
What's HAPPENING?

FEATURED SENIOR OF THE QUARTER C. DANIEL ZOELLER

I was born 8:30 am November 30, 1940 in our home on FM 473 near Zoeller Lane. The house was built by my maternal grandfather Rudolph Pfeiffer for his daughter, my mother, Wilhelmine Pfeiffer Zoeller. Dr. Jones had not arrived so I was delivered by my dad, Arthur Zoeller. I am the ninth of ten children, the seventh son. I am often asked to name my siblings in order. They are A. C. (Arno Chester), Thelma (Lich), Roland, Levy, Victor, Harvey Lee, Dolores (Marquardt, Staudt), Max, C. Daniel (Casper) and Fay.

Dad was a farmer/rancher and worked for the county. In the late 1940's he started a dairy with about 50 cows. They were milked twice a day, every day. The day began around 3:30 am. My chores were feeding the baby calves. They were separated from the nurse cows during the day and I put them together in the evening. Max and I filled the hay racks for the cows to eat after milking. The milk was stored in milk cans in a cooler and picked up daily by Peterson Creamery of Kerrville.

I started school in 1946 at Sisterdale School about 5 miles away. Dad would drive us to school and we walked home in the afternoon. A contractor was building Hwy 473 from Sisterdale to Block Creek. We had to walk along the construction area. Richard Saur, a recent graduate, drove a dump truck for the contractor. He would give us a ride as far as he could, sometime to our door. We sure hated when that road was finished. I attended Sisterdale School through the second grade, then the schools consolidated and we went to Comfort. My first day Mr. Moore, the principal, told me I had to wear shoes. I was not used to that, but I did. We rode a school bus that picked us up in front of our house. Mom helped with the dairy at that time so we were each responsible for our breakfast. We had eggs and bacon or sausage. Life was good.

My favorite time was visiting our neighbor Otto Klemstein. We opened gates for him on our drives around his ranch. He had polio as a child and walked with a limp. At times I got to spend the night. His standard meal was a can of chili mixed with a can of corn and it tasted so good. He called it chili con corny. I looked forward to him coming to my birthday. He always brought me a big Baby Ruth. He even came to my daughter Teresa's birthday and she also got a big candy bar.

I loved baseball and still do to this day. I had a bat and would hit rocks for hours at a time. I called strikes and balls on myself. My bat eventually splintered. On hot summer days Fay and I would walk down Zoeller Lane to our cousins Morris and Melvin Bohnert to play ball. It was evenly matched Fay and Melvin against me and Morris. Fun times.

I hung a tin can on a string from a tree and used it as a microphone. I sang a lot of Hank Williams songs. I cried when he died. It was a sad day. I recycled tin cans a lot. I made bird houses and wedged them in the forks of trees. I asked mom to open them half-way so I could bend the lid out for a porch. When I was about ten Max, Fay and I got a bicycle for Christmas. It was a Western Flyer. It was a great Christmas.

Roland and Victor milked in the dairy. On Saturday afternoon I washed their cars for ten cents each. I gave them the money to bring me candy from their night out in town. Victor sometimes forgot, but Roland never forgot so I gave both dimes to Roland.

I loved animals. Dad woke my one cold sleet morning to care for a lamb whose mama had died. I ran up to the dairy and Roland gave me milk from the dairy. Dad said I could have the lamb. I raised and showed it at the Kendall County Junior Livestock Show that year. It won Grand Champion of the show and was purchased by Lone Star Beer of San Antonio for sixty-seven and a half cents a pound. I hated to see him go; he was a friend to me.

That year daddy sold the dairy to Harvey Lee and we moved to a farm on Cypress Creek close to Comfort. I made the starting lineup on the baseball team and lettered as a freshman. They dropped baseball after that year. I never got to play again in High School. As a teen-ager I played for the Sisterdale Indians. After I married I managed, coached and played for the Comfort Broncos. We played Sunday afternoon and sold snow cones to purchase our playing balls. Later played softball for the Comfort Pearl team, sponsored by Pearl Beer. I played winter games and later in the Senior games. I played as long as I could. I always loved baseball.

When I was seventeen I had a summer job at Texas Highway Department in Boerne. The next summer I worked for Lester Grosenbacher at Sinclair Service Station and part-time for Milton Ersch at the Humble Service Station. Fritz Dietert, Texas Highway Dept Foreman stopped by and offered me a full time job in Boerne. I retired 35 years later from TX Dot in Kerrville. I worked with a lot of good people.

The place to be as a teen-ager on Saturday night was Pat's Dance Hall in Fredericksburg. We car-pooled or got a ride any way we could. We joined others from Fredericksburg, Comfort, Llano, Mason, Kerrville, Luckenbach, Willow City, Stonewall and all the other small towns, a great mix of good dancers. We danced to Hank Thompson, Johnny Bush, Charlie Walker, Texas Top Hands, Ray Fowler and native Arkey Blue among many other great dance bands.

In 1959, at Pat's I met this beautiful girl Barbara Jean St. Clair and in 1960 we were married in St. Mary's church in Fredericksburg. We lived in Comfort the rest of our lives. Our first home was in Schwethelm's Courts, back row, top house. We bought a home on Hwy 27 from the Joe Heinens and a few years later we moved across town to Lindner Avenue and eventually bought my parent's home at 927 High Street.

I formed Z & Z Cattle Company with my brother Max in 1970. I managed the Bailey Ranch, and then Max and I leased it, the North Creek Ranch and other places until 2019.

