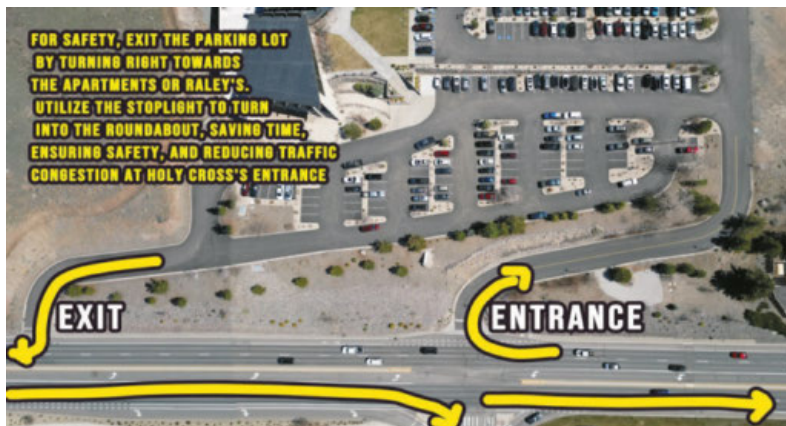

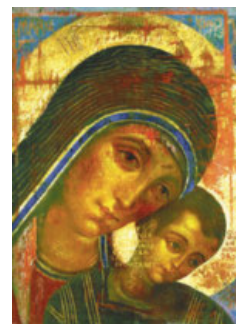
## Neocatechumenal Way

In the first three centuries of Christianity, it was illegal to be Christian and there was a very strong persecution in which all your goods could be confiscated, or you could even be killed. Yet Christianity flourished. Why? Because the persecution made obvious to the general public that Christians were not afraid of death. People were impressed by this, and many wanted to have whatever the Christians had.

Today, we cannot say that everyone who goes to Church is not afraid of death or sees suffering as a blessing. As the world moves away from God, we lose the meaning of life and anxiety and fear increases.

The Neocatechumenal Way is a present-day implementation of the catechumenate that was done in the first three centuries: a process to gestate eternal life within people who are interested in being a sign for the present generation ( which is moving away from God) that God has overcome everything that kills us and that we can have the guarantee of eternal life living inside us even now in this world.

This means moving towards an implementation of Christianity that is akin to that of the gospels and the first three centuries of Christian life: in our sacramental, liturgical, community life as well as in our understanding and living of scripture.



## Exaltation of the Cross

**Question:** What is the history behind feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross?

**Answer:** Emperor Constantine's mother, Helena, is credited with having discovered the true cross around 330. She traveled to the Holy Land and uncovered the places associated with Jesus' life. Legend has it that Helena uncovered three crosses but was not able to detect the true cross until each of them was laid on a leper. Only one of them cured the leper, proving it to be the true cross. A great church was built at the site, and soon various portions of the cross were sent to other churches as relics to be venerated.

The day after the dedication of the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, September 14, 335, the actual cross was displayed for veneration. Egeria, a women traveler to Jerusalem around the year 386, kept a diary that has survived. She tells of the unique veneration of the wood of the cross that took place on Good Friday, something maintained ritually to this very day.

The Exaltation of the Holy Cross focuses on the gift of love that Jesus manifested by his total gift of self, offered for all. The cross, the ultimate form of capital punishment in its day, has become for us the ultimate symbol of love and triumph over evil and death.

## "The Church on the Hill"

Holy Cross Catholic Community is the "common home" for nearly 1200 plus families who regularly gather together to worship and pray. This community has as its mission "to become disciples of Christ by the love we have for one another, as we journey together in prayer, friendship, and service."

This community was established on October 5, 1967 by Bishop Joseph Green. It was a large physical plant with a school, a convent, a rectory, and a multipurpose hall seating 500 people, but unfortunately with a huge debt. In 1970, it was decided to sell the property and move to a site in North-East Sparks. In 1976 ground was broken for a multipurpose facility that was dedicated in the same year by Bishop Norman McFarland. In the meantime, Church services were held at "Our Savior Lutheran Church". The community began to grow, so the present Holy Cross Catholic Community facility was built in 2000 and it was dedicated by Bishop Staling on December 29, 2001.

"The Church on the Hill" with its large beautiful windows overlooks Reno-Sparks landscape with a view of the majestic Sierras. The Prayer Garden dedicated to Our Lady of Guadalupe, the Memorial Benches and the Memorial Tree are just reminders that the community takes time to pause "to remember". We are, I feel, emerging as a great destination for people to come together, worship and pray and give thanks. I pray that we are a sanctuary of peace and hope. I am grateful.

"The Church on the Hill" is blessed to have a loyal and faithful multicultural community. Its "heart and soul" is its dedicated team of lay ministers. They are liturgical ministers, catechists, greeters, ushers, ministers of hospitality, youth ministers, "Healing Hearts" grief support group, ministers to the homebound, nursing homes and retirement community, five loaves, young adult Bible study group,...the list goes on. They keep the community thriving. Thank You.

