi where the Messiah would be born but they themselves did not go to encounter the Lord.


The Scripture is not a text to be studied but primarily an encounter with the living Word. One may begin with a study of the text to ascertain its central message but the high point should be the prayerful reading that should follow. It consists of reading God's word in a moment of prayer and allowing it to enlighten and renew us, that in the end it is telling us, "Go and do likewise."

Re: The Second Reading

Paul reminds us how to speak the truth to someone. It is to speak it from the position of real love. Love is the willingness to put ourselves and our relationships on the line for the sake of Love itself. When we speak the truth to someone, it is from the position of service, not a position of superiority. It is from a position of love, not anger or jealousy or resentment. We are kind and patient. We want what is best for the other person, even if it will not work out the best for us.