Hunting was another of my passions. My first deer hunt was on our home place at Sisterdale. Dad took me out and I got my first deer. My first Colorado hunt was in 1970 with Raymond Marquardt, Lee Jung and my brother Max. We all had a successful hunt and I didn't miss many years after that. I hunted varmints, white-tail deer, mule deer and elk in South Texas, West Texas and Colorado. I enjoyed it especially when my wife went with me. My last hunt to Colorado was in 2016 with my nephew Lonnie Marquardt. We were both successful.

We had three daughters, lost one as an infant, Teresa became a RN and Donna became a bank manager. We gained a son-in-law when Donna married John Edd Spencer Jr. He retired from TX Dot after 30 years. They blessed us with two wonderful grand-children. While Haley attended Schreiner University she enjoyed being a statistician for the softball team. After graduation she began working for Hill Country Crisis Council. Corey graduated from Tarleton State University. He played on the LaCrosse team for three years, being on the first team ever for Tarleton. He is following "family tradition" and is employed by TX Dot. Our family continued to grow when Corey married Tori Lynch.

Our biggest daily entertainment is "sitting" for Haley's miniature schnauzers Beck and Tippi. We also get visits from their cousins, corgi mixes Jax and Roscoe.

I guess we have gone to the dogs.

LOCAL HISTORY

THE UNEXPLAINED By Elmer Burow

While watching TV and reading different articles there seem to be lots of things that are hard to explain. Thinking back I have seen a few things that I have a hard time explaining myself, but I know that they do work.

Way back when I was just a kid and they still used horses and mowers to plow, the screw worms were abundant and hard to doctor. One of our main horses developed a sore with screw worms in a place where it was almost impossible to doctor. My dad had no idea what to do and was talking to our neighbor about it when the neighbor told him to call a man that lived on the other side of town.

After getting the man on the phone, my dad had to tell him where the horse was located, what color it was and the location of the wound. The man told my dad to leave that horse in that same pen and for no reason move it from there. My dad followed his orders and I have no idea what that man did but in six days the screw worms were gone and that horse lived a long and healthy life. No one has been able to explain to me how this worked but I know that it did because I was there.


Another thing that has always bothered me was how some people could go out there and find a stream of water when it was underground and there was no indication of it above ground. My father and my oldest brother could go find a tree with a limber link with a fork and start walking around. Usually the point of that fork would go down and he would lay down a marker, like a stick or a rock. He would then walk from the other direction and when he got to the spot, the point of the fork went down again. And my dad would say, "This is a good stream, dig here." The funny thing is that if they drilled a well there they would find a good stream of water. Lots of people watching would say "big deal, there is probably water all over the place there." To this dad would point to his arm and tell them if I cut here it will bend but if I cut where the vein is, it will bend a whole lot more. I know of at least two well diggers that would not drill a well until my dad came out and marked the spot for them. I have no idea how many wells he marked for them but I don't know of any one of them that didn't produce water.

It is a big mystery but this would only work on

my dad and his oldest son. There were seven kids in our family and it only worked on those two. The rest of us could try all kinds of forked limbs and run around till we were wore out and tat darn point would not go down. I even had my brother come out to our place and he found me a well that to this day has never run out of water.

My brother worked for the water department here in town and he had another trick that worked for him. Lots of times they had to find water lines under the ground. Rather than digging all over the place, he would get himself 2 welding rods, bend about 4 inches from the end and use the short end for a handle. He would the long ends sticking out in front of him. He would walk over the ground and when he found the pipe, the welding rods would point left and right where the pipe was. This also did not work on everybody but it saved him lots of digging.

I won't even try to explain how all of this works or why it just works on some people, but I know it does because I saw it take place.

6 Steps for Avoiding Dehydration

6 Ways to Prevent Dehydration

1. Maximize fluid intake

Drinking eight to ten glasses of water each day during the summer is important. It's advice most people know they should follow, but don't always do. If the taste of water isn't appealing to you, foods with a high water content can help you stay hydrated. Popsicles, melon, apples, pears, pineapple, cucumbers, tomatoes, carrots, and leafy greens are a few foods to include in your diet all year round.

2. Limit alcohol consumption

Summer is a season for outdoor celebrations. Many of these parties include alcoholic beverages. Unfortunately, alcohol contributes to dehydration. When outdoors in the summer sun, you should limit alcoholic beverages or avoid them completely.

3. Avoid caffeinated beverages

Caffeine is a diuretic. This means when you indulge in sodas, iced coffee drinks, and energy drinks, fluids pass through your system faster. That can contribute to dehydration. Stick to water with lemon or lime slices or other noncaffeinated beverages.

4. Monitor medication side effects

Some people aren't aware that medications may increase sun sensitivity. If a medication you or your loved one takes has that as a potential side effect, it means you are at higher risk for sunburn, hives, rashes, and dehydration. Review any medications you may be taking to see if sun sensitivity is listed as a side effect and learn more if it is.

5. Schedule outdoor time wisely

Try to limit the time you spend outdoors. Stick with the coolest times of day, which are generally before 10:00 a.m. or after 4:00 p.m.

6. Wear a hat

While many might not consider themselves hat people, wearing a lightweight hat with a brim at least three inches wide is another hydration safety tip. It shades the face and neck, helping to keep you cooler.

Recognizing the Symptoms of Dehydration

Finally, we suggest familiarizing yourself with the symptoms of dehydration. From confusion to irritability, the signs aren't always obvious. Recognizing when you or a loved one is in the early stages of dehydration can help you get treatment before a more serious health crisis occurs.