Finally, to all those who worship and pray at Holy Cross Catholic Community, a Big Thank You. To everyone else, I extend a standing invitation to "come and see".

1. Daily Mass will be offered Monday thru Friday at 12:00 Noon. All are welcome!
2. Daily Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament will be held from 11:00am to 12:00pm noon. There will be monthly Adoration on all 1st Fridays from 9:30am to 4:30pm. Please join us for 30 minutes to one hour. Pray for Respect Life, World Peace, Vocations, and Parish unity.
3. Visits to the Blessed Sacrament as individuals or families.
4. Organize study groups on "The Meaning of Mass". Become a small group leader. Hold the study groups twice a year from October to December and from February to April. Complete the study in six to seven weekly sessions.

GOSPEL MEDITATION

The famous Russian novelist Fyodor Dostoyevsky said, “Love in action is a harsh and dreadful thing.” In the Gospel reading this week, Jesus does something harsh and dreadful — he watches his own disciples abandon him. What could possibly be loving about that?

Well, we notice the context is Jesus’ teaching about eating and drinking his body and blood. His followers hear this and say, “This teaching is difficult; who can accept it?” (John 6:60). We shouldn’t imagine we’d do anything different, because not even the ones who stay, like Peter, seem to understand what Jesus is saying. Then we hear this devastating line, “Because of this many of his disciples turned back and no longer went about with him” (John 6:66). Besides the night of the Last Supper, only now do Jesus’ disciples abandon him. And, painfully, Jesus just lets them go.

The best way to make sense out of this is love. Jesus is God’s love in action. He wants to become one with those whom He loves. He wants to love them as His own body. Yes, the oneness manifested in the Eucharist sounds harsh and dreadful because it is rooted in love which is willing to risk abandonment and separation to attain its goal: to be one body with the beloved. It is both terrifying and wonderful that Jesus will risk losing us in order to be one with us. Our response? Lord, we cannot grasp a love so great, but please help us never to abandon it, either.

## Communion Rites #1: Prayer to Christ

*“Lord Jesus Christ, who said to your  
Apostles: Peace I leave you, my peace I give you, look  
not on our sins, but on the faith of Your Church, and  
graciously grant her peace and unity in accordance with  
your will. Who live and reign for ever and ever.”  
- Excerpt from the Roman Missal*

Throughout the Mass, all of the priest’s attention has been focused on the Father. However, at this moment, the Priest turns his attention to the Eucharist and says one of only two prayers that are addressed directly to Jesus Himself. And the purpose of this prayer is to “remind” Jesus that He wishes us peace and forgiveness of sins. In reality it is not to remind Christ, who already knows, but rather to remind all of us that this is Christ’s mission in our lives—not to condemn but to save. But the words extend beyond that as well. Throughout the Old Testament, peace was a consequence of right relationship. As such, being in right relationship with Jesus, we can now extend the peace that comes from God to our brothers and sisters.

**How does ‘right to worship’ lead to ‘right relationship’ with God?**

September 1, 2024—22nd Sunday in Ordinary Time  
GOSPEL MEDITATION

Purity isn’t popular at the moment. Or is it? Look at a rack of health magazines or at popular podcasts. You’ll see an infinite ocean of regulations and rituals of diets, intermittent fasting, morning sun rituals, intense juice detox practices, lists of dangerous foods, mental practices, as well as long lists of dos and don’ts for the proper cleaning of clothes, dishes, cars, houses, pets, and children. Like it or not, we long to be pure, clean, and without blemish.

This question of purity haunted people in Jesus’ day, too. The Pharisees and scribes (the leading purity authorities of the day) criticize Jesus, asking, “Why do your disciples not live according to the tradition of the elders, but eat with defiled hands?” (Mark 7:5). Jesus responds by saying, “There is nothing outside the person that can defile him if it goes into him; but the things that come out of the person are what defile the person” (Mark 7:15). What does he mean, and how can it help us be pure?

We’ve probably all heard the somewhat shopworn interpretation that Jesus replaces the ritual, exterior notion of purity with a moral, interior one. Christianity is thus seen as a kind of moral re-tooling, as if religion doesn’t make us pure. Good moral intentions do. But this doesn’t take the rest of Jesus’ ministry seriously enough, nor our obsession with purity. The better reading is that Jesus audaciously offers himself as the ultimate source of human purity — from within each human heart. Both our religious ritual practices and our moral actions are meant to flow from this encounter with Jesus the Lord. When we are in friendship with him, everything becomes pure for us.

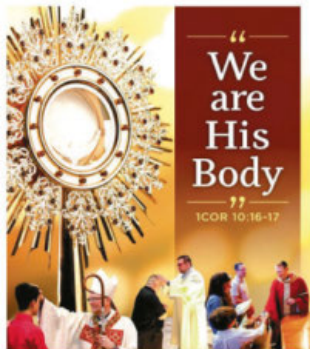
