Jubilee of Communication: Disarming information, sharing hope

The opening of the Jubilee highlighted two essential tools for every journalist: heart and hope. These values resonated in the two inaugural moments of the celebration: the penitential liturgy, led by Father Giulio Albanese, Director of the Office for Social Communications of the Vicariate of Rome, and the international Mass presided over by Cardinal Reina. The heart of the celebration was symbolized by a relic of St. Francis de Sales, which had been brought to Rome from the northern Italian city of Treviso, where it has been safeguarded since 1913. Pope Francis' message for the 59th World Communications Day, quoted extensively during the event, underscored the call to share hope with gentleness—a virtue central to the Jubilee's mission.

Disarming communication following Christ's example

In his homily, Cardinal Reina said that the Jubilee is a time of mercy, where the focus shifts from sins committed to the transformative power of God's forgiveness. He drew attention to Pope Francis' invitation to be communicators of hope" and to "disarm communication." Cardinal Reina reflected on the Gospel account of the woman caught in adultery as a model for this approach. Jesus, confronted with a scandalous situation, chose a path of gentle communication, avoiding aggression and collaborating with truth. By asking, "Who among you is without sin, cast the first stone," he explained that Christ disarmed pride and invited reflection. "To disarm communication, we must first disarm our pride," said Cardinal Reina. "Scripture reminds us that only God is judge." He noted that Jesus did not define the woman by her mistake but recognized her inherent dignity, offering hope for renewal.

A Horizon of Hope

The cardinal concluded his homily by reflecting on Jesus' words to the woman: "Go and sin no more." These words, he said, encapsulate hope and point to a future of transformation. This act of mercy, he noted, was the woman's personal Jubilee. "If we wish to celebrate our Jubilee as the world of communication," Cardinal Reina urged, "we must adopt this paradigm, embracing a style of communication that recognizes the dignity of every human being and fosters care for our common home."

A Call to Conversion

The penitential liturgy that preceded the Mass began with readings from *Spes non confundit*, Pope Francis' Bull of Indiction for the 2025 Jubilee. The liturgy invited participants to reflect on the hope that resides in every heart and to embrace the path of conversion symbolized by passing through the Holy Door, which represents Christ Himself. Father Albanese encouraged communicators to view their profession as a mission field, where conversion cannot be separated from professional life. He cautioned against becoming "mercenaries of others' words" and urged participants to ensure their communication reflects God's love and charity.

Communicating Charity

Father Albanese concluded by challenging communicators to examine whether their work expresses the charity of God or is driven by worldly motives. Echoing Pope Francis, he called for communication that fosters hope and contributes to building a more fraternal world.

Question:

Why do we have a liturgical season called ordinary time?

Answer:

Ordinary time is the longest season of the liturgical year. It begins the Monday after January 6, the Epiphany, and goes until the Tuesday before Ash

Wednesday, the beginning of Lent. That period can last anywhere from five to eight weeks, depending on when Easter is celebrated. Ordinary time picks up again the Monday after Pentecost Sunday and lasts from twenty-three to twenty-seven weeks, until the end of the liturgical year, the Saturday before Advent begins.

Why the name ordinary? "Ordinary" is not in contrast to "extraordinary" or "special" but rather stresses the Latin language notion of "ordinal" or numbered Sundays. The Latin title for the season, *tempus ordinarium*, conveys the sense that this time of the year is measured or numbered time. Measured time can allude simply to the numbered Sundays, or the notion that these Sundays are a "measured" time to deepen and immerse ourselves completely in the realities of Jesus' incarnation, ministry, passion, death, and resurrection. Ordinary time offers us the opportunity to connect the ordinary lived experiences of our lives with those of Jesus, who modeled for us how to live a truly human existence.

February 9, 2025—5th Sunday of Ordinary Time **GOSPEL MEDITATION**

My parents' garage is full of old junk that no longer serves any purpose in my life. As a 46-year-old man, I admit that's pretty lame. Either due to my sentimentality or laziness (or both, probably), I just couldn't get myself to throw things away. But a few days ago, by a grace of God, I thought: "I'll hire my nephew Ryan to throw a bunch of my stuff away he couldn't care less about my junk!" And you know what? It worked. In one day, Ryan chucked the majority of his uncle's useless stuff. I feel so free, ready for a new junk-free chapter in my life.

This kind of thing happens in this Sunday's Gospel. Peter's net is full of useless junk. Luke says he and the others are cleaning their nets after catching no fish. Imagine them dejectedly and impatiently removing a nasty assortment of seaweed, sticks and muck. The Lord teaches and calls them once their nets are cleared out. So it goes with us. Spiritual life begins by removing that which is useless and merely taking up space in our hearts, minds and lives. Then Jesus teaches and acts in a marvelous way in our lives, too.

So what's junking up your net? What habits, attachments, possessions, preoccupations? If, like me, you struggle to clean your nets by yourself, ask the Lord to send you someone like my nephew to be your "Peter" and help you clean it out. It is well worth it. Once Peter's net is clean, he is free to make a wonderful catch.

Sending Rites #2: The Final Blessing

"The Lord bless you and keep you; the Lord make his face shine on you and be gracious to you; the lord turn his face towards you and give you peace." - Numbers 6:24-26 NIV

Near the end of Mass, the celebrant offers the blessing of God, invoking the name of the Holy Trinity. In this, we again see a parallel to the beginning of Mass, where we traced the sign of the cross over our bodies, and remembered in whose name we act. But now, this is a blessing that is lived out in the world-our identity as Christian isn't just something that happens in the church building, but encapsulates the totality of who we are. What we have done in the Mass then goes out into the world. And so we implore God's blessing and take up our crosses to follow where Jesus leads.

What are the crosses you carry in your life? Where do you see God's blessings in your life?

February 16, 2025—6th Sunday of Ordinary Time **GOSPEL MEDITATION**

I craved four things as a teenager: success in sports, food, fun and the attention of popular people. However, I noticed that as I acquired them, I was more unsatisfied than before. So, I'd strive even more energetically, achieve more, and the sense of emptiness was greater still. These four things started to feel like burdens or even curses. Soon after, I encountered Christ in my high school youth group. Experiencing his love was totally different than anything those four things previously produced. It produced a lasting happiness.

Jesus utters a kind of four-fold curse in this week's Gospel of Saint Luke's "woes": "Woe to you who are rich...who are filled now...who laugh now...who are well-spoken of' (cf. Luke 6:24-26). How marvelous that these correspond perfectly to the four things that obsessed my teenage soul: riches, food, laughter and good reputation. The "woes" the Lord speaks are warnings: when those things are the purpose of your life, you'll be miserable. He is saying, "You'll be happy, or blessed, in the measure that these things do not determine the shape of our lives, and the kingdom of God does."

To some degree, we're all spiritual teenagers, addicted to one or more of those four "woes." How splendid that the Lord wants his to bless us — that is, to satisfy us, make us laugh with joy, and in the kingdom of God, offer us what will truly satisfy us. But first let's admit what is causing our "woes.





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
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
